### Jesus said: "I am the gate for the sheep .... "John 10: 1-10

It was the worst autumn of her life. She had just begun teaching at Harvard - for a first-generation college student fresh out of graduate school that was stressful enough. But three weeks into the semester, just as she was feeling something "approximating normal," her beloved father died. A month after that, she and her husband were unexpectedly evicted from their apartment. A month after that, her mom was diagnosed with breast cancer. And, during the spring semester, she suffered from adrenal fatigue and didn't fully recover until well into the summer.

No one would have blamed her if she skipped church during those troubled months, but she didn't. She couldn't. Because a few weeks before that awful fall semester began, her church's long-time pianist moved away. She volunteered to take on the role - and, in the end, what started as an imposition turned out to be a blessing.

### Marriage Tune-Up



The couple that shops together - may learn something. Many women enjoy shopping as an "experience" while many men shop with a "hunter" mentality (get what you need as quickly as you can.) Although these are stereotypes and not always true, shopping together can often be frustrating. Just once try shopping as a date. Enter into your beloved's world and learn something new about them.

"The church I attend is not a wealthy one, so it is difficult to find a skilled musician who is willing to work dependably for what we can pay," she writes. I grew up playing the piano in church. It's a routine I know well; I know all the songs inside and out, and it's a skill that comes easily to me. It's something I enjoy. Thanks to my day job at Harvard, I don't need extra cash. Still, the most stressful year of my life seems like a strange time to take on a *pro bono* side gig as a church musician. And, honestly, if the position had opened up even one month later, I might never have agreed to start.

"In many ways, though, it was precisely that additional 'job' that saved my sanity during such a hard year. There were so many weeks that it would have been tempting just to sleep in or to spend those hours on Sunday with Netflix, in order to simply rest. But I couldn't, because I had to be there. There had to be music. And, in subtle

ways that I didn't appreciate at the time, being in that space meant being surrounded by loved ones, [but] by people... whose lives and struggles were also

drastically different from my own. Being in that simple sanctuary every week, under the arched ceiling, before the cross, surrounded by the hum of friendly chaos, furnished me with a broader and more robust sense of self by decentering my own central importance.

"When I played that music, my body became a conduit through which the bonds between all of the people gathered there - old and young, poor and less poor, every shade of tan and brown - grew stronger as we sang together. While I wasn't fully aware of it at the time, the experience of sharing music with others turned out to be what I needed most during a time when everything else felt uncertain and shaky."

Despite the stresses of work and the family crises she had to deal with, this young college professor managed to hear the voice of the Good Shepherd and heed his call to be a source of peace and support for his "flock." Like Jesus the "gate," she becomes a "conduit through which the bonds of all people gathered there . . . [grew] stronger as we sang together. Every life is created by God for one purpose: to manifest his love for all. That is the ultimate test of the Christian vocation, which is the Good Shepherd's call to everyone in his flock: to live faith that takes on the Good Shepherd's work of being a "gate" to God's Kingdom of reconciliation and peace.

### Jesus knows us all by Name!

There have always been people with a good memory for names: Napoleon, "who knew thousands of his soldiers by name . . ." or James A. Farley, "who claimed he knew 50,000 people by their first name . . ." or Charles Schwab, "who knew the names of all 8,000 of his employees at Homestead Mill . . ." or Charles W. Eliot, "who, during his forty years as president of Harvard, earned the reputation of knowing all the students by name each year . . ." or Harry Lorayne, "who used to amaze his audiences by being introduced to hundreds of people, one after another, then giving the name of any person who stood up and requested it."

But can you imagine Christ knowing all his sheep by name? That's millions and millions of people over 2,000 years. No wonder we call him Master, Lord, Savior – watching over his flock, calling each by name.

### Showing the way

In San Salvador on March 24, 1980, an assassin killed Archbishop Oscar Romero with a single shot to the heart while he was saying Mass. Only a few minutes before, Archbishop Romero had finished a hope-filled homily in which he urged the people to serve one another. Since Archbishop Romero was demanding human rights for his people under oppression, he knew that his life was in danger. Still he persisted in speaking out against tyranny and for freedom. He once told newspapermen that even if his enemies killed him, he would rise again among his people.

Today, good shepherds who lay down their lives are husbands and wives who can't do enough for each other to demonstrate their commitment to each other; parents who make countless sacrifices for the good of their children; teachers who spend untold hours instructing the weak students; doctors and nurses who work untiringly to show they care for their patients; employers who share profits with their workers; politicians who unselfishly promote the common good of their voters and parishioners who generously support their parish community.

### "I am the gate!"

In his book 'The Holy Land', John Kellman describes a field pen. It consists of a circular stone wall about four feet high with an



opening in it. Kellman says that one day a Holy Land tourist saw a field pen near Hebron. He asked a shepherd sitting nearby, "Where's the gate for your pen?" The shepherd said, "I am the gate." The shepherd then told the tourist how he herded his flock into the pen each night and then lay down across the entrance. No sheep could leave the pen and no wild animal could enter it, without stepping over his body.

We need to be good shepherds and good leaders. Everyone who is entrusted with the care of others is a shepherd. Hence, pastors, parents, teachers, doctors, nurses, government officials, caregivers, among others, are all shepherds. We become good shepherds by loving those entrusted to us, praying for them, spending our time, talents and blessings for their welfare, and guarding them from physical and spiritual dangers. Parents must be especially careful of their duties toward their children by giving them good example. Above all, parents should pray for their children and infuse into them sound Christian moral principles.

### "Follow my voice!"

On September 11, 2001, the Pentagon was slammed by a hijacked airliner. People were trapped in the flaming building. A police officer ran inside and kept repeating in the darkness, "Follow my voice." Six people did. They owe their lives to that voice. We know the popular child's game called, "Follow the Leader." As children, remember when we played, "Simon says?" Whatever Simon says, we do, because, Simon is the leader of that game. At some point of our life, we all picked out leaders to follow, some good, some bad. Depending on whom we chose, we were led well or astray.

Jesus says, "My sheep hear my voice." But hearing Jesus' voice is very difficult in the current environment of our lives. Each day hundreds of other "shepherds" are calling our names for our attention. They offer formulas for health, wealth and happiness. They offer formulas for solving problems, getting along in relationships, raising children, avoiding becoming popular and getting ahead.

There will be no interruption, for the TV is with me. Its cable and remote control, they comfort me

It prepares a commercial for me in the midst of my worldliness

And anoints my head with secular humanism and consumerism.

My covetousness runs over;

Surely ignorance and laziness shall follow me all the days of my life,

And I shall dwell in the house of wretchedness watching TV forever.

### How the unsinkable Bismarck was sunk!

In the beginning of World War II, the Nazis commissioned a massive battleship named the *Bismarck*. It was the biggest fighting vessel



the world had seen up to that time. With the *Bismarck* the Germans had the opportunity to dominate the seas. Very soon after it was commissioned, the *Bismarck* sank tons of Allied shipping and allied aircraft. Its massive armor plating resulted in the boast that the *Bismarck* was unsinkable. But the *Bismarck* was sunk. And it was sunk due to one lone torpedo. A torpedo hit the *Bismarck* in the rudder. As a result the battleship zig-zagged through the sea, unable to reach harbor. It was only a short while before the British navy was able to overtake and destroy it. No matter how large the battleship may be, it is doomed without a rudder to direct it.

Floundering on the waters of chaos without a rudder, the Bismarck is a modern-day image of a world without the direction of Jesus, the Good Shepherd. Without the Lord, the world is headed toward chaos. But with the Lord there is guidance, direction and purpose in life. But how and from where do we get this direction and purpose? Our local parish is our sheepfold, and our pastors are our shepherds. Jesus is the High Priest, the Bishops are the successors of the Apostles, the pastors are their helpers and the parishioners are the sheep. Hence, as the good sheep of the parish, parishioners are expected to a) Hear and follow the voice of our shepherds through their homilies, Bible classes, counseling and advice. b) Receive the spiritual food given by our pastors by regular participation in the Holy Mass, by frequenting the Sacraments and by prayer services, renewal programs and missions. c) Cooperate with our pastors by giving them positive suggestions for the welfare of the parish, by encouraging them in their duties, by lovingly correcting them with constructive criticism when they are found misbehaving or failing in their duties and by praying for them d) Actively participate in the work of various councils, ministries and parish associations.

# From the Pastoral Staff

We are in the middle of the Easter season ... on our way to the Ascension and then to Pentecost.

Pentecost, the descent of the Holy Spirit on the apostles Jesus' promise that He will send the Holy Spirit to strengthen them to continue His ministry on earth. This coming of the Holy Spirit is repeated for us at confirmation.

Since Easter we have heard stories of Jesus' post resurrection appearances.

Last week we heard the disciples on the road to Emmaus, who didn't recognize Jesus until they stopped to rest and He broke bread just as He did at the Last Supper.

Today we have a departure from a post resurrection appearance. We know that throughout all of scripture we have seen Jesus referred to by many names. During Easter we heard Jesus referred to many times as the Pascal Lamb.

In today's Gospel of John we see Jesus as the shepherd of the flock ...

Many times He is referred to as the Good Shepherd. But today notice how He refers to Himself as not only the shepherd... but also as the gate keeper. He says: "I am the gate whoever enters through me will be saved, and will come in and go out and find pasture. A thief comes only to steal and destroy; I came so that they might have life and have it more abundantly."

Jesus makes it very clear ... he knows his flock ... and they know Him. Those who try to enter through the gate without acknowledging Jesus as The gate keeper is a thief

... an imposter. We know also that even if one sheep is lost ... Jesus will find him and welcome him back into the fold. During the rest of this Easter season we need to remain focused on Jesus'



Resurrection. We are resurrection people. For without the resurrection the world would have no hope... we would still be in darkness.

As we look around at the world today... we see that there is so much need for us to be evangelists of the resurrection. We need to show the world that good does conquer evil. Jesus is the way. We need to keep focused on Jesus as the shepherd... the gate keeper. It is only through Him that we can reach our Eternal Life in heaven. Our faith needs to be strong.

Here is a little prayer you can pray to the Good Shepherd.

Good Shepherd you know us by our name And our identity is not hidden from You Gather us to yourself the sheep, That we may know your name. Lord in your mercy, hear our prayer.

My thoughts and prayers are with you throughout this Easter season.

### **MASS-CENTERED CATECHESIS:**

Are you concerned about the diminishing numbers at Mass? How do we get more parishioners, especially families and children, to attend Mass? The Diocese of Metuchen is taking steps to introduce parish leaders to the USCCB's vision by encouraging parishes to develop Mass and family-centered catechetical programs. A successful approach was developed in the Diocese of Paterson and introduced to our Catechetical Leaders and Pastors in August of 2022. Presenter Deirdre Nemeth will return in June to further the conversation by delving deeper into how to design and orchestrate this model in your parishes. She will discuss bringing families to Mass, family faith sessions, and how to create thirty-minute class sessions and educational/community-building opportunities for adults.

There are two sessions: Part A and Part B; just so you know, they are different workshops. It is important that all of us interested in this model should attend both. **Catechists, Parish Council, GIFT leaders, all ministers connected with Liturgy and others** will find this very helpful in our common effort to get more people to attend Mass.
