

### **From Our Pastor**

#### Dear Friends,

Today we celebrate the Feast of Epiphany. Our noon Mass has often been a bi-lingual Mass. Three Kings will join our entrance procession. Immediately following Mass, the Franklin High School Madrigals will perform a 1/2-hour program of Christmas music for our enjoyment. The Madrigals are an inspiring group



of young musicians from Franklin Township who sing in traditional medieval costumes.

In its Greek origin, *Epiphany* refers to God's revelation to humans. Today we focus on the wise men or magi whom later legends have named as Melchior, Casper, and Balthazar. They may have been of noble birth, educated, wealthy, and influential. Whether we agree or not with the non-biblical descriptions of them, one thing is certain: they had studied the Hebrew Scriptures, in particular, the Messianic prophecies of the Old Testament. Their study of the Scriptures led them to the Messiah and they adored him.

Reading and praying the Scriptures is the surest way to know the Messiah. The decision to do it daily is an excellent resolution for the New Year. Dietrich Bonhoeffer, the famous German Lutheran theologian and anti-Nazi dissident, described Jesus as "the man for others." He wrote: "The church is the church only when it exists for others...The church must share in the secular problems of ordinary human life, not dominating, but helping and serving." We are aware that this holiday season of Christmas, New Year, and Epiphany is a very difficult time for many people due to grieving the loss of a dear one, struggling with personal problems, and suffering from loneliness, depression, and other issues. Are we conscious of their plight?

I emailed a parishioner who was grieving the loss of her husband and assured her of my prayers and thoughts this Christmas. Her reply truly edified me: "Well, we made it through the first Christmas. Years ago, we started the practice of making sure others were not alone for the holidays. Mom had friends who had no family or family who lived far away. My husband and I would take our celebration on the road to them or pick them up with Mom to join us. This year, I invited my cousin to join us. He was divorced a couple of years ago and was not the one who wanted the divorce. He's been very sad and lonely and sometimes angry. He misses his wife and 2 children very much. After Mass, I went home and cooked dinner to bring to Mom at the Rehab. He joined us. Mom said grace. We joked about how Dad would always tease her that it was too long. We all came together each with our own sense of loss, but laughed, told stories, and had great family time. My cousin smiled. He told us the story of how he rescued an abandoned dog on the highway (he's a truck driver). God gave us the support we needed through each other."

What a wonderful testimony of a grieving and lonely person reaching out to others who are lonely! Jesus expects us to be men and women for others. He wants us to be his hands and feet, to reach out to others in understanding, love, and care.

I will be leaving this evening for India to visit my family. I will return in three weeks.



### "All the Light We Cannot See"

[The magi] were overjoyed at seeing the star and on entering the house; they saw the child and his mother. They prostrated themselves and did him homage. Matthew 2: 1-12

Netflix is currently airing a four-part adaptation of Anthony Doerr's Pulitzer Prizewinning novel **All the Light We Cannot See.** 

The hero is 16-year-old Marie-Laure, the blind daughter of the widowed master locksmith at the Museum of Natural History in Paris. Marie-Laure loses her sight at the age of six due to congenital cataracts. Her father is determined that his beloved daughter will not live a life of self-pity, so he teaches her Braille and designs intricate puzzle boxes for her to solve. Under his guidance, Marie-Laure learns to negotiate her way with her cane from their apartment to the museum and then home again. Despite her natural shyness, Marie-Laure develops a sharp, inquisitive intelligence and a steely resilience as World War II begins.

When Paris falls to the Nazis, Marie-Laure and her father flee to the town of Saint-Malo in Brittany where they take refuge with relatives. There her father constructs a detailed wooden model of the town. By touching each door, each tree, each streetlight in the model, Marie-Laure memorizes every street and landmark until she can confidently make her way around the coastal town. She counts the steps and manhole covers; she learns the sounds and smells unique to every street and place; she follows railings, cables, and hedges. The shy, blind little girl grows into a courageous and resourceful young woman. Marie-Laure's intelligence, resourcefulness and courage make her an unexpectedly effective operative for the French Resistance. She is able to see "the light" that the "seeing" world around her cannot perceive. She embraces the simple wisdom and faith of her aunt in Saint-Malo: "If God wants us to see something, we'll see it."

Epiphany celebrates the dawning of Christ, the light of God that shatters the darkness of sin and hopelessness, the light that illuminates our hearts to realize the love of God in our midst. But to "see" that love in our lives, as Marie-Laure learns, requires us to pay attention for the signs of that love: realities we do not readily perceive or understand or appreciate — or would rather ignore altogether. Too often we retreat into the safe isolation of convention or we find comfort in cold rationalizations rather than "seeing" the brokenness of our brothers and sisters or hearing the cries of the poor and needy in our midst. Like Marie-Laure's persistence in learning to "see" with the eye of her intellect and understanding, we have to look with more than just our senses but with our hearts and souls to "see" our world through God's prism of hope and possibility.

#### PAYING HOMAGE IN BETHLEHEM

The ancient texts they studied pointed them in the direction of the country of the Jews.

They searched the heavens as the sages indicated. Then, gathering precious gifts, they set out to find this king that God had raised up. The journey naturally took them to Jerusalem, the sophisticated capital city of Judaism — but the king they encountered there was the antithesis of the king they were searching for. They were redirected to Bethlehem, a small village a few miles — and another world — away. There they found the place they were looking for: a tired young mom and her little boy playing peacefully.

In their hearts, they knew they had found who they were looking for. The prophecies were fulfilled. They had followed the right star. These men — the wisest of the wise of their time — shook the dust off their boots and robes and entered the small dwelling. Humbly, they presented their gifts to the child — offerings that foretold the life that lay before this boy.

What was missing in the courts of the powerful in the city they found in a hovel in that village: humility, compassion, peace — and hope. God had entered human history as a vulnerable, happy child. Moreover, they were wise enough to realize the divine in their midst. And they did him homage.

We, too, seek God — but, more often than not, we find him in unexpected places. We insist on looking in great cathedrals when God is present in a hospital room; we are swept up in great displays of power but fail to see God's hand at work with the farmer bringing his vegetables to harvest; we are moved to tears by a magnificent oratorio but are deaf to God's joy in a giggling child. In the year ahead, may we seek God in the Bethlehems we travel and work to bring our Bethlehems' simple peace, uncomplicated justice and blessed compassion to our Jerusalems and centers of power. Let us bow in gratitude before the gift of bread on our tables; before babies; before ocean waves, sunrises and sunsets; before the poor, the vulnerable and marginalized; before all that is good and holy. For there is God, among us, in our Bethlehems.

### Always good to be reminded of Artaban the fourth Wise Man

In 1895, Henry van Dyke wrote the "Story of the Other Wise Man," a fourth wise man called Artaban. Our hero is not mentioned in the Gospel because he missed the caravan. He got to Bethlehem too late to see the baby Jesus. But Artaban did make it in time to save one of the Holy Innocents by bribing a soldier. For 33 years Artaban searched for Jesus. He did not find him. But all the while the Fourth wise man fed the hungry, helped the poor. Then one day in Jerusalem Artaban saw the "King of the Jews" being crucified. He started to offer a pearl as ransom. But then he saw a girl being sold into slavery to pay family debts. Artaban gave his pearl to buy freedom for the girl. Suddenly the earth quaked as Jesus died on the cross and a stone struck Artaban. Dying, he heard a voice saying: "When you helped the least of my children, you helped me. Meet me in heaven!" Artaban, the fourth Wise Man, had been making God present in his community for years by helping others. God asks each of us on the feast of Epiphany to be a fourth Wise Man by becoming God's epiphanies, making His love present in the world around us by our acts of love and kindness.

### THE MAGI, THE STAR AND THE THREE GIFTS

The *Magi* were not Kings, but a caste of Persian priests who served Kings using their skills in interpreting dreams and watching movements of stars. The sixth century Italian tradition that there were three Magi, Casper, Balthazar, and Melchior, is based on the fact that three gifts are mentioned in Matthew's Gospel: gold, frankincense and myrrh. The Magi may actually have been Persian priests, Babylonian astronomers, or Nabataean spice-traders. Eventually, however, they were pictured as representatives of different peoples and races. The Orthodox Church holds that the Magi consisted of twelve Kings, corresponding in number to the twelve tribes of Israel. Commentary on the Torah by Jewish rabbis suggested that a star appeared in the sky at the births of Abraham, Isaac and Moses.

Likewise, in the Book of Numbers, the prophet Balaam speaks of "a star that shall come out of Jacob." Stars were believed to be signs from God, announcing important events. Thus, the brightness of the Light to which kings were drawn was made visible in the star they followed.



**The gifts:** Gold, frankincense and myrrh may be thought of as prophesying Jesus' future. Gold was a gift for Kings; frankincense (an ancient air purifier and perfume), was offered to God in Temple worship (Ex. 30:37); and myrrh (an oriental remedy for intestinal worms in infants), was used by the High Priest as an anointing oil

(Ex. 30:23), and to prepare bodies for burial. These gifts were not only expensive but also portable. Perhaps Joseph sold the gifts to finance the Holy Family's trip to Egypt. The gifts might have been God's way of providing for the journey that lay ahead.

### WHY IS THE BAPTISM OF JESUS ON A WEEKDAY?

"When the Solemnity of the Epiphany is transferred to Sunday, if this Sunday occurs on January 7 or8, the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord is celebrated on the following Monday" (Third Roman Missal).

Hence, this year, the feast of the Baptism of the Lord is tomorrow, January 8.

This feast brings to an end the season of Christmas. The Church recalls Our Lord's second manifestation or epiphany which occurred on the occasion of His baptism in the Jordan. Jesus descended into the River to sanctify its waters and to give them the power to beget sons of God. The event takes on the importance of a second creation in which the entire Trinity intervenes.

#### In the Eastern Church this feast is

called *Theophany* because at the baptism of Christ in the River Jordan God appeared in three persons. The baptism of John was a sort of sacramental preparatory for the Baptism of Christ. It moved men to sentiments of repentance and induced them to confess their sins. Christ did not need the baptism of John. Although He appeared in the "substance of our flesh" and was recognized "outwardly like unto ourselves", He was absolutely sinless and impeccable. He conferred upon the water the power of the true Baptism which would remove all the sins of the world: "Behold the Lamb of God, behold Him Who takes away the sin of the world".

Many of the incidents which accompanied Christ's baptism are symbolical of what happened at our Baptism. At Christ's baptism the Holy Spirit descended upon Him; at our Baptism the Trinity took its abode in our soul. At His baptism Christ was proclaimed the "Beloved Son" of the Father; at our Baptism we become the adopted sons of God. At Christ's baptism the heavens were opened; at our Baptism heaven was opened to us. At His baptism Jesus prayed; after our Baptism we must pray to avoid actual sin.

#### WASH OFF THE STUFF OF THE DAY!

One of the most successful and personable people on television is Oprah Winfrey. Movies, book clubs, she does it all-huge business operations. While all the other talk shows on television are tearing people apart and putting all their illnesses



out for public humiliation, Oprah is helping put people and families back together again. . . In a *Newsweek* magazine interview the interviewer asked her, "How do you separate yourself from work?" Answer, "I take a hot bath. . . My bath is my sanctuary. (Listen to this) It's the place where I can wash off all the stuff of the day" ((Jan 8, 2001, p. 45). Baptism is a huge symbol -- it's the water of creation. . . .we are born anew. . . . life in the Spirit . . . all the "stuff" of the day is washed off. All of that is true. But at its basic level, Baptism is the death of the old self. Before anything new can be born, the old has to pass away.

And just as [Jesus] was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove on him. Mark 1: 4-11

#### **TWO SOURCES OF INSPIRATION**

Among the millions of Jews imprisoned by the Nazis in the death camps of the '30's & '40's was Victor Frankl. In spite of the horrors and the odds, he survived. Around him, next to him, each day of his ordeal, dozens, hundreds, thousands of fellow-Jews and others died. Most of them died in the ovens, of course, but there were others who died simply because they gave up hope and lost heart, overwhelmed by horror and fear and hopelessness. Frankl survived, he said, because two forces sustained him: one was the certainty of his wife's love. The other was an inner drive to rewrite the manuscript of a book he had completed after years of labor -- which the Nazis had destroyed. Frankl's imprisonment was lightened by daily imaginary conversations with his wife and by scrawling notes for his book on all the bits and scraps of paper, he could find. Now Frankl has written eloquently of these two insights to cope with life: first, the discovery and certainty of being loved, and, second, having a clear and controlling purpose in life. Eucharistic The National Eucharistic Pilgrimage (NEP) has publicly launched! **Pilgrimage** The NEP (https://www.eucharisticpilgrimage.org/) will consist of four cross-country Eucharistic processions, collectively traversing the entire continental United States over a two-month period, beginning during the feast of Pentecost, May 17-19, 2024.

The pilgrimage is being organized by the National Eucharistic Revival campaign in conjunction with Modern Catholic Pilgrim, a Catholic nonprofit dedicated to deepening the faith across the country through pilgrimages. Along the way, the pilgrims will make stops in major U.S. cities, churches, Catholic colleges, and holy sites. Parishes along the routes will host Mass, adoration, devotions, praise and worship, lectures on the Eucharist, and more.

The Seton Route, which will begin in New Haven, Connecticut, will be passing through the Diocese of Metuchen on May 27-28, 2024. The four pilgrimage processions will ultimately converge in Indianapolis on July 16, 2024, to participate in the National Eucharistic Congress. Adam Carlisle, Secretary for Evangelization and Communication, will be helping to organize our diocese's involvement.
