A Message From The Pastor

Dear Friends,

Happy July 4th weekend to all! On this anniversary of the publication of the declaration of independence from Great Britain in 1776, we celebrate the freedom we cherish. It was interesting for me to read that the first description of how Independence Day would be celebrated in a letter from



John Adams to his wife Abigail on July 3, 1776. He described "pomp and parade, with shows, games, sports, guns, bells, bonfires, and illuminations" throughout the United States. As we celebrate the positive aspects of the United States on this patriotic holiday, let this also be a time for us to express and give thanks for the freedom and liberties fought for and won by the first generation Americans.

America is often referred to as a land of diversity and welcome. This diversity is celebrated as a source of strength and enrichment, with a long-standing tradition of welcoming those seeking freedom and opportunity. This attitude of welcoming all with a universalist outlook is an echo of Jesus sending out 72 disciples on a mission in today's gospel. That begs the question: Did Jesus send out 12 or 72 disciples? Luke, the only gospel writer who mentions this, has a universalist outlook. He wants us to know that the mission of Jesus was not restricted just to the 12 Apostles, but also to a much larger group. The 72 thus represents us all who are baptized Christians whose duty it is to pass on our Faith, "... from one person to another, just as one candle is lit from another. ... It is through an unbroken chain of witnesses that we come to see the face of Jesus" as Pope Francis wrote in his first Encyclical.

We are part of that beautiful chain of witnesses, binding us, all the way back to Christ and the first 72 he sent out. Whether others become part of that chain depends on whether we do our part like those ahead of us have. It is wonderful to see some of our parishioners doing precisely that. Some have told me that they joined St. Matthias because someone invited them. That's a beautiful example for the rest of us. If more of us were to do that.... well, you know the result!

But there are difficulties too. Some parishioners have shared with me their struggle to answer some of the questions people put to them about our faith, our church, our doctrine and about the Bible in general. We feel less confident to share or speak about faith matters. How do we equip ourselves? The many small groups of Bible sharing we have is one such program that helped many to speak about the Bible. The GIFT is another wonderful program that anyone can attend. Debbie Schurko and her dedicated team of catechists are very welcoming: even if you have no kids in the GIFT program, you are most welcome to join the adult segment which will be beneficial for anyone who wishes to educate himself/herself about what we believe. It will enable you to engage other adult acquaintances and friends on religious topics.

It is good to be reminded that the Lord sends out each one of us with a mission to bring His love to our own people.

Reflect

A GOOD NEIGHBORHOOD

... the Lord appointed seventy-two others whom he sent ahead of him in pairs to every town and place he intended to visit. "Into whatever house you enter, first say, 'Peace to this household...'" Luke 10: 1-12, 17-20

A friend had warned them: "Don't buy on Cottage Grove Avenue. It's a bad neighborhood. I wouldn't buy there. There's no resale value." The mother of one of their child's friends was appalled: "Don't you want your kids to go to a good school?" Even their real estate agent sat them down and said pointblank, "Think of your wife's safety." They were having second thoughts about the house they were considering. Fear was sinking in. They called friends who lived in the neighborhood and put the question right out there: "Do you feel safe?" Their friends laughed. "Have you been talking to real estate people again?" They invited them to dinner - at their house in the "bad" neighborhood.

As they drove up, the couple scanned the streets as if on a reconnaissance mission. Their friends welcomed them and served a delicious dinner. After desert, they brought out a sheet of paper they obtained from the police. It was a map of the city with crime statistics for the various neighborhoods. Sure enough, in the blocks surrounding the house they were considering was a vacant house that had been vandalized. Drugs confiscated from a woman. A man passed out in a yard. This was as bad as - *college*. The map showed the robberies, rapes and domestic violence that had taken place throughout the city. That particular month burglaries and auto thefts were worse in one particularly wealthy suburb.

That's when they realized that all those warnings weren't about crime or real estate values or schools. They were code words for "low-income people of color." They bought the house on Cottage Grove Avenue. Seven years later, the husband and dad says of their "bad neighborhood": "No one told me that the day we moved in, a pack of joyful kids would run over to meet our kids... About Demetrius, raising his nieces while their mother is doing time. About Jose and Maria's burrito place. And Mike, the pony-tailed Harley biker who one day stepped out in front of a speeding car and yelled 'Hey!"' to a startled driver, slamming his fist on the hood, 'there's kids around here!'

"In my 'bad' neighborhood, we sit on front porches, hear the neighbor girls' jazz double-dutch jump rope riffs, and buy snow cones on hot days out of an old guy's shopping cart. "Sure, there are nuisances here: litter, alley dogs, clutter in yards. But danger? I've learned that stupid behavior is color blind and bullets prefer alcohol and drug deals over lawabiding citizens any day. "I love my new neighborhood. It balances my life, shows me real color, and saves me from things far worse than litter or a stolen Subaru - like the blindness and coded racism of privilege."

In sending out the seventy-two to go ahead of him and make ready for his coming, Jesus gives them no magical powers;

he invests in them no special authority. They are to go about their work with humility and joy. They are to offer peace to all. They are to accept whatever hospitality is offered to them with gratitude. They are to be God's agents for healing and reconciliation. And Jesus promises that they will make a difference in people's lives - and their dedication to the work of the Gospel will make a difference in their own lives, as well. A family discovers that same peace and hospitality as the "good" at the center of their so-called "bad neighborhood." We can bring such joy and peace to our own homes and neighborhoods in our own response to Jesus' call to work for God's harvest of reconciliation and justice in the part of his vineyard God has entrusted to us.

EVANGELIZATION How to Invite Close Family/Friends/Relatives Back to Church

Inviting Friends and Family Members Who Have Been Away for a Long Time can be risky and often times discouraging. It can be hard, especially when they haven't been a part of the Church for a very long time. Often, the more time that goes by, the easier it is to "let it slide." Don't give up! Persistence is really important in these cases, so just keep trying. For example, you could get into the habit of saying each week: "I know you haven't been to Church for some time. I think God wants me to ask you to come back. Would you care to join me for Mass this weekend?" Or you might say: "Our parish is really cool; it is very welcoming and hospitable. People seem to enjoy the service there. There is no commitment, nor pressure at all. I would be willing to go with you if you're interested. You don't have to give me an answer right now. Just think about it and let me know." To those who say they are too busy: "I've heard going to church for an hour a week actually reduces stress, and that it really helps people whose lives are very busy. Why don't you come with me this week to Mass and see just how wonderfully renewing it can be?" or "Mass is the one hour each week I get to really just sit and simply be. It recharges me like nothing else. Would you like to join me for Mass this weekend? Maybe we could get a cup of coffee afterwards."

There are times none of the above will work with some. What do you do? Love them without ever inviting them. Here, the advice of St. Francis of Assisi is very relevant: "Preach the Gospel at all times, and if necessary, use words!! If your repeated invitations appear to fall on deaf ears, then it is time for you to stop inviting them, but to love them and show interest in all of their concerns, except the matters of church or religion. In other words, you are living and witnessing to the gospel values just by showing genuine love and care for that person. And leave the rest to God, who will touch that person in His time.

Reflect

ST. TERESA OF AVILA WROTE:

THE LIVING GOSPEL

There is a story of a chaplain who was serving on the battlefield. He came across a young man who was lying in a shell hole, seriously wounded. "Would you like me to read something from this book, the Bible?" he asked. "I'm so thirsty, I'd rather have a drink of water." The soldier said. Hurrying away, the chaplain soon brought the water. Then the wounded man said, "Could you put something under my head?" The chaplain took off his overcoat, rolled it up and gently placed it under the man's head for a pillow. "Now," said the suffering man, "if I just had something over me -I'm cold." The chaplain immediately removed his jacket and put it over the wounded man to keep him warm. Then the soldier looked the chaplain straight in the eye and said, "If there is anything in that book that makes a man do for another all that you have done for me, then please read it, because I'd love to hear it." If my actions do not speak of Gospel values, be sure my words never will. What affects most people is often caught rather than taught. Indeed we are the only book on Jesus Christ that others may ever read!

CAPTAIN JAMES T. KIRK, COMMANDER OF THE STARSHIP ENTERPRISE

Kirk was not the smartest guy on the ship ... so why did he get to climb on board the Enterprise and run it? The answer: There is this skill set called leadership. Kirk was the distilled essence of the dynamic manager, a guy who knew how to delegate, had the passion to inspire, and looked good in what he wore to work. He never professed to have skills greater than his subordinates ... he established the vision, the tone. He was in charge of morale. [Randy Pausch, The Last Lecture (New York: Hyperion, 2008), pp. 43-44.] The Church needs moraleboosting servant leaders as outlined in today's Gospel.

We are delegated by Jesus to bring His good news to all. We need to continue the preaching mission: Just as Jesus in today's Gospel gives instructions to the seventytwo missionaries, he also gives each one of us a mission to carry out. There were just a handful of followers in Jesus' day to preach the Good News, but today there are over one billion Roman Catholics and about a half billion other Christians (in 30,000 denominations!) who accept Jesus as "Lord" and "Savior." So there are 1.5 billion missionaries in a world of six billion people. A recent survey asked the question, "Why do adults join the Catholic Church in spite of the scandals publicized in the media?" Seventy-five percent of the new adult converts to the Catholic Church reported that they were attracted by a personal invitation from a Catholic who had a lively relationship with Christ and his Church. As faithful Catholics, we will attract others to the Catholic Church just as a rose attracts people by its beauty and fragrance. It's our job. It's our responsibility. We must not miss the current opportunities to be apostles in everyday life by our words and deeds.

THE HOLY NAME OF JESUS

St. Gregory of Tours relates that when he was a boy his father fell gravely ill and lay dying. Gregory prayed fervently for his recovery. When Gregory was asleep at night, his Guardian Angel appeared to him and told him to write the Name of Jesus on a card and place it under the sick man's pillow. In the morning Gregory acquainted his mother with the Angle's message, which she advised him to obey. He did so, and placed the card under his father's head, when, to the delight of the whole family, the patient grew rapidly better. In today's Gospel, we heard the seventy-two other disciples, when they returned from their mission of preaching, joyfully exclaimed to Jesus, Lord, even the devils are subject unto us through your name.

The disciples experienced power in the name of Jesus. We too can experience the same. The mission of the seventy-two disciples was not a human project, and, hence, they needed strength from God to do the work. In proclaiming the Good News of the Kingdom, we, too, participate in God's work. It is the Lord Who is working in and through us. He gives us the power to announce His presence with our lives. Therefore, constant contact with the Lord of the harvest is necessary. This means that we must be men and women of prayer -- not only for an hour a week at Mass but on a daily basis.
