

A Message From The Vicar for Clergy for the Diocese

Dear Parishioners of St. Matthias Parish,

Father Orapankal has informed you that he will be stepping down as your Pastor this summer. Bishop Checchio is grateful for Father's service here at St. Matthias for more than the past 6 years and also for the support you have given him.

Bishop Checchio and the Priest Personnel Board will now take up the matter of choosing a suitable priest to succeed Father Orapankal. Pastors are appointed by the bishop to lead local parish communities and to provide for their pastoral care. They share in the bishop's ministry of teaching, sanctifying, and governing. With the bishop's mandate, and with the assistance and support of other clergy and the lay faithful, the pastor has full responsibility for shepherding the local church community.

To facilitate this appointment, Bishop Checchio has initiated a consultation process to elicit input from your entire parish community, including the staff, ministry leaders, and all parishioners to determine what the people of St. Matthias hope for in its new Pastor. This consultation process includes meetings with both parish staff and interested parishioners.

The meetings for parishioners will be held on Monday, March 3rd, at 1:00 PM and Monday, March 10th at 7:00 PM in your parish church. These general meetings will be facilitated by Rev. Msgr. John Fell, Vicar for Clergy for the Diocese. They will welcome staff and ministry leaders of your parish community and all parishioners—everyone is invited and encouraged to participate.

During these guided listening sessions, information will be gathered from parishioners that will assist the Bishop and Priest Personnel Board to better understand the parish's current status and needs. Please understand that these sessions are information gathering only and that the data collected from parishioners at these meetings will be one factor among several which the Priest Personnel Board will consider in recommending candidates and the Bishop will consider in ultimately choosing your next pastor. This consultation is not to solicit the names of individual priests, and these will not be discussed.

For any parishioners who might be unable to attend in person, there is also an option to be heard by emailing Msgr. Fell at **jfell@diometuchen.org** by March 12. If you choose this option, please reflect on the following points:

- the nature and current status of St. Matthias Parish and its ministries, programs, facilities, etc.,
- the qualities you feel would be most needed by the new pastor,
- the most salient features of the parish that the new pastor should be aware of,
- what you are most proud of at your parish, and
- the most pressing needs that you think the new pastor must be able to address in the short term.

All parishioners are asked to join in prayer that the Holy Spirit may guide and illumine this process and are invited and encouraged to participate in person or by email to help the diocese more fully understand the status and needs of the entire St. Matthias Parish Family.

Thank you so much for your kind assistance in this important matter.

JUBILEE 2025: PILGRIMS OF HOPE 10 THINGS TO KNOW - #8

Major Renovations and Welcoming Environment. During this Jubilee year, expect Rome to sparkle and shine. Many famous sites and artworks in Rome and at the Vatican have been cleaned or restored for the jubilee, much to the chagrin of many tourists in 2024, who found major monuments obscured by fencing, scaffolding and tarps. Many of those projects are completed with a fresh-face reveal for the jubilee. Last October, St. Peter's Basilica

revealed its newly restored baldacchino, designed by Gian Lorenzo Bernini in the 1600s, after 10 months of work. Also receiving cleaning or restoration are Michelangelo's Pietà, Bernini's Fountain of the Four Rivers in Piazza Navona, and Bernini's angels on the Ponte Sant'Angelo.

Reflection: The first place to prepare for the Jubilee is in each one's heart. Renovation begins there. Keep your heart clean and tidy. Pope Francis invites us to turn to Scripture for this renovation of the heart: "In our journey towards the Jubilee, let us return to Scripture and realize that it speaks to us in these words: "May we who have taken refuge in him be strongly encouraged to seize the hope set before us. We have this hope, a sure and steadfast anchor of the soul, a hope that enters the inner shrine behind the curtain, where Jesus, a forerunner on our behalf, has entered" (Heb 6:18-20). Those words are a forceful encouragement for us never to lose the hope we have been given, to hold fast to that hope and to find in God our refuge and our strength." #25, Spes Non Confundit, Bull of Indiction of the Jubilee Year 6469

POWER OF ENCOURAGEMENT

In the late 1800s, a boy was working 14 hours a day in a shop in London, England. After two years of this, he told his mother one day that he would kill himself if he had to go on any longer. After his talk with his mother, the boy wrote to a former teacher, explaining how miserable he felt. The teacher wrote back, praising him as a person and assuring him that he was very gifted. This encouragement changed the boy's life and he went on to become one of England's most gifted authors. His name was H.G. Wells.

Today's gospel is an occasion for us to reflect on how we approach others. Do we rescue them from their misery by affirming and encouraging them? Or do we drive them into a deeper despair by nagging and criticizing? It is a question of how much, after all, we care for them. But this Gospel probes even deeper - into what is really in our hearts. For that is what comes most easily to our lips. Whether we affirm or criticize ultimately depends upon how we perceive ourselves. It is a question then of how much, after all, we care about ourselves. The gospel, then, encourages all of us, assuring us of our giftedness, stating, in no uncertain terms, that we must love ourselves as much as we love others. (Jerome Herauf, Halifax NS, Canada)



LENT IS AT THE DOOR! ARE YOU READY?

If we treat Lent no different than any normal day, Easter will just be just eggs and chocolate bunnies! Lent is a time of preparation, a time to evaluate our priorities. We can do the simple task of getting ashes on Ash Wednesday. But then what? For Lent to rejuvenate us and bring us to true Easter joy we need to consider what our goal is this Lenten season.

Lent is what we make of it, and that needs a plan. Just giving up desserts, can help you lose weight, but unless money saved on the desserts is given to others in need, what is the true value of our effort? What is the point of giving up something unless it results in a benefit?

Giving up TV or Internet may provide more time to clean, take a nap or talk on the phone, but wouldn't the time be better used to pray, meditate, or focus on encouraging a spiritual habit? Its 10am, have I talked to God today? A daily focus to be more in touch with God during the forty days of Lent would result in true joy at Easter. What do I want out of Lent? What am I doing for Lent? Do I have a plan?

DID JESUS PROHIBIT US FROM CRITICIZING OTHERS?

We live in a very critical age. Everybody criticizes everybody else, notices everybody else's flaws, but seldom really recognize their own. As an overreaction to this, some people, presuming to try to speak for Jesus, say: "Don't criticize anyone else. We're no better than anyone else. Just live and let live. We've all got our problems. Don't be judgmental of anybody else or their actions." What does Jesus really have to say?

Jesus does not say "Don't criticize anyone else who does something wrong." That would be inconsistent with loving someone else. If someone were a terrible alcoholic and could no longer control his drinking, we wouldn't love that person or be his friend if we didn't try to tell him to do something about his drinking. Jesus says that first, however, we need to take out the plank out of our own eye before we try to take out the speck in another. He who created us knows us so very well. He knows that most of the time, the reason why we start criticizing others, the reason why we start noticing all of their flaws, is because we don't have the guts to look in the mirror to see our own. The reason we criticize others is so that we can make ourselves look good in comparison with their flaws. In the seminary we used to have a saying that when someone came to you and started to complain about someone else or some decision that was made, always ask the question, "so what's wrong inside of you?", because more often than not, the person's critical attitude derived from the fact that the person was not at peace with himself. I recognize this in myself. When I start to become overly critical, the first thing I try to do is to examine my own conscience to see whether everything is right at home. This is what Jesus calls us to. He says first examine yourself, straighten out your problems with me, with yourself and with others first, and then go constructively criticize others, because then you'll see clearly. He wants us to help them take the speck out of their eye, but only after we can see clearly, see with his eyes, his pure sinless vision. If we're ever going to presume to guide anyone toward better behavior, we first have to make sure our eyes are free of any planks that might keep us from seeing and following Christ himself. (Fr. DID YOU SIGN UP TO JOIN ONE OF OUR SMALL GROUPS?

For most of history, group life was a given. But in today's fast-paced global society, this culture is very different. Community scholars concur in describing contemporary society as alienated, rootless, lonely, and lacking a sense of belonging. This is heightened because most of us will never get back to the extended family, the parish, and the village of earlier life. That's why there is such a proliferation of support groups in our country for all kinds of causes – a positive development that speaks of the human need to be in community. Sociological studies and scholarly opinions support this. Let me cite just one. Pastoral psychologist Robert Leslie says:

God is not found in objective law, in sterile formulas, in impersonal rules. God is found in participation, in involvement, in celebration. God is found in relationships, in encounters, in the joys and sorrows of human experience, in the give and take of dialogue. In the miracle of relatedness we discover that we are no longer strangers, but members together in a household, bound together in our common loyalty to God.

CURIOUS? WHAT HAPPENS IN SMALL GROUPS?

In many church small groups the participants share their ideas and experiences about their efforts in trying to understand and live the Word of God. They experience an openness to talk about the more important things in their lives - to listen and care, to provide support and strength. Group members experience sufficient freedom to be themselves, without judgment from others. • From such openness and acceptance, including prayer for one another, they experience a powerful kind of bonding or warmth that brings growth and change – a feeling of being rejuvenated.

2025 Lenten Obligations

- 1. The days of both fast **and** abstinence are Ash Wednesday (March 5) and Good Friday (April 18).
- 2. The other Fridays of Lent (Mar. 7, 14, 21, 28; April 4, and 11) are days of abstinence.
- Fasting in the Roman Catholic tradition means to limit oneself to one full meal with two smaller meals, which together do not equal the size of your full meal. The obligation of fasting applies only to Catholics between the ages of 18 and 59.
- 4. Abstinence in the Roman Catholic tradition means to abstain from eating meat (beef, chicken, pork, turkey, etc.). The obligation of abstinence applies to all Catholics who have reached the age of 14.

JESUS SPEAKS IN APHORISMS

The readings for today are full of aphorisms. An aphorism is an adage, or a tersely phrased statement of the truth. Let's look at two of the aphorisms found in the Gospel of Luke.

"Can a blind man act as a guide to a blind man. Will they not both fall into a ditch?"

People cannot teach until they have learned. This is true in every aspect of life, but particularly in the Church. In the Catholic Church we are blessed with a teaching authority. This authority is often given the Latin word for teacher and called the magisterium. The magisterium consists in the Pope, the Bishops, theologians and consultants. The duty of the magisterium is to set the course for us to relate our faith and morals to the evolving times. We take this for granted because most of us have always been Catholic and have always had the body of our faith presented in a rather neat package. But dogmatic statements didn't just happen. They evolved ov er many centuries as the Church continues to grow in its understanding of itself.

The magisterium does not just exist among the hierarchy. It also exists in the home among the confirmed. Those who have received the sacrament of confirmation have received the gift of the Holy Spirit to grow in their understanding of the faith. When, as all human beings, we have times of doubt, or times that we have difficulty understanding what we believe or why we believe, we have to go to books and knowledgeable people in the area. We also have to go to our knees and pray to Holy Spirit to help us grow in faith. The blind cannot lead the blind. That is why we have the magisterium.

The second aphorism of Jesus in today's gospel is: "Why look at the speck in your brother's eye? when you miss the plank in your own?" Psychologist might restate this in these terms: we tend to transfer our irritation over our own failings to others. So we decry another person's faults as a way of hiding our own. The Lord was quite a psychologist when he said, "First deal with your own faults." When we go through those negative days when everything other people do irritates us, we have to take a step back and consider what we are doing that upsets others, and, even more, what we are doing that upsets ourselves.
