## From Our Pastoral Staff

I don't know if it's my age ... but it seems that time is flying by! We are just a few weeks away from the Christmas season and in less than a month, we will be celebrating Ash Wednesday. This year it falls on Valentine's Day... a day of fasting and abstention.
 Of course, Ash Wednesday is the start of the forty days of Lent and this leads us up to Holy Week and to the glorious feast of Christ's resurrection, Easter Sunday.

Right now, however, we are in the few weeks of ordinary time. A little bit of a breather between the two major feasts of Christmas and Easter. In today's Gospel, we hear Christ calling a few of the apostles to come and follow Me. He calls them to leave their fishing nets and to become fishers of Men. My sisters and brothers, we are all called to be Disciples of Christ. When we are baptized, we are automatically called to be Disciples of Christ ... To leave "our nets" behind and to be fishers of men.

Sometimes we tend to forget that not only priests, religious, and Deacons receive the call from Jesus to follow Him. We are all called. Each one's answer to that call is obviously different. Twenty-five years ago, I answered God's call to the Diaconate and will be ordained twenty years this June. Sometimes we aren't tuned in to when God is calling us. There's a little story of a man whose house was going to be flooded. The rescuers came in a rowboat to rescue him. He refused to get in saying God will save him. The water rose higher to the top floor. Again the rescuers came with a boat. Again, he refused saying God will save Him. Finally, they came by helicopter when he was on his roof. Again, he refused... giving the same answer. He perished in the flood. When he got to heaven, he asked God "Why didn't you save me? God answered, "I sent you two boats and a helicopter and you didn't listen!"

Lent is a perfect time to spend some time asking God what are you calling me in my life right now. Remember that the call could be a whisper of a feeling. For me, Lent is a time for me to sit down with the Lord and see if there is somewhere different that the Lord is calling me. It does not matter at what stage in life you are, we must listen to the possibility that God may be calling us to something new and exciting in our lives. As we get closer to Lent think about what you may do... I say do rather than give up something. I feel doing this is putting Lent in a positive rather than a negative spiritual journey. More time in prayer with the Lord is a great way to enhance your Lenten journey. Perhaps it's time to join a Lenten small faith group.
Whatever you do make this Lent the best you can and you will feel the joy of Christ's resurrection on Easter more fully.

## IT MAY NOT BE PRETTY, BUT HE CAN TEACH . . .



Jesus came to Galilee proclaiming the gospel of God. . As he passed by the Sea of Galilee, [Jesus] saw Simon and his brother Andrew casting their nets into the sea; they were fishermen.
Jesus said to them, "Come after me, and I will make you fishers of men." Then they abandoned their nets and followed him. Mark 1: 14-20

It's the first day of the fall semester. First-year college students take seats in the lecture hall for their first class in Biology 101. The professor welcomes everyone and calls the roll. He distributes the syllabus and explains the course material, the assignments, and his grading policies. The students find him engaging and approachable. Everything is off to a good start. However, before he begins the day's lecture, the professor says this:
"One more thing before we get started. "During the semester, when we meet for lecture or lab work, there will be times when I will stumble. I will slur words. It may take me a while to get the words out when answering your questions. I will fumble with my notes. I'll have to stop now and then because of a tremor in my hand or leg. And, in all probability, you'll have trouble deciphering my handwriting don't hesitate to ask me to decode. You won't offend me.
"I have Parkinson's Disease. "I've been living with Parkinson's for the past five years. It's a challenge, but it hasn't stopped me from teaching - and it shouldn't stop you from learning.
"So don't worry. I'm O.K. It's a struggle — but I'm coping. I can still teach this subject that I love."

This professor could retire from teaching, of course, and avoid the awkwardness and the embarrassment, the stares and the frightened looks on his students' faces. But he loves what he does - he's good at it and he loves the students he teaches. He refuses to give an inch to Parkinson's. So he "abandons the nets" of others' expectations, his own doubts and fears of criticism, his own safe "boat" to continue to use the skills and gifts God has given him: the ability to teach. To follow Christ means "abandoning our nets" of self-interest to embrace the needs of others; Jesus calls us to follow him along the difficult path of selfless compassion and humble generosity. That's the challenge of the disciple's call: to find our life's fulfillment in using our skills and knowledge for the common good rather than for personal profit or fame; to seek reconciliation and forgiveness when the rest of the world demands vengeance and settling the score; to see Christ in the faces of everyone we meet.

## Casey's Debt Jubilee

In the last days of her life, Casey McIntyre made sure that others would have access to the health care she had. Casey was diagnosed with ovarian cancer in 2019. A publisher with Penguin Random House, Casey had a long hospitalization at New York's Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center before moving to home hospice care last May. Doctors expected her to live for a few weeks, but she had six months, a "bonus summer" that she and her husband and daughter spent traveling, going to the beach, and hosting gatherings of family and friends.

In addition, Casey planned her memorial service, wrote letters to her 18-month-old daughter Grace, and put together the pieces to make her last wish come true. Two days after she died on November 12 - according to plan - a post appeared on her social media accounts: "A note to my friends: if you're reading this I have passed away. I'm so sorry. To celebrate my life, I've arranged to buy up others' medical debt and then destroy the debt." She then asked for donations to pay off the medical debt of others. Within a week, they blew way past the initial goal of $\$ 20,000$, raising almost a quarter of a million had been raised - enough to buy and pay off \$14 million in medical debt.

Casey McIntyre's campaign is part of RIP Medical Debt, an organization that buys medical debt in bundles "at a steep discount," and then pays it off. Every \$1 donated buys about \$100 in medical debt. RIP Medical Debt uses data analytics to find families and households saddled with excessive debt because of medical treatment. In the course of her treatment, Casey and her husband, Andrew Gregory, met many cancer patients who were in precarious financial positions. Many of these patients and their families were forced to make difficult decisions: Should they pay their mortgage or make a payment on their medical bills? Did they want to extend their life for a couple more years or die soon so they could leave their savings to the next generation? "People are making miserable decisions about their care because of money," Andrew says. "This imaginary debt is dragging so many people down. It's an immoral part of our nation. When Casey and Andrew saw a news story about a North Carolina church that worked with RIP Medical Debt to raise \$15,000 that enabled them to burn $\$ 3$ million in medical debt, they put their plan in place. "Casey was very, very sick at the end of her life, and she couldn't finish everything she wanted to finish. But I knew she wanted to do this memorial and debt jubilee . . ."To see Casey's good and happy life continuing in this way is very beautiful to me." [The New York Times, November 19, 2023; The Washington Post, November 18, 2023.]

Christ entrusts to each one of us - whether fisherman, doctor, cook, teacher, student, pastor, laborer, child, senior the work of discipleship: to realize God's Kingdom of mercy and justice, of generosity and reconciliation, in this time and place of ours. It often means "repositioning" our "nets" not for ourselves but for the sake of others. Christ calls us as disciples to seek reconciliation and forgiveness when the rest of the world demands vengeance and settling the score; to see Christ in the faces of those who have been written off by society; to embrace the role of servant when the conventional wisdom dictates "me first." If we're going to realize his call to be "fishers of men," we have to be willing to cast our nets into waters that are deep and turbulent, waters we do not know. Waters that threaten the safety and security of our small boats in order to "catch" the poor, the struggling, the lost, the despairing - not to mention ourselves - for God.

## Do you appreciate the call to be Christ's Disciples?

Every one of us is called by God, both individually and collectively. The mission of preaching, teaching and healing which Jesus began in Galilee is now the responsibility of the Church. Our own unique vocation and our relationship with the risen Lord are the same as that of the universal Church. Be we religious, priests, married or single people, we are all called, and in this call we become what God wants us to be. The call, of course, begins with our Baptism and the other Sacraments of Initiation. It is strengthened throughout the years with the Eucharist and Reconciliation, healed and consoled by Anointing and made manifest in Matrimony, or Holy Orders. God is relentless in calling us back to Himself, even when we stray away from Him.

Jesus' call to "Follow me" is a call to all Christians! The call is in the here and now, in our present circumstances, not when we think we are "ready" or have everything in order. ## Four Reasons why People do not catch fish!

There are basically four reasons why people do not catch fish: (

1) Some people are using the wrong bait.
2) Some people are fishing in the wrong lake, that is, they don't know where the fish are.
3) Some people have got the right bait and they're in the right lake, but they don't know how to fish.
4) Then there are some people who have the right bait, and they're in the right lake, and they know how to fish but they're just not going fishing.

The Lord Jesus came not only that we might put our faith in Him, but that we might go fishing with Him. You see, our problem is not that we have the wrong lake. The water is full of fish. The problem is not that we have the wrong bait. We have the Gospel which can hook any fish. Our problem, I believe, is one of ignorance and apathy. There are many Christians who believe they do not know how to share the Lord Jesus, and then there are many who just don't want to go.

## "It takes a tough man to make a Tender Chicken"



Purdue Farms had the same problem when they tried to expand their chicken business. Their popular slogan tried to appeal to women by making men prepare a chicken dinner. Do you recall the slogan? It was, "It takes a tough man to make a tender chicken." Desiring to reach into the Spanish market they translated their slogan and announced to the entire Latino world, "It takes a virile man to make a chicken affectionate." Now that's a personal touch but not the kind I had in mind.

How can we reach others for Christ? We can do it by speaking their language - understanding their jobs, taking an interest in their hobbies, speaking to them about their families. We can do it with a personal touch.

## "Who and what am I working for?"

There is a story about a holy rabbi. In the town where he lived, the houses of the rich stood in an isolated area so that they had to hire men to watch over their property at night. Late one evening as the rabbi was coming home he met a watchman walking up and down. 'For whom are you working?' the rabbi asked. The man told him and then inquired in his turn,' And for whom are you working, rabbi?' The words struck the rabbi like a shaft. 'I am not working for anyone just now,' he barely managed to say. Then he walked up and down beside the man for a long time. 'Will you be my servant?' he finally asked. ‘। should like to,' the man replied, 'but what would be my duties?' 'To ask me that question every now and then,' said the rabbi.

## From Our St. Vincent De Paul Society

Who are the clients that we serve? They are the person who waits on you in your favorite restaurant, the person at the checkout line at the supermarket, a fellow parishioner.... they are our neighbors living in Franklin Township and the surrounding area who are struggling to make ends meet and provide for their families.

This past year, our ministry has seen a dramatic increase in those in need of rental or utility assistance. With COVID funds and protections gone, landlords have become more aggressive and less tolerant if rent is not paid on the $1^{\text {st }}$ of the month. Many of those who have sought our help this year were facing eviction.
One such client is a woman interviewed by Bob Cherill and me. Her sister, living in Jamaica, developed cancer. Putting her family first she helped with her sister's medical bills for eight months before she passed away resulting in her falling behind on her rent. Adding to her financial burden, she hit a deer and had to spend over $\$ 1000$ for repairs to her car. Her landlord threatened eviction which led her to seek assistance from our St. Vincent de Paul Society. We were able to assist her with her back rent and prevent eviction. She is financially stable again and moving forward with her life. In gratitude, she made a donation to our ministry to help another person in need.
Our ministry and those we serve are grateful for the generosity of our St. Matthias parishioners who support us with donations given through the poor boxes, Parish Giving and in contribution envelopes. You are in our continued prayers. May 2024 be a blessed and joyous year!
