

A Message From The Pastor

Dear Friends.

On the cover page of this bulletin, you can see that today is titled as: "Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord." So, is today "Palm Sunday" or "Passion Sunday?" The answer is: both. The first name comes from the fact that it commemorates Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, when



the crowd had palm branches (John 12:13). The second name comes from the fact that the narrative of the Passion is read on this Sunday. Listening attentively to the passion narrative helps us to understand the meaning of the cross in our lives a bit more clearly. Many saints spoke about this and lived it in their own lives. St. Katherine Drexel wrote: "The patient and humble endurance of the Cross – whatever nature it may be – is the highest work we have to do."

We take for granted that we use palms today. But why? In biblical times, the palm tree was considered a "kingly" tree because of its lofty height and majestic appearance. The palm tree became a sign and symbol of royalty and victory. "The Jewish people carried palm branches in their processions on festive holy days. Roman soldiers carried palms in their victory parades in Rome. Holding palms in our hands, we too join the crowds who welcomed Jesus into Jerusalem as their King and Messiah. We have thus entered today into the Holy Week, the most important week of the Liturgical Year. Keep these palms in a prominent place in our home and thus we will be reminded of the significance of what we have begun on Palm Sunday or Passion Sunday.

The Lenten season of sacrifice and self-denial is about to come to an end, but this week is extremely important for all Christians. The greatest focus of the week is the Passion (suffering) and Resurrection of Jesus Christ and the events that led up to it. The "Chrism Mass" will be on Tuesday in the Cathedral where the Bishop, together with all the priests, will commemorate one important event of the Holy Thursday – the institution of the Priesthood. It is during this Mass that the sacred oils used for the Sacraments will be blessed by the Bishop. Our parish will be represented by Mike and Debbie Lanyi; they will bring some of these oils back to our parish.

"Easter Triduum" is another term we hear this week. It simply means "a three day festival" of prayer and worship, beginning on the evening of Holy Thursday and ending on Easter Sunday. A short note on each of these days is given elsewhere in this bulletin.

Pope Francis wrote: "Holy Week is a privileged time when we are called to draw near to Jesus: friendship with him is shown in times of difficulty." My earnest request to you in this column, dear brothers and sisters, is that you make every effort this week to attend these sacred events. Can we consider this week as a time of grace for all of us as a family and so make sure that we participate in these worship services even by making some sacrifice this week, by rescheduling other activities, by rearranging other plans and thus giving priority to this week? You will see the grace of God flowing into your lives and into your homes. Wishing you all a grace-filled Holy Week, leading to the joys of Easter,

Smile with Your Family



For many years, I have taken Holy Communion to our homebound parishioners. Some have been very elderly, 102 and 101 years old, and some very young, in their 30's. For all of these dear people, I have witnessed a dedication to the Lord that has enriched my soul and strengthened my Faith. I have gotten to know them and their stories, and they mine. We have been joined in a love of Jesus and a belief that by receiving Jesus in the Eucharist, we are enriched and blessed to move on in faith for whatever the Lord has in store for us.

I serve in a few ministries here in the parish and can honestly tell you that this experience has given me much more than I could ever give back. One very elderly client that I visited a few years ago would cry and wish for death each week I visited. I spoke to Sister Marie Therese about her, asking what I could possibly do to ease her sorrow. Sister told me to ask her what she was looking forward to when she finally got to Heaven, and who she would be happy to see again. When I did this on my next visit, the tone of our visit changed as she spoke about her love of God and her happiness to see her husband and son again. What a moving experience I had that Sunday morning! This ministry is a true blessing for all who participate, I can promise you that!

PALM SUNDAY AND PASSION SUNDAY

The Church celebrates today as both Palm Sunday and Passion Sunday. It is on Palm Sunday that we enter Holy Week and welcome Jesus into our lives, asking him to allow us a share in his suffering, death and Resurrection. This is also the time we remember and relive the events which brought about our redemption and salvation. That is why the Holy Week liturgy presents us with the actual events of the dying and rising of Jesus. The liturgy also enables us to experience in our lives, here and now, what Jesus went through then. In other words, we commemorate and relive during this week our own dying and rising in Jesus, which result in our healing, reconciliation, and redemption. No wonder Greek Orthodox Christians greet each other with the words, "Kali Anastasi" ("Good Resurrection"), not on Easter Sunday but on Good Friday. They anticipate the Resurrection. Just as Jesus did, we, too, must lay down our lives freely by active participation in the Holy Week liturgies. In so doing, we are allowing Jesus to forgive us our sins, to heal the wounds in us caused by our sins and the sins of others and to transform us more completely into the image and likeness of God. Thus, we shall be able to live more fully the Divine life we received at Baptism.

Proper participation in the Holy Week liturgy will also deepen our relationship with God, increase our Faith and strengthen our lives as disciples of Jesus. But let us remember that Holy Week can become "holy" for us only if we actively and consciously take part in the liturgies of this week. This is also the week when we should lighten the burden of Christ's passion as daily experienced by the hungry, the poor, the sick, the homeless, the lonely and the outcast through our corporal and spiritual works of mercy. The Passion Sunday liturgy combines contrasting moments, one of glory, the other of suffering: the welcome of Jesus into Jerusalem and the drama of his unjust trial and suffering, culminating in his crucifixion and death.



SKIP THE HOLY WEEK TO EASTER?!

Philip Yancey, an editor at Christianity Today magazine, grew up in a fundamentalist church which didn't observe the major events of Holy Week. He never attended a Good Friday service and shied away from crucifixes because they were "too Catholic." He writes, "The church I grew up in skipped past the events of Holy Week in a rush to hear the cymbal sounds of Easter." (Christianity Today, September 9, 1996). We can understand this desire to skip through Holy Week. Jesus on the cross is death; Jesus risen is life! A sanctuary stripped bare for Good Friday is depressing; a lily-bedecked sanctuary is glorious! Who doesn't want to skip through Holy Week? Yet, the adult Philip Yancey has learned that the Bible "slows down rather than speeds up when it gets to Holy Week." What people want to get through quickly, the Bible takes slowly. One early Christian commentator went so far as to say that the Gospels are actually the record of Jesus' final week . . . with extended introductions.

Here's the challenge for Holy Week. We have but this Sunday to cover everything from Jesus entering Jerusalem to "Hosannas," through the moment when Jesus was laid in a borrowed tomb. Even the name for this Sunday reveals our challenge. Today is "Palm/Passion Sunday." It's not "Palm or Passion Sunday," not even "Palm and Passion Sunday." It's Palm/Passion Sunday, two different subjects jammed up against each other.

HOSANNA LEADING TO THE CROSS

Some years ago a book, entitled When the Cheering Stopped, was written by Gene Smith, a noted American biographer of world leaders. It was the story of the last years of President Woodrow Wilson and the events leading up to and following World War I. When that war was over, Wilson, the 28th president of the United States, was an international hero. There was a great spirit of optimism abroad, and people actually believed that the last war had been fought, and that the world had been made safe for democracy. On his first visit to Paris after the war, Wilson was greeted by cheering mobs. He was actually more popular than France's own heroes. The same thing was true in England and Italy. The cheering lasted about a year. Then it gradually began to stop. At home, Woodrow Wilson ran into opposition in the United States Senate, and his League of Nations was not ratified. Under the strain of it all, the President's health began to break. In the next election his party was defeated. So it was that Woodrow Wilson, a man who barely a year or two earlier had been heralded as the new world Messiah, came to the end of his days a broken and defeated man.


It's a sad story, but one that is not altogether unfamiliar. The ultimate reward for someone who tries to translate ideals into reality is apt to be frustration and defeat. It happened that way to Jesus. When he emerged on the public scene, he was an overnight sensation. On Palm Sunday, leafy palm branches were spread before him and there were shouts of "Hosanna." But before it was all over, a tidal wave of manipulated opposition welled up that brought Jesus to the cross.

"DADDY, DADDY, PLEASE DADDY"

A father, Tim Miller, writes about a time when he experienced what God surely experienced that day on Calvary. Miller's nine-year-old daughter Jennifer was looking forward to their family's vacation. But she became ill, and a long anticipated day at Sea World was replaced by an all-night series of CT scans, X-rays, and blood work at the hospital. As morning approached, the doctors told this exhausted little girl that she would need to have one more test, a spinal tap. The procedure would be painful, they said. The doctor then asked Tim Miller if he planned to stay in the room. He nodded, knowing he couldn't leave Jennifer alone during the ordeal. The doctors gently asked Jennifer to remove all her clothing. Then they curled her into a tiny ball. Tim says he buried his face in hers and hugged her. When the needle went in, Jennifer cried. As the searing pain increased, she sobbingly repeated, "Daddy, Daddy," her voice becoming more earnest with each word. It was as if she were saying, "Oh Daddy, please, can't you do something?"

Tim' tears mingled with hers. His heart was broken. He felt nauseated. Because he loved her, he was allowing her to go through the most agonizing experience of her life, and he could hardly stand it. In the middle of that spinal tap, his thoughts went to the cross of Christ. What unspeakable pain both the Son and the Father went through, says Tim Miller. [Edward K. Rowell, 1001 Quotes, Illustrations, and Humorous Stories (Grand Rapids, MI: Baker, 2008), p. 180.] And it's true. We see Christ's courage. And we see the Father's amazing love poured out. And here is the most astounding thing of all: it was all for us. We didn't deserve it, but Christ died for us.



WHAT IS EASTER TRIDUUM?

"Triduum" is a Latin word referring to a three-day period of prayer, usually in preparation for an important feast or in celebration of that feast. Easter Triduum is the liturgical name for the last three days of Holy Week: Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday with Easter Vigil whereby we enter the joy of Easter Sunday. Here's a preview of how it is celebrated here at St. Matthias.



Holy Thursday: If you have not attended a Holy Thursday Mass, you should try to be there. It is the time when the Oils of Chrism are presented to the Priest and the Congregation after our Parish representatives – Mike and Debbie Lanyi-would attend the Chrism Mass at the Cathedral in Metuchen and bring them to St. Matthias. During this Mass the priest performs the washing of the feet, a very humbling experience. At the conclusion of the Mass, the Blessed Sacrament is taken to the beautifully decorated Cafeteria where parishioners come in turns to "watch and pray" with Our Lord.

Good Friday: In the afternoon, at 2 PM, we have our traditional Stations of the Cross outside – in our parking lot – with very reflections that are relevant to our times. This presentation is quite moving as parishioners representing different ministries, lead us in the path of Jesus on the road to His death on the cross.

At night, there is a solemn service in the church. The atmosphere is somber with low lighting and music. We hear readings from the Old Testament and the Gospel (the Passion Narrative), and there is time for reflection during the intercessions. After the intercessions, we each venerate the cross with a sign of respect or reverence. This service is not a Mass because there is no consecration of hosts, but communion is received with the extra Eucharist from the Mass on Holy Thursday. At the end of the service, we depart the church in prayerful silence.

Holy Saturday/Easter Vigil: This is the day of prayer and waiting. The Easter Vigil begins at 8 pm when it is still dark. The congregation moves outside to begin the Service of the Easter Fire. We then process into the Church with the Paschal Candle lit. We use candles lit from the Paschal Candle and as the vigil progresses, the Church is flooded with light representing new life. It is at the Easter Vigil that the Catechumen and the Elect receive the sacraments of initiation as full members of the Catholic Church. It is a spiritually uplifting experience. Consider being a part of this most holy and inspirational time at St. Matthias. The music is spectacular and the effort that our Music Ministers put into the whole of the Holy Week service is very special, culminating in the Easter Vigil Service. Do not miss this annual experience which is worth every moment of this sacred night.


