From the Pastor's Desk

Dear friends,

based on the Lukan gospel about Jesus sending out 72. It is such an important point for our understanding of our own role as disciples that I wish to emphasize it further. Luke, the only gospel writer who mentions this, has a universalist outlook. He wants us to know that the mission of Jesus is not restricted just to the 12 Apostles, but also to a much larger group. The 72 thus represents us all who are baptized Christians whose duty it is to pass on our Faith, as Pope Francis wrote in his first Encyclical 'The Light of faith' (Lumen Fidei): "... from one person to

We are part of that beautiful chain of witnesses, binding us all the way back to Christ and the first 72 he sent out. Whether others become part of that chain depends on whether we do our part like those ahead of us have. It is wonderful to see some of our parishioners doing precisely that. When I talk to some of our parishioners, they tell me they came because someone invited them to worship at St. Matthias. That's a beautiful example for the rest of us. If more of us were to do that.... well, you know the result!

But there are difficulties, too. Some parishioners have shared with me their struggle to answer some of the questions people put to them about our faith, our church, our doctrine or about the Bible in general. We feel less confident to share or speak about faith matters. That's one reason I have been giving an open invitation to all to attend as many sessions as you can – whether it be the RCIA, GIFT or FAITH SHARING. Many parents have expressed – to us priests, deacons and the catechists – their lack of understanding of our faith as they truly want to educate themselves about what we believe. Attending these sessions will enable them not only to teach their children but also to engage other adult acquaintances and friends on religious topics.

Here's another suggestion for all of us: this summer offers us a wonderful opportunity to enrich ourselves with some knowledge of our faith. When media gurus speak about summer reading lists, why not make our own list of faith-related summer reading list? How many of us have read the writings of or about Pope Francis? Last Sunday I mentioned, "The Joy of Love" which made people more aware of the joy of living the Christian? Or his writing on *The Care of Creation (Laudato Si)*? This one caught the world's attention like a wild fire as soon as it was published. In fact, my plan to go solar for our parish buildings was approved due to the openness created by *Laudato Si* towards better stewardship of our natural resources.

My point is this: we all need enrichment about matters related to our faith. The more effort we will make, the better we will be able to speak boldly about why we believe what we believe. Hence I invite you to do something constructive this summer for our inner life, the life of our soul.

Companions on the way to eternity The parable of the Good Samaritan. Luke 10: 25-37

One night, Nurse Sandra Clarke was making her rounds at Sacred Heart Medical Center in Eugene, Oregon, when an elderly, frail patient made a request. His organs were failing; he had a do-not-resuscitate order. He knew he was dying. "Will you stay with me?" Sandra promised she would — as soon as she finished her rounds. Ninety minutes later, after checking charts and assessing vital signs, dispensing meds and assisting with bathroom trips for the other patients on the floor, she returned to the man's room. But it was too late.

"I was angry because I was so helpless," Clarke later said. "All he wanted was companionship."

That led the Oregon nurse to start "No One Dies Alone" — NODA. NODA places volunteers with patients as they die. Sandra Clarke modestly calls it a "fancy phone tree," but the program has saved thousands of patients from a lonely death. NODA serves dying patients who may not have any family, the homeless, those whose families must travel long distances, those who are estranged from their families. More than fifteen hundred NODA programs are operating in hospitals and prisons worldwide.

Ken Budd is a NODA volunteer in Virginia. He understands the responsibility of what he's taken on. Six years ago his mother died alone in her home of a heart attack. He still hasn't shaken the feeling of guilt and failure. On this particular evening, Ken enters the room of a 78-year-old woman who is dying. She may not survive the night. He says quietly, "My name is Ken. "I'm a volunteer and I'm going to be staying with you a bit. It's an

honor to be here." Ken writes of that night in *The Washington* Post Magazine [December 8, 2021]:

"I sit quietly. The dying can feel our presence, I've been told. That's the mission here. To be a compassionate human being. To provide family members — in this case, the woman's devoted daughter — with a break from their vigil. To make certain someone is here if she needs something. To ensure that she won't feel alone and, most important, that she won't die alone."

On our life's journey, we do not travel alone. We are all companions on this adventure to the life of God. As "neighbors" to one another, we are called to lift one another up, to seek what is good for one another, to put one another first — and allow ourselves to be caught and lifted up by others when we stumble and fall. The work of No One Dies Alone volunteers, like the Samaritan's compassion for the man nearly killed by robbers, mirrors the unconditional love of God and the selfless compassion of Christ. May we journey with one another as such "neighbors," honoring the sacred dignity each one of us possesses as sons and daughters of the God of all that is good.

Einstein's Little Neighbor

When Einstein fled Nazi Germany, he came to America and bought a two-storied house within walking distance of Princeton University. There he entertained some of the most distinguished people of his day

and discussed with them far-ranging issues from physics to human rights. But Einstein had another frequent visitor. She was not, in the world's eyes, an important person like his other guests. Emmy, a tenyear old neighbor, had heard that a very kind man who knew all about mathematics had moved into her neighborhood. Since she was having trouble with her fourth-grade mathematics, she decided to visit the man down the block to see if he would help with her problems. Einstein was very willing and explained everything to her so that she could understand it. He also told her she was welcome to come anytime she needed help. A few weeks later, one of the neighbors told Emmy's mother that Emmy was seen entering the house of the world-famous physicist. Horrified, she told her daughter that Einstein was a very important man, whose time was very valuable, and shouldn't be bothered with the problems of a little schoolgirl. She then rushed over to Einstein's house, and when Einstein answered the door, she started trying to blurt out an apology for her daughter's intrusion -- for being such a bother. But Einstein cut her off. He said, "She has not been bothering me! When a child finds such joy in learning, then it is my joy to help her learn! Please don't stop Emmy from coming to me with her school problems. She is welcome in this house anytime."

And that's how it is with God! He is our neighbor, and He wants us to come to His house anytime! We can approach him with a childlike trust. He will always welcome us with those gracious words: "Come to me all who are weary and find life burdensome and I will give you rest!"

Operation Smile 😉

I was reading sometime back about Dr. William Magee Jr., a plastic surgeon in Norfolk, Va. In 1981, Dr. Magee traveled to the Philippines to operate on children with cleft lips and other facial deformities. Unfortunately, there were so many children with this deformity, a deformity that can render it impossible for them to speak or eat, that hundreds had to be turned away. This caused Dr. Magee and his wife to found an



organization called Operation Smile. Operation Smile sends volunteer doctors to perform reconstructive facial surgery for children worldwide. "It wasn't a strategic plan," said Magee. "It was just a matter of emotion and passion to make sure children didn't have to live this way." The group, which already has treated 50,000 children worldwide, also trains doctors in other nations to perform the procedure. Magee hopes to use satellite technology in the future, so he can teach a greater number of medical professionals the necessary techniques. (The Associated Press.) Dr. Magee didn't have to do that. He could have justified himself. "What's in it for me? There are so many children in my own city whose parents or whose insurance company could pay for this surgery. I'm a busy doctor here. I don't have to go halfway around the world and minister to indigent children. Not my problem." I doubt if Dr. Magee even wondered if this act of service would get him into Heaven. He simply saw a need and filled it. He became a Good Samaritan, encouraging fellow surgeons to become Good Samaritans.

In today's gospel, a scribe asked Jesus a very basic religious question: "What should I do to inherit eternal life?" In answer to the question, Jesus directed the Scribe's attention to the Sacred Scriptures. The Scriptural answer is "love God and express it by loving your neighbor." However, to the scribe, the word "neighbor" meant another scribe or Pharisee - never a Samaritan or a Gentile. Hence, the scribe insisted on a clarification of the word "neighbor." So Jesus told him the parable of the Good Samaritan. The parable clearly indicates that a "neighbor" is anyone who needs help. Thus, the correct approach is not to ask the question "Who is my neighbor?" but rather to ask, "Am I a good neighbor to others?"



Reflect

"You owe this debt to any stranger in need:"



V. P. Menon was a significant political figure in India during its struggle for independence from Britain after World War II. Menon had a splendid reputation for personal charity. His daughter explained the background of this trait after he died. When Menon arrived in Delhi to seek a job in government, all his possessions, including his money and I.D., were

stolen at the railroad station. He would have to return home on foot, defeated. In desperation he turned to an elderly Sikh, explained his troubles, and asked for a temporary loan of fifteen rupees (equivalent to about 25 cents) to tide him over until he could get a job. The Sikh gave him the money. When Menon asked for his address so that he could repay the man, the Sikh said that Menon owed the debt not to him but to any stranger who came to him in need, as long as he lived. The help came from a stranger and was to be repaid to a stranger. Menon never forgot that debt. His daughter said that the day before Menon died, a beggar came to the family home in Bangalore asking for help to buy new sandals, for his feet were covered with sores. Menon asked his daughter to take fifteen rupees out of his wallet to give to the man. It was Menon's last conscious act. Menon ministered to strangers because a stranger had ministered to him. [Robert A. Fulgham, All I Really Need to Know I learned in Kindergarten (New York: Villard Books, 5322).]

Why have Christians been historically so charitable, so caring? It is because once we were lying beside the road broken, and bleeding, nail-scarred hands reached down to us and ministered to us in our need. While we were unworthy, Christ the Divine Good Samaritan died for us. We need to remember that the road from Jerusalem to Jericho passes right through our home, parish, school and work place. The Jericho Road is any place where people are being robbed of their dignity, their material goods or their value as human beings. It is any place where there is suffering and oppression. As a matter of fact, the Jericho Road may be our own home, the place where we are taking care of a mother or father, husband or wife, or even our own children. We may find our spouse, children or parents lying "wounded" by bitter words, scathing criticism or other, more blatant forms of verbal, emotional or physical abuse. Hence, Jesus invites us to have hearts of love. What God wants more than anything is for us to show our love to others, in our own home and school, in the workplace, and in the neighborhood, as the Good Samaritan did. Jesus is inviting us to have hearts of mercy for those who are being left hurt or mistreated on any of the "Jericho Roads" of life.

"I'll be happy to honk your horn for you!"

Have you heard the story about the elderly woman who lived in a small town in East Texas who had car trouble on the way to the supermarket one morning? Her car stalled at a stop sign. She tried everything to get her car started again, but no luck. Suddenly, a man in a pick-up truck came up behind her and, with obvious agitation, he started honking his horn at her impatiently. She doubled her efforts to get her car going. She pumped the gas, turned the ignition, but still no luck. The man in the pick-up truck continued to honk his horn constantly and loudly. I love what the elderly woman did. Very calmly she got out of her car, walked back to the pick-up and motioned for the man to lower his window and then politely she said: "I'll make a deal with you. If you will start my car for me I'll be happy to honk your horn for you!"

Now, that is what you call "Rising to the occasion!" -- and that is precisely what Jesus does here in Luke 10. The lawyer was "testing" Jesus, honking his horn loudly. He was trying to trap Jesus and trip Him up with a loaded question, but Jesus (as He so often did), rose to the occasion and passed the test with flying colors. In so doing, He reminded the people back then (and us today), of what the main thing <u>is</u> in the Christian Faith.

"He did not answer the cry for help!"

There is a respectable lawyer in Albert Camus' novel, *The Fall.* He is walking in the streets of Amsterdam one night and hears a cry. A woman has fallen into the canal and is crying for help. Then the thoughts come rushing through his mind. Of course he must help, but...a respected lawyer getting involved in this way? What would the implications be?what about the personal danger? After all, who knows what has been going on? By the time he has thought it through, it is too late. She has drowned. He moves on, making all kinds of excuses to justify his failure to act. Camus writes, "He did not answer the cry for help. That is the man he was." [David Shelly, "A Master of Saves," *Presbyterian Survey* (July/ August, 1986).]

We would have done better, we tell ourselves, and yet all around us are people in need. Not just physical needs -- emotional needs can be more devastating than physical needs. The most serious disease in America today, according to many experts, is loneliness. Many of us could hear cries for help right in our own neighborhood, if we would listen -- or in our own families. Why do we not listen? "Do this and live," said Jesus.

"I would like this letter to help us to rekindle our wonder for the beauty of the truth of the Christian celebration, to remind us of the necessity of an authentic liturgical formation, and to recognize the importance of an art of celebrating that is at the service of the truth of the Paschal Mystery and of the participation of all of the baptized in it, each one according to his or her vocation. (§ 62)"

"No one had earned a place at that [Last] Supper. All had been invited. Or better said: all had been drawn there by the burning desire that Jesus had to eat that Passover with them... The world still does not know it, but everyone is *invited* to the supper of the wedding of the Lamb (Re 53:3). To be admitted to the feast all that is required is the wedding garment of faith which comes from the hearing of his Word...

"Here lies all the powerful beauty of the liturgy. If the resurrection were for us a concept, an idea, a thought; if the Risen One were for us the recollection of others, however authoritative, as, for example, of the Apostles; if there were not given also to us the possibility of a true encounter with Him, that would be to declare the newness of the Word made flesh to have been all used up. Instead, the Incarnation, in addition to being the only always new event that history knows, is also the very method that the Holy Trinity has chosen to open to us the way of communion. Christian faith is either an encounter with Him alive, or it does not exist [emphasis added]...

"The fundamental question is this: how do we recover the

capacity to live completely the liturgical action? This was the objective of the [Second Vatican] Council's reform. The challenge is extremely demanding because modern people — not in all cultures to the same degree — have lost the capacity to engage with symbolic action, which is an essential trait of the liturgical act.

"With post-modernity people feel themselves even more lost, without references of any sort, lacking in values because they have become indifferent, completely orphaned, living a fragmentation in which an horizon of meaning seems impossible.

"The non-acceptance of the liturgical reform, as also a superficial understanding of it, distracts us from the obligation of finding responses to the question that I come back to repeating: how can we grow in our capacity to live in full the liturgical action? How do we continue to let ourselves be amazed at what happens in the celebration under our very eyes? We are in need of a serious and dynamic liturgical formation...

"In this is posed the decisive question of liturgical formation. Romano Guardini says, "Here too the first practical task is indicated: carried along by this inner transformation of our time, we must learn anew how to relate religiously as fully human beings." This is what the Liturgy makes possible. For this we must be formed...

"The Liturgy gives glory to God because it allows us — here, on earth — to see God in the celebration of the mysteries, (Cont'd on next page)

were dead through our sins and have been made be alive again with Christ — we are the glory of God...

"Above all we must reacquire confidence about creation. I mean to say that things — the sacraments "are made" of things — come from God. To Him they are oriented, and by Him they have been assumed, and assumed in a particular way in the Incarnation, so that they can become instruments of salvation, vehicles of the Spirit, channels of grace... If created things are such a fundamental, essential part of the sacramental action that brings about our salvation, then we

must arrange ourselves in their presence with a fresh, nonsuperficial regard, respectful and grateful. From the very beginning, created things contain the seed of the sanctifying grace of the sacraments...

"Let us abandon our polemics to listen together to what the Spirit is saying to the Church. Let us safeguard our communion. Let us continue to be astonished at the beauty of the Liturgy. The Paschal Mystery has been given to us. Let us allow ourselves to be embraced by the desire that the Lord continues to have to eat His Passover with us."

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


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
