#### Dear Friends,

Today marks a significant milestone in my life. I was ordained a priest on December 17, 1983 in my home parish in the southern state of Kerala, India. As I looked for an apt verse as a motto for my priestly life, I was fascinated by a poem of Rabindranath Tagore, a famous Indian Nobel Laureate, poet, playwright,



composer, philosopher, social reformer and educationist. It was titled: Give Me the Strength! Here's the poem:

This is my prayer to thee, my lord,

- Strike, strike at the root of penury in my heart
- Give me the strength lightly to bear my joys and sorrows.
- Give me the strength to make my love fruitful in service.

Give me the strength never to disown the poor or bend my knees before insolent might.

Give me the strength to raise my mind high above daily trifles.

And give me the strength to surrender my strength to thy will with love. The motto I chose was a line from that poem: "Lord, give me the strength to make my love fruitful in service." As I look back at the 40 years of my priestly life, I can honestly say that I have tried my best to live this motto, despite my own human frailties and weaknesses. I'm grateful to our loving God who kept me going in all situations of my life and ministry. I was blessed to be born into a wonderful family. The faith of my parents and the role model I saw in the priests who served in our parish, planted the seeds of vocation to priesthood in my heart. Though sad to leave my parents and siblings as a teenager, I joined the seminary to become a missionary priest in the north-east of India, some 2500 miles away from home. I am grateful to all the people who came into my life, too many to name or count. I am grateful to them for their love, support, and encouragement, as I believe I too have given the same to them when they needed.

Thank you for the love, acceptance, and support I received and continue to receive from you, the people of God of St. Matthias. Thank you for your constant prayers that kept me going despite the challenges I faced. Please continue to support me with your prayers. We shall be relentless in our efforts to bring the mission of Jesus Christ to our community and to all around us. A group of our parishioners volunteered to form a Celebration Committee and put in a lot of hard work to plan and execute this celebration today. I am truly indebted to them for their love and sacrifice.

It is so providential that this celebration falls on the third Sunday of Advent which is known as 'Gaudete' Sunday. Gaudete is the Latin word meaning "rejoice." This Sunday is so named because "Rejoice" is the first word in the entrance antiphon for today's Mass taken from Philippians 4:4,5: "Rejoice in the Lord always; again I say, rejoice! The Lord is near." The third candle we light on our Advent wreath is of pink color, a joyful reminder that our salvation is near. Let us celebrate together the Lord's coming into our hearts.

#### Why is today "GAUDETE SUNDAY?"

Today is called "Gaudete Sunday" because today's Mass (in its Latin, pre-Vatican II

form), began with the opening antiphon: "Gaudete in Domino semper" -- "Rejoice in the Lord always."

In the past, when Advent was a season of penance, the celebrant of the liturgy used to wear vestments with the penitential color of purple or violet. In order to remind the people that they were preparing for the very joyful occasion of the birth of Jesus, the celebrant wore rose-colored vestments on the third Sunday. (By the way, we have a similar break--Laetare Sunday-- during the Lenten season). Today we light the rose candle, and the priest may wear rose vestments, to express our joy in the coming of Jesus, our Savior. The primary common theme running through today's readings is that of encouraging joy as we meet our need for the preparation required of us who await the rebirth of Jesus in our hearts and lives. The second common theme is that of bearing witness. The prophet Isaiah, Mary and John the Baptizer all bear joyful witness to what God has done and will do for His people.

#### Are you a Happy Christian?

There is a story told about a man from Louisville, Kentucky, who had to travel to St. Louis on business. This was years ago when Christians kept Sunday as a very special day. For this man, "keeping the Sabbath," also meant not riding the trains on Sunday. Thus, after he finished his business late Saturday night, he had to stay over in St. Louis until the following Monday morning. On Sunday morning, he left the hotel looking for a place to worship. The streets were quite deserted, but finally he saw a police officer and asked him for directions to the nearest Church. The stranger thanked the police officer for the information and was about to walk off when he turned and asked the police officer: "Why have you recommended that particular Church? It looks like a Catholic Church. There must be several Churches nearby that you could have recommended." ### Reflect

### Advent Wreath Lighting at Home, the 3<sup>rd</sup> Candle



(Assign readings among family members)

**Reader #1:** Today is the third Sunday of Advent. Advent is a time of waiting. We wait for God to send divine love and light into our dark world.

Reader #2: How does this happen?

**Reader #1:** God's light comes through Jesus, who became a human being just like you and me, so that he could show us the way back to God's divine love and light.

#### ALL: "Stir up your power, O Lord, and with great might come among us. Let your bountiful grace and mercy speedily help and deliver us, through Jesus Christ our Lord."

**Reader #3:** A reading from the prophet Zephaniah: "Jerusalem, the time is coming, when it will be said to you: 'Don't be discouraged or grow weak from fear! The LORD your God wins victory after victory and is always with you. He celebrates and sings because of you, and he will refresh your life with his love." (Zephaniah 3:16-17)

**Reader #1:** We continue to wait for the coming of Jesus. Last Sunday, we began in the dark, and then we lit two candles. Today, on the third Sunday of Advent, we light three candles.

# First, second and third candles are lit. While this is being done, the following is read:

**Reader #2:** Every week in Advent, we light another candle. Each candle that we light reminds us that the Light of the World will soon come to us in the human form of the baby Jesus, the Messiah who will show us the way back to God.

ALL: The Messiah is on the way to us. As we prepare for his coming, may we repent of our sins. May we remember our baptisms with water. May we be ready to be baptized with God's Holy Spirit and fire. May we be ready to help our Lord proclaim the good news of God's love to all people, so that the world will be filled with joy. Amen.



#### A gift of light and life

[John came] to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him . . . "I am the voice of one crying out in the desert, make straight the way of the Lord." John 1: 6-8, 19-28

When nine-year-old Tae Butler was a cancer patient at UCLA Mattel Children's Hospital, Dr. Ted Moore was her oncologist. During one of Tae's grueling four-to-six-week hospital stays for leukemia, Dr. Moore gave her a gift that changed her life: his stethoscope.

"He taught me how to use the stethoscope to listen to the heart," Tea recalls. "Instead of just coming in, listening and leaving, he was like, 'Do you want to try?' Hearing a heartbeat is so cool, especially as a kid. I always felt that he made sure that I understood what was happening."

It was during these talks with Dr. Moore that she decided to follow his example and become a pediatric oncologist. "He nurtured my creativity and curiosity," she says, "and that resulted in me choosing this path."

Seventeen years later — and cancer free — Tea, now 26, is a fourth-year medical student at UCLA — and this summer she got to work as a primary intern with the doctor who saved her life. "It is a full-circle moment," Tae says. "To see my name next to his on the patient list . . . " The moment is just as rewarding for Dr. Moore. "I see someone who has taken what could have been one of the worst tragedies and turned it into something absolutely incredible," he says. "She has the ability to understand and connect with patients. "A person like Tae only comes around once every few years. You try to keep them because you want to work with the best." And Tea soon to be Doctor Butler — still keeps the stethoscope he gave her close by.

"I hang it above my desk to remind me, 'This is what we're working for, this is our why," she says. "It fuels me, even through hard times." [People.com, August 24, 2023.]

In this season of gift-giving, Christmas calls us to give as God gives: that the most meaningful gifts we give are the gifts of affirmation, enablement, reconciliation and hope. A doctor's gift of his stethoscope to his young cancer patient is just such a gift. In this Advent season and in every season of the new year, may we bring Christ to birth in the "gifts" of light and hope we are able to humbly and lovingly give to others.

#### Joy comes from Love

## St. Teresa of Calcutta (Mother Teresa) and Advent joy:

Through her ministry in Jesus' name, Mother Teresa brought untold blessings and joy to the poor who lay unattended

and forgotten on our streets. When asked the source of her joy, Mother Teresa replied: "Joy is prayer -- joy is strength --joy is love -- joy is a net of love. . . A joyful heart is the normal result of a heart burning with love . . . loving as He loves, helping as He helps, giving as He gives, serving as He serves, rescuing as He rescues, being with Him twenty-four hours, touching Him in His distressing disguise." (Malcolm Muggeridge, Something Beautiful for God, Harper and Row, San Francisco: 1971). When Advent arrived every year, Mother Teresa's life, continued to witness the joy which is true hallmark of every Christian and the rightful inheritance of all the poor.



#### "Blessed tree of light and kindness"

Many wonderful stories and legends surround the tradition of the Christmas tree. One such legend, from Germany, recounts the story of St. Boniface, the eight-century English monk who brought the

Gospel to Germany. In one version of the story, on the night of December 24, Boniface and his monks came upon a giant oak tree, sacred to the pagan God Odin. Each year on the darkest night of the year, worshippers would gather at this sacred tree to sacrifice a young child to Odin. The people believed that the child would travel to Valhalla and present the people's praise and prayers to Odin.

Boniface was horrified. According to the legend, Boniface seized an axe and, with one blow, brought down the giant oak. The people were terrified, certain that the gods would strike Boniface dead. Boniface was prepared to pay with his life for felling the sacred tree. But nothing happened. In that moment, the worshipers realized that their gods were powerless, nonexistent.

Boniface then began to preach the Gospel of God's coming as a child. He then pointed to a nearby fir tree. "This little tree, a young child of the forest, shall be your holy tree tonight. It is the wood of peace. It is the sign of endless life, for its leaves are ever green. See how it points to heaven. Let this be called the tree of the Christ Child; gather about it, not in the wild wood, but in your own homes; there it will shelter no deeds of blood, but loving gifts and rites of kindness."

The German tribes embraced Boniface's words that Christmas Eve and began decorating their homes with evergreen, which became a symbol of the constant love of God for them in every season. Let St. Boniface's words be a blessing upon our family's Christmas tree this holiday season. May our Christmas trees, like Boniface's "home tree," be our first planting this new year of a new attitude and vision of kindness, compassion and reconciliation; may its lights continue to illuminate the "highway" we can create for the God's Christ to enter homes and hearts in every season of every year.

#### "Why are you outside?"

Henry David Thoreau was an American writer who authored the renowned essay "Civil Disobedience." He championed the freedom of the individual over the law of the land. He distinguished between "law" and "right." He wrote: "What the



majority passes is the 'law' and what the individual conscience sees is the 'right', and what matters most is the 'right' and not the 'law'." Once, Thoreau was imprisoned for a night. He had refused to pay the poll-tax as a protest against the government's support of slavery and its unjust war against Mexico, presumably in support of slave trade intentions. When he was arrested, he hoped that some of his friends would follow his example and fill the jails, and in this way persuade the government to change its stance on the issue of slavery. In this he was disappointed. Not only did his friends not join him, one friend paid the tax on his behalf and got him released the very next day. When he was in the prison, Emerson, another American writer, came to visit him. He said to Thoreau: "Thoreau, Thoreau, why are you inside (jail)?" And Thoreau replied, "Emerson, Emerson, why are you outside?" Thoreau was a great lover of truth. He suffered because he spoke and stood for truth. Emerson said in his obituary of Thoreau, "He was a great speaker and actor of truth."

Today's Gospel presents the frankness and humility of John the Baptist. John's humility: The evangelist John presents John the Baptist as the fulfillment of Isaiah 40:3, "a voice in the desert" calling for Israelites to prepare a way for the coming of Jesus. John in his Gospel takes special care to stress the fact that Jesus surpasses John the Baptist. The Baptizer declares: "I am baptizing only with water; but there is One among you--you don't recognize him--and I am not worthy to untie the straps of his shoes." There was a Rabbinic saying which stated that a disciple might do for his master anything that a servant did, except only to untie his sandals. That was too menial a service for even a disciple to render. So John said: "One is coming whose slave I am not fit to be." John's mission was only to "prepare the way." Any greatness he possessed came from the greatness of the one whose coming he foretold. John is thus the great example of the man prepared to obliterate himself for Jesus. He only pointed the way to Christ.

We currently have Oplatek wafers available in the Parish Office during regular hours for parishioners to pick up if they would like to celebrate this tradition.

### A LETTER FROM OUR ST. VINCENT DEPAUL SOCIETY MINISTRY — Be the Light

Elisa Medrano and I met a man in need of help in the Wawa parking lot (27 and Cozzens Lane). He left his partner, 13-yo son and 6-yo daughter at home in the dark. PSEG had turned to this man's account. Voila – there was light. The man off their power due to insufficient payments. Three days before the man called the Saint Vincent de Paul (SVDP) HELPLINE asking for assistance because his PSEG service was off for non-payment. The man works as a delivery driver and his employer reduced his work hours, so he was not bringing in enough to cover both rent and utility bills.

Early the next day, I called PSEG credit and billing, introducing myself as a SVDP worker from Saint Matthias, intending to ask what minimum payment amount they would require to restore service. The PSEG representative was empathetic towards SVDP because his mother had been active in this very Saint Matthias ministry.

We negotiated a reasonable turn-on amount of \$800. Our SVDP treasurer was able to authorize an electronic payment called me with thanks.

Please pray for this neighbor in Franklin. He has applied for a second job and his partner has tried to arrange childcare so she could work as a caregiver. Together they should be able to meet future family expenses.

Our ministry and those we serve are grateful to the Saint Matthias parishioners who support us with donations given through the poor boxes, through Parish Giving and in contribution envelopes. You are the LIGHT.

#### "Rejoice always. Pray without ceasing. Give thanks in all circumstances, for this is the will of God for you in Christ Jesus." – 1 thessalonians 5:16 - 18
