



A Message From The Pastor

Dear Friends,

Last month we had a number of events that helped different segments of our parish experience God's grace and blessings. Let me make a comment on some of those:

Youth Lock-in/Retreat: Our Teen Leadership held an

overnight Lock-in/Retreat on March 21-22. There were some 25 young people and adult supervisors. The theme for this lock-in/retreat was 'Food insecurity.' Local leaders from the Franklin Food Bank came and shared with them about food insecurity in our own area, and how so many generous people are giving their time, treasure and talent to remedy this situation. They had many spiritually enriching sessions and fun activities throughout the night, without much sleep. This lock-in/retreat would not have been possible without the dedication and hard work of our Deacon John Radvanski who is truly a tireless advocate for our youth. He, together with Sue Lenczewski, our Youth Coordinator, will give us all a fuller

report of this event and acknowledge the many who deserve our gratitude.

Mass of Anointing: This annual Mass with Anointing of the Sick was held on March 22nd. Some 75 people attended and they had truly a positive experience of God's anointing and healing. This Sacrament is often misunderstood or undervalued by many. The Biblical basis for this sacrament is James 5: 14-15: "Is anyone among you sick? Let them call the elders of the church to pray over them and anoint them with oil in the name of the Lord. And the prayer offered in faith will make the sick person well; the Lord will raise them up. If they have sinned, they will be forgiven." But this original practice of anointing the sick fell into disuse and was used only when a sick person was close to death. That's why we hear this sacrament misnamed as "Last Rite." But the Second Vatican Council restored it to its original intent. Hence, we can use this Sacrament any time we are sick, or before going for any procedure or surgery. Let us have a proper understanding of this Sacrament of Anointing for healing of the sick.

40 Hour Adoration: Our Parish just completed a 40-Hour Adoration during this final year of the Eucharistic Revival – thanks to a very dedicated group of men and women of our parish who organized this first ever event in our church so meticulously. The 40 Hour devotion has been observed in the Catholic Church for many years. The response to the sign up to adore for each of the 40 Hours was tremendous. One participant emailed me: "It was my first time to experience serving as a guardian during the Eucharistic Adoration late last night. It was an experience like no other. Thank you for bringing it to St Matthias." So many others joined to pray without signing up – a clear sign of the thirst many have to experience Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament.

The culmination of all such devotions and liturgical services is experiencing the Holy Week. Beginning with Palm Sunday, we will be entering into days of solemn celebration of the most significant events of our salvation. Our music ministry has been preparing for these annual celebrations, in particular for the Easter Vigil. The exceptional way we celebrate the Saturday night service is something that many of our parishioners look forward to. Though some may feel that the length of the Easter Vigil is challenging, the reality is what so many attendees have expressed: "It flowed so beautifully that I didn't feel the length;" "It was not as long as I had thought;" "The music and the ceremonies were so heart-warming that the time just went by;" I invite you to make a special effort to attend the Easter Vigil this year, especially if you have not experienced it. You are in for a treat for your soul– no doubt ©

"HOW TO CLEAN PRACTICALLY ANYTHING?"

Consumers Report put out a little book entitled, How to Clean Practically Anything. The book tells you what solvent to use for nearly every kind of stain. Here are a few. Glycerin will remove the stain from a ball point pen. Boiling water will remove berry stains. Vinegar will remove crayon stains. To remove a rust stain from your cotton work clothes, moisten the spot with some fullstrength vinegar and then rub in a bit of salt. Ammonia will remove blood stains. Alcohol will remove grass stains. Hydrogen peroxide is good for magic marker stains. Mix a teaspoon of 3% hydrogen peroxide with a little cream of tartar or a dab of non-gel toothpaste. Rub the paste on the stain with a soft cloth. Rinse. The stain, whatever it was, should be gone. Try a little meat tenderizer to remove protein-based stains like milk, chocolate, and blood from clothes. Use bleach on mildew stains. Lemon juice works well on rust stains.

But you know what? The book lists absolutely nothing for the stain of sin. And the reason it doesn't is because there is only One Person Who can do that. Only Jesus Christ, the incarnation of Divine mercy, as described in today's gospel, forgives us our sins when we confess our sins and ask God's pardon and forgiveness.

"JESUS AND THE FALLEN WOMAN"

The woman caught in adultery described in today's Gospel has inspired a wide variety of Christian art. The most striking is "Jesus and the Fallen Woman," by Lucas Cranach, the Younger (c. 1570), now exhibited, as is Rembrandt's "Return of the Prodigal Son," in The Hermitage at St. Petersburg. At the front center of the painting are Jesus and the woman. Cranach captures that moment when Jesus turns toward the accusers and challenges those without sin to cast a stone. His expression is stern but troubled, and his right hand reaches out toward the woman. Most remarkable, the woman is not bowed to the ground in front of Jesus as in much art work, but is standing at his left. She is very young, with eyes closed, looking forlorn and resigned to her fate. Her head is inclined toward Jesus' shoulder, and her hand rests on his arm. Most striking, as one follows the lines of the painting, is that her right hand is entwined with the left hand of Jesus in a gesture of exquisite tenderness. The hands of mercy are joined to the hands of a suffering person facing execution.

Jesus and the young woman in Cranach's painting can be our guides through Lent and Paschaltide. With heads inclined toward Christ and hands intertwined with his, we can go forward as forgiven sinners yet called to be companions of Jesus. We have no right to judge others: We have no right to judge others because we often commit the very faults we condemn, we are often partial and prejudiced in our judgment and we do not know the circumstances which have led someone to sin. Hence, let us leave the judgment to our just and merciful God who reads people's hearts. We should show mercy and compassion to those who sin because we ourselves are sinners in need of God's forgiveness. The apostle Paul reminds us: "But if we judged ourselves, we would not come under judgment." (1 Cor 11:31).



DIVINE MERCY ON CHUCK COLSON

Probably, Chuck Colson (Charles Chuck Wendell Colson, 1931-2012) got inspiration from John Profumao to make a similar restitution for his sin and restoration of his life when he was imprisoned for seven months in the federal Maxwell Prison in Alabama for acting as President Nixon's "hatchet man "in the Water Gate Scandal. After his prison period, he became an Evangelical Christian leader who founded Prison Fellowship and Breakpoint. He was the founder and chairman of The Chuck Colson Center for Christian Worldview, which is "a research, study, and networking center for growing in a Christian worldview", and while he was alive included Colson's daily radio commentary, Break Point, which was heard in its original format on more than 1,400 outlets across the United States. Colson was a principal signer of the 1994 Evangelicals and Catholics Together ecumenical document signed by leading Evangelical Protestants and Roman Catholic leaders in the United States.

Today's gospel describes how Jesus restored a sinner woman by lavishing his Divine mercy and forgiveness. She should have become Christ's follower bearing witness to his mercy till her death. We need to become forgiving people, ready for reconciliation: Jesus has shown inexhaustible mercy and compassion to sinners by dying for our sins. But we are often self-righteous like the Pharisees, and ready to spread scandal about others with a bit of spicy gossip. We are judgmental about the unmarried mother, the alcoholic, the drug addict and the shop-lifter, ignoring Jesus' command: "Let the one among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her." Let us learn to acknowledge our sins, ask God's forgiveness every day and extend the same forgiveness to our erring brothers and sisters. We too should learn to hate the sin and love the sinners showing them mercy, compassion, sympathy and acceptance, leading them to noble ways by our own exemplary lives

CAN YOU GIVE A SECOND CHANCE?

Dr. A.J. Cronin was a great Christian physician in England. One night he assigned a young nurse to a little boy who had been brought to the hospital suffering from diphtheria, and given only a slight chance to live. A tube was inserted into the boy's throat to help him breathe. It was the nurse's job periodically to clean out the tube. As the nurse sat beside the boy's bed, she accidentally dozed off. She awakened to find that the tube had become blocked. Instead of following instructions, she was immobilized by panic. Hysterically she called the doctor from his home. By the time he got to the boy, he was dead. Dr. Cronin was angry beyond expression. That night Dr. Cronin went to his office and wrote his recommendation to the board demanding the immediate expulsion of the nurse. He called her in and read it, his voice trembling with anger. She stood there in pitiful silence, a tall, thin, gawky Welsh girl. She nearly fainted with shame and remorse. "Well," asked Dr. Cronin in a harsh voice, "have you nothing to say for yourself?" There was more silence. Then she uttered this pitiful plea, "...please give me another chance." Dr. Cronin sent her away. But he could not sleep that night. He kept hearing some words from the dark distance: "Forgive us our trespasses." The next morning Dr. Cronin went to his desk and tore up the report. In the years that followed he watched as this slim, nervous girl became the head of a large hospital and one of the more honored nurses in England.

Thank God for a second chance, and a third chance, and fourth chance! We need to become forgiving people, ready to trust them to do better if given another chance. Jesus has shown inexhaustible mercy and compassion to sinners by dying for our sins. But we are often self-righteous like the Pharisees, and ready to spread scandal about others with a bit of spicy gossip. We are judgmental about the unmarried mother, the alcoholic, the drug addict and the shop-lifter, ignoring Jesus' command: "Let the one among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her." Let us learn to acknowledge our sins, ask God's forgiveness every day and extend the same forgiveness to our erring brothers and sisters. We too should learn to hate the sin and love the sinners showing them mercy, compassion, sympathy and acceptance, leading them to noble ways by our own exemplary lives.

"Where was the Garden of Eden?"

Dr. Carlyle Marney was asked a question by one of his freshman students one day. The student asked, "Where was Eden?" Dr. Marney put down his pen, turned to the college freshman, and replied, "I can tell you exactly, in Tennessee." "What?" gasped the student. "Knoxville, Tennessee, 215 South Elm Street," Marney insisted. "It was there on Elm Street, when I was a boy, that I stole a quarter out of Mama's purse and ran to the store and bought a bag of peanut clusters and ate it as fast as I could. Afterward, I was so ashamed that I came back home to 215 Elm Street and hid in the closet. Mom found me and asked, 'Why are you hiding? What have you done?'" ["Geography Lesson," Herald of Holiness, February 1996, p. 2]. I personally don't think anybody needs help locating their own Eden, do you? That's the place where we first knowingly betrayed and disobeyed God. Our Eden is that situation or that place where we first discovered that we suffer from the same disease as Adam and Eve and every other human being in existence. We suffer from the debilitating symptoms of sin. Now, pick up a stone. Hold the stone in your hand and think about your Eden. Hold the stone in your hand and wrap that thought, that memory, that time of Eden in your life around the stone. Those moments stick with us and weigh us down and drag us down and slow us down and bring us down. But here's the Good News. We don't have to be weighed down by the weight of sin, God wants to lift us up. The God Jesus revealed to us is a God who patiently waits for His wayward children to come back home.

A special thank you to all who participated in our Sacrament Retreats on March 23rd. There is only one word that expresses and sums up all the wonderful feedback received and that is JOY! We prayed, we learned, we laughed, we shared, but most importantly we felt Joy in our Lord and each other.

WHY CHURCH PROMOTES "CONFESSION"

Last week we saw the first two of the 10 Benefits of the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Here are the rest (compiled by Sr. Mary Ann Walsh, former Director of Media Relations at the USCCB):

- 3. A balm for the desire for revenge. When you have been forgiven you can forgive others. If the
- perfect Jesus forgives me, who am I to want to avenge the slights in my life. Think: "Why did they promote him over me?" or "Mom played favorites!"
- 4. Low cost therapy. It's free, which makes it cheaper than a psychiatrist for dealing with guilt.
- 5. Forced time to think. Socrates said that the unexamined life is not worth living. To examine our lives and acknowledge failings marks the first step of making things right with God, others and ourselves. Life can be more worth living when you ponder the meaning of your own life.
- 6. Contribution toward world peace. Gaudium et Spes, the Second Vatican Council's Pastoral Constitution on the Church in the Modern World, said that the imbalances in the world that lead to war and tensions "are linked with that more basic imbalance which is rooted in the heart of man." Peace of soul leads to peace of heart leads to peace beyond oneself.
- 7. A better neighborhood. Confession leaves you feeling good about yourself, thereby cutting back the inclination to road rage and aggressive shopping cart driving. With the grace of the sacrament you're energized to, as Jesus said to the woman caught in adultery, "go and sin no more."
- 8. Realistic self-perception. Confession helps overcome arrogance when you have to admit you're as much of a sinner as anyone else. It helps build tolerance for others' perceived shortcomings.
- 9. One more benefit of being Catholic. There are lots of benefits, including a sense of community, liturgical rites to help us encounter God in prayer, and the wonderful sense of humanity exemplified in the saints, from Mary, the loving Mother of God, to Augustine, the exasperating son of Monica. The sacrament that leads us to inner peace is among the greatest boons.
- 10. Closeness to God. Confession helps you realize that you have a close connection to God and receive his grace through the sacraments. What can be better than knowing God's on your team, or, to be less arrogant about it, that you are on God's.

All funds raised through this collection will be used exclusively to assist our retired priests.

Thank you for your generosity. Please keep all of our priests in your daily prayers. Please also continue to pray for vocations from our local Church to the holy priesthood for service in our diocese.






