

From Our Pastor

Dear Friends,

Last Sunday you heard four members of our youth ministry SMYLE address us after Holy Communion. (You must know by now that SMYLE stands for St. Matthias Youth Living Evangelization.) Thank you to those who responded to their invitation to volunteer some time to help with our youth ministry. One thing that all of the four



teens – Abigail Joseph, Emily Chavez, Isabel McGuire and James Nonaillada – told us was very significant: "Youth Ministry is a safe place to be ourselves. It is filled with real people from different backgrounds, ages, experiences, and issues. With the help of God, this diverse group thrives as a family, and every youth deserves to be a part of this family."

Yes, though diverse, we are one family. That is also the theme in the readings of this Sunday. The vision God has put forward in Isaiah was something unthinkable for the Jews of that time and may not be easily acceptable even for us: that the foreigners or pagans are welcome and their burnt offerings and sacrifices will be acceptable on the altar of God because "my house shall be called a house of prayer for all people" (Isaiah 56:6-7).

This was the experience of the incredible number of young people at the World Youth Day two weeks ago in Lisbon, Portugal. This largest Catholic event surpassed expectations with 1.5 million pilgrims joining Pope Francis for the closing Mass on August 6. Can you imagine such a mammoth crowd of Catholics in one place - singing, praising, praying, dancing and celebrating with Pope Francis and other leaders? It was an electrifying experience for them, suffused with so much joy, excitement and spiritual fervor. Young adults from different parts of the US have shared their experience on various platforms. Here are just two:

Stacy Escobar, 26, from Arlington, VA, said that one of her favorite moments from the trip was during an outdoor Eucharistic adoration event set up specifically for travelers from the United States: "That was probably one of the most beautiful moments of Eucharistic adoration I have ever seen. The host was glowing in the monstrance. It was beautiful. The sunset was amazing. And just seeing everybody and all the international flags, the diversity was just beautiful."

Savannah Dudzik, 22, from Tampa, FL, said that one of the most memorable moments was seeing Pope Francis up close: "We were within a few feet of him. Seeing Pope Francis was incredible because in what other situation do a million people get so excited to see a man who's in his 8os? It's because it has to be something more ... He's witnessing to the word of God. That's why we're so excited." Then she added: "World Youth Day showed the Catholic youth that the Catholic Church is truly universal."

I have asked our own parishioners who attended the WYD 2023 to share with us their insights or takeaways from this unforgettable event. May we become more of a welcoming community, respecting and celebrating our diversity.

RELIGIOUS FANATICISM

Fanatical attitudes and behavior are in every religion. Some Catholics did not accept the decision of Pope Benedict XVI to resign and continued to think of him as the real Pope as they did not like Pope Francis. So Benedict himself had to chide them: "Some of my more fanatical friends have not accepted my choice; There is only one Pope and that is Pope Francis!"

A Jewish professor of psychology said of his tradition, "If there are ten Jewish males in a city, we create a synagogue. If there are eleven Jewish males, we start thinking about creating a competing synagogue." A Baptist police officer had a similar tale. He said, "One Baptist family in a neighborhood witnesses until they bring another family to Christ. Then they form a Church, and start witnessing to the rest of the community. When another family joins, they have a schism and form a rival Church." According to a Presbyterian homemaker, her

communion was a little like vegetable soup. "We have," she said, "the OPs, RPs, BPs, and Split Peas!" And a Methodist businessman complemented these tales with an apocryphal tale of a man from his Faith community who had been shipwrecked for years on a small island. When found by a passing ship, rescuers asked him why he had constructed three huts, since he was there by himself. "Well," he replied, "that one is my home, that one is my Church, and that one is my former Church." Today's Gospel tells us how Jesus extended his healing mission to the Gentiles too. No one is excluded from the Kingdom of God.

"YES, BUT NOT WITH THAT BUNCH!"

Billy Graham once told of an incident that happened a long time ago when teachers could talk about religion in the classroom. A teacher was talking to her class of young boys, and she asked, "How many of you would like to go to Heaven?" And all the hands instantly shot into the air at once, except one. She was astounded. She asked, "Charlie, you

mean you don't want to go to Heaven?" He said, "Sure, I want to go to Heaven, but not with that bunch!"

Unfortunately, that is how many religious groups feel about one another. Consider the Middle East: in parts of Lebanon, Christian militias fighting each other and in Syria and Iraq extremist Muslims driving all Christians from their territories on pain of death, unless they convert; and the never-ending conflict between Arabs and Jews.... All three great Faiths in that part of the world trace their origins through the patriarch Abraham. All three of them honor the Mosaic Law. All three are monotheistic. And yet as the political walls of this world come tumbling down, the religious walls seem to grow higher and higher. How tragic. Today's Gospel tells us how Jesus healed the daughter of a Gentile woman in spite of the religious prejudice of his fellow Jews towards the Gentiles.

"WHO IS YOUR MOST FAVORITE CHILD?"

A professor of mine once told me the following story: I'm one of thirteen children. One day when I was playing in the street of our hometown, I got thirsty and came into the house for a glass of water. My father had just come home from work for lunch. He was sitting at the kitchen table with a neighbor. A door separated the kitchen from the pantry and my father did not know I was there. The neighbor said to my father, "Joe, there's something I wanted to ask you for a long time. You have thirteen children. Out of all is there one that is your favorite, one that you love more than all the others?" I had pressed my ear against the door hoping against hope it would be me. My father said: "That's easy. That's Mary the twelve-year-old. She has got braces on her teeth and feels so awkward and embarrassed that she won't go out of the house any more. Oh, but you asked about my favorite. That's my twenty-three-year-old Peter. His fiancée just broke their engagement and he is desolate. But the one I really love most is little Michael. He's totally uncoordinated and terrible in any sport he tries to play. But of course, the apple of my eye is Susan. Only twenty-four, living in her own apartment, and developing a drinking problem, I cry for Susan. But I guess of all the kids.... and my father went on mentioning each of us thirteen children by name.

The professor ended his story saying: "What I learned was that the one my father loved most was the one who needed him most at that time. And that's the way the Father of Jesus is: He loves those most who need Him most, who rely on Him, depend on Him, and trust Him in everything. All that matters is trust. God doesn't wait until we have our moral life straightened out before He starts loving us." (Brennen Manning, taken from Lion and Lamb)

"Violins of Hope"

... a Canaanite woman of that district came and called out, "Have pity on me, Lord, Son of David! My daughter is tormented by a demon..." [Jesus] said in reply, "I was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel... It is not right to take the food of the children and throw it to the dogs." She said, "Please, Lord, for even the dogs eat the scraps that fall from the table of their masters." Matthew 15: 21-28

Amnon Weinstein and his son Avshalom are master violin makers. Two decades ago, a man came to the Weinsteins with an old violin that he wanted repaired for his grandchild. The man explained that he had played the violin when he was being held in a Nazi concentration camp during the Holocaust. When Amnon opened the violin, he found black powder inside — ash from the camp's crematorium. That violin was the beginning of "Violins of Hope," a collection of 70 restored string instruments that the Weinsteins have lovingly repaired and restored that were played by Jewish musicians before and during the Holocaust. They've also been able to preserve many of the stories behind the instruments. Among them: A violin made by the famous Dutch Jewish violin maker Jacob Hakkert who died at Auschwitz in 1944. A violin owned by an Italian woman who was sent to Auschwitz. Her son managed to take the violin with him to a labor camp where he would play it at night with frozen fingers. After the war, he studied engineering and went on to build ships to transport and settle Jews in Palestine.

After his death in 2012, his widow and daughters gave the instrument to Violins for Hope. The violin owned by Erich Weininger, a butcher in Vienna as well as an amateur violinist. Though not allowed to play in the camps, he, too, managed to hold on to his instrument. Weininger survived imprisonment at Dachau and Buchenwald. After the war, he settled in Palestine where he played in a small orchestra with other deportees. Another instrument survived a heartbreaking journey. In 1942, a train transporting Jews from Paris to concentration camps in the East stopped along a road. A man heard workmen speaking French. The man cried out, "In the place I now go — I don't need a violin. Here, take my violin so it may live!" The man threw his violin out the railcar's narrow window and one of the workers picked it up. Years later the instrument was found in an attic and given to Violins for Hope.

The collection travels around the world where the instruments are played in concerts — many are played by the descendants of victims and survivors of the Holocaust. There are also exhibits and educational programs on the history of the Holocaust told through the

stories of these instruments. A student in Chicago whose great grandparents were Holocaust survivors played one of the violins. "It was definitely an emotional experience," she said. "As I was playing, I thought of all the people who came before me."

The work of Violins of Hope preserves the memory and dignity of those who endured the horror of the Holocaust. The instruments preserved by the Weinsteins should inspire our world with hope that the "music" of God's Spirit of peace and justice will not be silenced by the merchants of hate and violence. Jesus' encounter with the Canaanite woman is a sign of that same hope, challenging us to transform our own perspective of those we dismiss as less than we are because of their culture, language, gender or faith. May our eyes and spirits be open to see every man, woman and child as God sees them: as God's beloved children, brothers and sisters to one another, all made in the image of God, all embraced within the heart of God.

"Never give up!"

Many years ago in Illinois, a young man with six months schooling to his credit ran for an office in the legislature. As might have been expected, he was beaten. Next he entered business but failed in that too, and spent the next seventeen years paying the debts of his worthless partner. He fell in love with a charming lady, they became engaged – and she died. He had a nervous breakdown. He ran for Congress and was defeated. He then tried to obtain an appointment to the U.S. Land Office but didn't succeed. He became a candidate for the Vice-Presidency and lost. Two years later he was defeated in a race for the Senate. He ran for President and finally was elected. That man was Abraham Lincoln. It took Winston Churchill three years to get through the eighth grade, because he couldn't pass English! Ironically, he was asked many years later to give the commencement address at Oxford University. His now famous speech consisted of only three words: "Never give up!"

Today's Gospel episode of healing gives us the same message in a more powerful way. We need to persist in prayer with trustful confidence. Although the essential parts of prayer are adoration and thanksgiving, the prayer of petition plays a big part in most people's daily life. We cannot provide, by our unaided selves, for our spiritual and temporal needs. Christ himself has told us to ask him for these needs: "Ask and you shall receive." Asking with fervor and perseverance proves that we have the "great faith" we need to receive all that Christ wants to grant us in response to our requests. We must realize and remember that we do not always get exactly what we ask for, but rather what God knows we need, what He wants for us and what is really best for us. What we need most are the peace and security that come from being in harmony with God's will for us. As Christians, we also know that our particular request may not always be for our good, or for the final good of

the person for whom we are praying. In that case, the good God will not grant what would be to our, or their, eternal harm. But if the prayer is sincere and persevering, we will always get an answer – one which is better than what we asked for.

"Are you waiting to speak to one of us?"

Here are a couple of stories about Dorothy Day, the founder of the Catholic Worker Movement, demonstrating how she valued each human being as a child of God and hence as important. A reporter came to interview her at her office on 4th Street in Manhattan. He could see her talking to a man who was either drunk or mentally ill. Time passed and the reporter grew impatient. Dorothy finally appeared and said, "Are you waiting to speak to one of us?" Obviously, Dorothy did not think that she was more important than the person she was talking with. On another occasion a woman came in and donated a diamond ring to the Catholic Worker. Her coworkers wondered what Dorothy would do with it. If she asked one of them to take it to a diamond merchant and sell it, it would buy a month's worth of rice and other food items for a poor family. That afternoon, however, Dorothy gave the diamond ring to an old woman who lived alone and often came to Dorothy for meals. "That ring would have paid her rent for the better part of a year," someone protested. Dorothy replied that the woman had her dignity. So she could sell it if she liked and spend the money for rent, a trip to the Bahamas, or keep the ring to admire. "Do you suppose," Dorothy asked, "God created diamonds only for the rich?"

Dorothy Day was one of the prophets of her day. Her vision allowed her to see all human beings as equal - no one distinguishable from another. She recognized, as Mother Teresa did, the mark of the children of God in everyone, in the same way Jesus recognized God's child in the Canaanite woman who belonged to a race inimical to the Jews. We need to pull down our walls of separation and share in the universality of God's love: Very often we set up walls which separate us from God and from one another. Today's Gospel reminds us that God's love and mercy are extended to all who call on him in faith and trust, no matter who they are. In other words, God's care extends beyond the boundaries of race and nation to the hearts of all who live, and God's house should become a house of prayer for all peoples. It is therefore fitting that we should pray that the walls which our pride, intolerance and prejudice have raised, may crumble. Next, we have to be grateful to God for all the blessings we enjoy. As baptized members of the Christian community, we have been given special privileges and easy access to God's love. But we also have serious responsibilities arising from these gifts. One of these responsibilities is to make clear to others, with true humility and compassion, that God's love, mercy and healing are for them also because they too are the children of God.

They are prepared academically, socially, and psychologically to join the multicultural/multi-tribal environment of secondary school. The Center supports and assists them as they progress from secondary school, vocational training, and diploma/certificate courses to university education.

Sr. Mary will speak at the 10 a.m. Mass on September 3, followed by a reception in the cafeteria sponsored by the Rosary Altar Society.

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


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
