

## **From Our Pastor**

#### Dear Friends,

Today we are very happy to welcome Deacon Enock Berluche Sr. to our parish for the Mission Appeal, as part of the Missionary Cooperation Plan assigned from the Mission Office of our Diocese. He is a permanent deacon serving at the Parish of Sts. Philip and James in Phillipsburg in various roles: spiritual director



for the Legion of Mary, moderator for the charismatic prayer group, coordinator of the Eucharistic adoration, and other pastoral apostolates. He is co-coordinator of African-American, Black and Caribbean Apostolate. He preaches Mission Appeal for Franciscans in Action and Source de Vie organizations for Haiti Missions. We warmly welcome him to our community.

This Tuesday is the Feast of the Assumption of Mary – a Holy Day of Obligation. Catholics are questioned probably more about our devotion to Mary than any other matter of our faith. Referring to the historical development of this dogma both in the East and the West, St. John Paul II has said: "The first trace of belief in the Virgin's Assumption can be found in the apocryphal accounts entitled Transitus Mariae [Latin, "The Crossing Over of Mary"], whose origin dates to the second and third centuries. There was a long period of growing reflection on Mary's destiny in the next world. This gradually led the faithful to believe in the glorious raising of the Mother of Jesus, in body and soul, and to the institution in the East of the liturgical feasts of the Dormition ["falling asleep"—i.e., death] and Assumption of Mary. Although the New Testament does not explicitly affirm Mary's Assumption, it offers a basis for it because it strongly emphasized the Blessed Virgin's perfect union with Jesus' destiny. There are, thus, passages in Scripture that resonate with the Assumption, even though they do not spell it out."

We need to be convinced of a couple of points about our relationship to Mary:

1. Devotion to Mary does not mean that we worship her as many non-Catholics mistakenly think. Anyone can be devoted to another person, a career, a job or place; but that doesn't mean it becomes your god.

2. Devotion implies a loyalty and trust in a person. We respect Mary as our human model of faith and heroic living that can help us navigate our own life's challenges.

3. Both in the gospel and in all the Marian apparitions throughout the ages, she always calls us to her son Jesus Christ. Her message essentially is: "Do whatever He tells you" (John 2:5)

4. Excessive devotional practices have led to some misperceptions about Mary and so the Church has given us guidelines for a balanced Marian devotion based on Scripture and Tradition.

5. Hence the question we can reflect on this feast of the Assumption is: what is its relevance for us today? One answer is that it gives us further validation to our hope in eternal life, a truth affirmed by the life and teachings of Jesus Christ who is the Risen Lord. Therefore doing "whatever He tells us" will lead us there!



This Tuesday is the Feast of the Assumption of Mary: we honor her important role in Jesus' life from her initial "Yes" to her presence with the apostles after his death. Although we don't expect to be assumed into heaven, spouses sometimes get into trouble by assuming they know what the other thinks. Don't mind- read? Check it out with words.

#### Called or not, God is Present!

Above the office door of the Swiss psychiatrist, Carl Jung (1875-1961), hung a stone plaque inscribed with the words: Called or Not, God is Present. Jung's sign encapsulated in a few words what the joint testaments of Judaism and Christianity have put forth in hundreds of thousands of words for centuries, viz., that the transcendent almighty God chooses to be with humankind, to commune with us, to love and move among us, to be near, to abide, to be present whether called or not, in peace, as well as in panic. God's presence is a dynamic divine presence, ever communing, ever revealing, ever abiding, ever calling, and ever drawing near.

This Sunday's first reading relates the experience of the prophet Elijah who sought and realized the presence of God in the peaceful silence of Horeb (Sinai). Peter and the disciples (gospel) experienced the presence of God in the person of Jesus whose power over the sea calmed their panic and fostered their faith. Paul, in the second reading from Romans, lamented the fact that not all of his fellow Israelites had come to know the saving presence of God as he had, on the road to Damascus.

# Are your thoughts on God or on your Problems?

There is a story about the famous statesman Bismarck who came into a friend's house and saw a portrait of himself on display in the friend's parlor. The picture portrayed Bismarck as a strong and forceful man. Bismarck shook his head and asked, "Is that supposed to be me? It can't be." Then he turned around to a picture his friend had of the fearful Simon Peter sinking beneath the waves and said, "That is I!" That is how we feel when we take our eves off of Christ. Dr. Norman Vincent Peale tells how he once developed laryngitis because he worried about a speaking engagement at which he would be speaking to over a thousand people. When he sought medical help, his doctor said, 1 didn't think I would ever have to give this kind of

advice to Norman Vincent Peale: Focus your thoughts on God, don't focus them on your problems...when you focus on your problems, your nervous system tightens up so your blood doesn't flow harmoniously. As a result, you experience sickness. Focus your thoughts on God instead of on your problems..."

#### Lessons from Working at a Mental Health Hotline

... When Peter saw how strong the wind was he became frightened; and, beginning to sink, he cried out, "Lord, save me!" Immediately Jesus stretched out his hand and caught Peter, and said to him, "O you of little faith, why did you doubt?" Matthew 14: 22-33

It was the hotline volunteer's first call. "Oh my, you picked up the phone." The caller sounded genuinely surprised and held her breath for a moment before telling her story. For more than a year, she and her husband had been trapped in their home by their 25-year-old son, who suffered from psychotic episodes. He refused any treatment, he had been making threats, and most nights he holed up in his room doing drugs while his parents tried to sleep behind their double-locked bedroom door.

"Is there someone who can come out to help us?" she said. "I mean, what do we do?" Taking that call was science writer Benedict Carey. For more than 20 years, Carey reported on mental health for **The New York Times** and **The Los Angeles Times.** Carey fielded queries from readers asking for guidance, advice, referrals — or who just wanted five minutes to talk. Carey discovered that thousands of families every year face mental health issues, with no one to talk to for help.

Carey took his experience to a new nonprofit mental organization in Asheville, North Carolina. The Mental Health GPS provides what it calls "navigation" services: trained call takers listen to the stories of those who call and then consult a bank of up-to-date databases of appropriate, vetted options — therapists, clinics, detox programs, peer support or whatever is needed. If those contacts don't pan out, the caller can call back and get more options. The service is confidential and independent. Writing in the **New York Times** [February 18, 2023], Benedict Carey recounts that first call:

"The call from the woman with a psychotic son . . . made me hold my breath, too. This was live, and I was no longer sitting on high, as the big-media expert. I was just the guy on the other end of the phone. I did some digging and found a local mobile crisis team trained in managing mental health emergencies. I also determined that the young man possibly

qualified for longer-term residential care, if he could be persuaded to go. Two options only but two more than she had before." "At the end of the day and the beginning of the next, this is human work," Carey notes. No one can replace "the experience of people who have been through the fire shower of a mental health or substance use problem. These people, known in mental health circles as peers, understand the system from the inside and the frustration of trying to find decent care. GPS call takers are mostly peers, people solidly in recovery who, in effect, are taking calls from versions of their former selves." Carey acknowledges that the American mental health system is in need of reform: more and better mental health care hospitals, improving youth services especially at schools and universities, expanded insurance reimbursement. All fine ideas, Benedict Carey says, "but for now, let's at least give people someone knowledgeable to talk to.

The work of crisis line volunteers and "peers" who give of their time and experience is the extended hand of Christ to the "Peters" among us foundering in pain and hurt. In the embrace of our spouses and families, in the concern and help of faithful friends, in the counsel of wise pastors and teachers. Jesus reaches out to save us in the darkest times: in the midst of the storms that batter our "boats" as we make our way across the stormy sea, Christ promises to be that calming presence, that steadying hand, if we keep faith in him who is both our guiding star and our destination. May we, in turn, be the outstretched hand of Christ for one another; may we not hesitate to take up the "human work" of creating in our homes and churches, our schools and businesses, safe harbors of understanding and support for everyone struggling to keep their heads above the waters of life's turbulent seas; may we put our own experiences and hard-won expertise at the service of those encountering the same challenges and crises we've confronted in our own sea crossings.

#### The Young Pastor who wanted to retire!

One upon a time a battered parish priest approached his bishop. "I want to retire," he said. "You're not old enough to retire." "Yeah, but I'm worn out. My laity are fighting one another, my young people don't come to Church. My parish Council has no guts. My teenagers drink too much. My staff members are in constant conflict. A couple of women are trying to take over the parish. Men can't stand the tension. My collections are down. Spies are reporting me to you every week. Grammar school kids are breaking windows and writing graffiti. I receive anonymous hate mail every day." The bishop sighed loudly, that West of Ireland sigh which suggests the advent of a serious asthmas attack. "Let me tell you about my problems." The two men sat in silence for a few minutes after they had exchanged woes. Then the Bishop said:

"Well, congratulations on having a lively parish. It's still alive and kicking and Jesus is active in your parish boat calming the sea." So, the pastor went back to his parish resolving to walk on the stormy parish sea with Jesus. He did not resign.

#### An old story about trustful faith

In the middle of a dark winter's night in a small Midwest farming community, the two-story home of a young family caught fire. Quickly, parents and children followed their wellpracticed emergency plan and made their way through the smoke-filled home out into the front yard. There the father quickly counted heads and realized that their 5 year-old son was not among them. Suddenly he heard a wail and looked up to see the boy at his bedroom window, crying and rubbing his eyes. Knowing the danger of reentering the house to rescue his son, the father called, "Jump, Son! I'll catch you!" Between sobs, the boy responded to the voice he knew so well. "But, I can't see you, Daddy!" The father answered with great assurance. "No, Son, you can't see me, but I can see you! Jump!" At that, the boy jumped into the smoky darkness and found himself safely cradled in his father's arms.

Our scripture today is about trusting - about having faith about being able to discern the fact that our God is always with us, even in storms of life. The challenge of trusting faith is what Peter began with, but he looked at the raging waves and got scared. While we might emphasize Peter's fear, his sinking and his "little" Faith, we need to look also at his leap of Faith. Peter represents all who dare to believe that Jesus is Savior, take their first steps in confidence that Jesus is able to sustain them, and then forget to keep their gaze fixed on him when they face storms of temptations. From the depth of crisis, however, they remember to call on the Savior, and they experience the total sufficiency of his grace to meet their needs. It is this type of "little Faith" of Peter which Jesus later identifies as the rock on which he will build his Church. The only Faith Jesus expects of his followers is a Faith which concentrates solely on him. In other words, when we simply heed Our Lord, we can do great things. So, with His grace, we have to raise our awareness of God's presence in our lives. As we become more aware, we will step out and proclaim that presence, even in surprising places.

# The First Female doctor in the US walked on water!

For Elizabeth Blackwell "walking on water" meant something entirely different. Elizabeth wanted to become a doctor in the 1840s. At the time, medical schools were only for men. Elizabeth Blackwell had to fight just to get in. Finally, at one school, Geneva College of Medicine in New York, the students voted to let her in as a joke. But the head of the school didn't know it was supposed to be a joke, and he let her in. Blackwell faced discrimination and obstacles in college: professors forced her to sit separately at lectures and often excluded her from labs; local townspeople shunned her as a "bad" woman for defying her gender role. Blackwell eventually earned the respect of professors and classmates, graduating first in her class in 1849. She continued her training at London and Paris hospitals, though doctors there relegated her to midwifery or nursing. She began to emphasize preventative care and personal hygiene, recognizing that male doctors often caused epidemics by failing to wash their hands between patients. In 1851, Dr. Blackwell returned to New York City, where discrimination against female physicians meant few patients and difficulty practicing in hospitals and clinics. With help from Quaker friends, Blackwell opened a small clinic to treat poor women; in 1857, she opened the New York Infirmary for Women and Children with her sister Dr. Emily Blackwell and colleague Dr. Marie Zakrzewska. Its mission included providing positions for women physicians. During the Civil War, the Blackwell sisters trained nurses for Union hospitals. In 1868, Blackwell opened a medical college in New York City. A year later, she placed her sister in charge and returned permanently to London, where in 1875, she became a professor of gynecology at the New London School of Medicine for Women. She also helped found the National Health Society and published several books, including an autobiography, Pioneer Work in Opening the Medical Profession to Women (1895).

We all experience storms of sorrow, storms of doubt, tension and uncertainty, storms of anxiety and worries, storms of anger and despair, storms of temptations. Storms reveal to us our inability to save ourselves and point us to the infinite ability of God to save us. When Jesus shows up in our life's storms, we find that we gain strength to do the seemingly impossible.

# From the Pastoral Staff

What is your "Faith Forecast", and How can you make a positive impact with our Youth?

As I write this article today's weather forecast is predicting heavy rains, thunderstorms, and possibly two tornadoes! I'm thinking I better write this article fast before I lose power or the internet! I'm also thinking that regardless of the weather outcome, God will see us through any storm, and someone reading this article will be an answer to my prayer for help- which is my faith forecast!

What about you? When you encounter a storm in life – maybe caused by weather, health, relationships, or selfdoubt, what do you predict your faith forecast will be? Do you believe that whatever boat you're in, that Jesus will help you even when you have "little faith"?

Regardless of our age or circumstances, we either have already weathered many storms, are now caught in a bad storm, or fearing there'll be some in a future forecast. When our life becomes "stormy" it can affect us spiritually and mentally.

Springtide Research Institute has performed extensive research and provides forecasting regarding the inner and outer lives of young people ages 13 to 25. They provide great resources to help turn the tide when it comes to mental health. Gen Z, and religious/ spiritual life. I would like to share two insights as a means to motivate you to consider how you might support our youth in terms of Connection and Participation which are core objectives in our SMYLE Ministry -St. Matthias Youth Living **Evangelization.** 

"Connection is not just about whom a young person has contact with and how often. Although seeing friends, family, and neighbors regularly is important, what equally impacts a young person's mental health is the quality of those connections. Young people who report having meaningful relationships are less likely to suffer from mental illness, and they report higher rates of mental and emotional wellness. Faith communities can play a significant role in ensuring that young people have opportunities to build deep relationships."

"Participation is the second of two key tools for encouraging young people's faith exploration. For participation to be genuine and helpful, young people must feel guided (not forced) and challenged (not defeated) ... This means providing ways for young people to serve and lead, and helping them navigate questions of faith and how those interact with the things they care about."

Our youth desire to be noticed, named, known, and non-judgmentally accepted as they navigate the many storms of their life. Currently at St. Matthias we need more adults to get onboard our Youth Ministry boat named SMYLE! This weekend, we have our junior-high and high school youth speaking at all the Masses.
