



Dear Friends,

If you were present at the 10 am Mass on the first Sunday of Lent, you noticed the "Rite of Sending" four of our Catechumen to the Cathedral and acknowledging 13 Candidates – all preparing for the Sacraments of Initiation at Easter Vigil this year through our OCIA (RCIA) process. This

Sunday at the 10 am Mass, we have "Scrutiny" for the Catechumen. Are all these terms strange for us? I think we will all remember that RCIA stood for the "Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults," though few years ago, the US Bishops decided that RCIA should be more appropriately named OCIA (Order of Christian Initiation for Adults). 'Catechumen' is the term used for an unbaptized person who is attending this preparation in OCIA, and 'Candidate' is the term used for a baptized person who did not receive Eucharist or Confirmation. This year we are privileged to have what is probably the largest class in our OCIA process.

So, what is the rite called 'scrutiny'? "It is meant to uncover, and then heal all that is weak, defective, or sinful in the hearts of the elect; to bring out, then strengthen all that is upright, strong, and good. For the scrutinies are celebrated in order to deliver the elect from the power of sin and Satan, to protect them against temptation, and to give them strength in Christ, who is the way, the truth, and the life." (no.141) Essentially, it is composed of prayers of intercession and the laying on of hands so that the Holy Spirit may be invoked that they are freed from the spirit of evil. Doing the first scrutiny at Mass gives the whole congregation an opportunity to pray for and support those preparing for the Easter sacraments and to make the point that conversion is not only a personal matter but a communal commitment.

More importantly, this Rite of Scrutiny is also an opportunity for the rest of us, to self-examine and see the need for healing in our weakness, detect the sinful habits in our lives and to nourish the good within us so that we can bear good fruits for Christ. Lent is the time to learn from our mistakes of over-indulgence in food, drink, drugs, gambling, promiscuity, or any other addiction that may keep us from coming to the *living waters* of a right relationship with God. We all have our short list, don't we? And we all know, honest to God, what it is we need to leave behind before we come to the *Living Water* and the Bread of Heaven – as the Samaritan woman shows us in the gospel of John.

I had done a 10 part bulletin series on the Jubilee Year 2025. Now I wish to begin another series on our Homebound Ministry - a wonderful ministry that benefits our parishioners who are homebound or in nursing homes. This is a ministry that is not so visible to the rest of us. How lucky we are that we have a dedicated number of parishioners who do this ministry joyfully but quietly, away from the limelight. We are very grateful to those who did this ministry in the past and are no longer with us or had to stop due to reasons of health or mobility. But there are a good number of our parishioners who bring Jesus and His Word to the homebound. (see their names on page 4). THE GARDEN AT SANT'ANA

The parable of the fig tree: "Sir, leave it for this year also, and I shall cultivate the ground around it and fertilize it; it may bear fruit in the future." Luke 13: 1-9

Margarida's downward spiral went from drinking to smoking crack to stealing to support her addiction. She lost everything, including her home and her family's small plot of land. Soon she found herself in the largest women's prison in Brazil, Sant'Ana in the city of Sao Paulo. There Margarida found salvation in dirt. Sant'Ana, a sprawling facility with over 2,500 inmates, has its own organic garden. The garden was devised by two students - a Brazilian and an America - as part of an urban agricultural development course they were taking. "The project was built on the idea that women prisoners needed a beautiful place of respite from the ugly walls of the prison," the students explain.

With 200 starter plants from the university and donations from family and friends in the United States, the two students approached the prison staff for permission to plant the garden. At first, the prison staff was reluctant to approve the garden, having seen too many wellintentioned projects get started only to end abruptly when the organizers lost interest or ran out of time and money. But the students convinced the staff they were committed to making a go of the garden.

Some 20 prisoners and classmates they recruited took part in the watering, planting and caring for seedlings. That first season they harvested zucchini, tomatoes, sweet potatoes, lemongrass and other herbs, as well as flowers and shrubs. The garden was not just a source of food but a hands-on learning experience about the environment. Working the earth has been therapeutic for many of the inmates who suffer from mental health issues; the garden also teaches social and communications skills to the women, many of whom are illiterate. For Margarida, the garden has been a Godsend. "The garden was a clinic for me. Drugs were destroying my life. I believe that I will leave this place changed. I have faith in God and faith in my own willingness to change." [Maryknoll, May/June 2015.]

The prison garden at Sant'Ana is the Gospel fig tree. Both the prison garden and struggling fig tree mirror the hope of the Gospel: that we can always rework our plot of land, replant relationships that have not been nurtured, plant new seedlings where previous attempts to harvest something good and just have died on the vine. Like the gardener of the poor fig tree, we have the choice to work the soil and "feed" our ability to grow and move beyond ourselves and our hope for a just and compassionate world - or we can allow ourselves to be "cut down" in our sadness, disappointment and despair. In the parable of the fig tree, Jesus assures us that we always live in the hope and mercy of God enabling us to rise from the ashes of sin to rebuild and transform our lives, to work and rework our own small plots and realize its harvest of compassion and grace.

WHAT SHOULD I "DO" DURING ADORATION?

Today, in the United States, there are 644 chapels where Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament is exposed twenty-four hours for the adoration of the faithful. There are another 6,605 chapels that have partial adoration hours. Each Adoration Chapel is like an oasis of peace in a busy, demanding world. All we need to do is walk in and be still. We will begin to feel Our Lord Himself there, personally present, All-Powerful and all good, waiting to listen to all we have to say. We come, often tired, burdened with problems, or even discouraged. Trusting in the words of Jesus, "Come to Me all you who are weary and I will give you rest." (Matthew 11:28), we come ready to be fed. We come to bathe in His Love, ready to be healed, allowing His Living Presence to minister to all our needs-those needs we know and those needs known by Him alone. We come to tell Him of our love for Him. We come to thank Him. We come to beg His mercy on someone's behalf. We come. We step out of the buzz of our active lives into the gentle silence in His Presence. We come.

BUT, THE QUESTION REMAINS: WHAT SHOULD I "DO" DURING ADORATION?

Here's the best answer: St. John Vianney would notice a peasant come to his small church everyday and sit on the last bench. One day he went up to him and asked him, "My good fellow, what are you doing here? Are you praying? You seem to be doing nothing." And pointing to the Blessed Sacrament, he said in reply, "I look at him - and he looks at me."

BUT GOD NEVER GAVE UP

God has promised never to give up on us. All of the Scriptures Old and New Testaments together are a record of how God never, never, never, never, never gives up.

- Adam and Eve disobeyed the very First Rule. But God never gave up.
- Abraham wandered, and Sarah laughed. But God never gave up.
- Moses hid and shook with fear. But God never gave up.
- Saul went insane. But God never gave up.
- David plotted against Uriah. But God never gave up.
- Ahaz sold out to Assyria. But God never gave up.
- Israel fell into pieces. But God never gave up.
- The Jewish people became exiles. But God never gave up.
- John the Baptist was beheaded. But God never gave up.
- Peter denied he even knew Jesus. But God never gave up.
- The disciples all ran away. But God never gave up.

During Lent, we, too, are given another chance to repent and return to our Heavenly Father's love. We are also expected to give others a second chance when they ask our forgiveness. God would like to use each one of us as the "gardener" in the parable to help Him cultivate our families and communities and enrich them with grace. Let us thank God for using others to help us bear fruit. Grace is everywhere. Let us always cooperate with grace, especially during Lent.

Reflect

"I'M GUILTY, AND I DESERVE TO BE HERE!"

There is a story of how King Frederick II, an Eighteenth Century King of Prussia, was visiting a prison in Berlin. He was going from inmate to inmate, and every one of them was trying to prove how they had been unjustly imprisoned. They all proclaimed their innocence, except one. That one prisoner was sitting quietly in a corner, while all the rest protested their innocence. Seeing him sitting there oblivious to everything else that was going on, the King walked over to him and said, "Son, why are you in here?" He said, "Armed robbery, your Honor," The King said, "Are you guilty?" He said, "Sire, I am guilty, and I deserve to be here." The King then gave an order to the guard and said, "Release this guilty man, I do not want this man corrupting all these other innocent people."

Today's Gospel is Jesus' call to repentance. We need to live lives of repentance, because (a) we never know when we will meet a tragedy of our own. Let us repent while we have the chance. Let us turn to Christ, acknowledge our faults and failings and receive from him mercy, forgiveness and the promise of eternal life. There is no better way to take these words of Jesus to heart than to go to sacramental confession, and there is no better time to go to confession than during Lent. We are unable to predict when a tragic accident may happen to us. Our end may come swiftly – without warning and without giving us an opportunity to repent. (b) Repentance helps us in life and in death. It helps us to live as forgiven people, and helps us to face death without fear. When we repent, we are saying: "I've been going in the wrong direction - I must turn my life around." Repentance begins with an admission of our sin and inadequacy. We cannot see Jesus in all his fullness unless we look at Him through the lens of repentance. Scripture says repentance results in forgiveness, renewal, and redirection. Repentance is a statement of regret for the inner condition of our souls, with a determination to have that condition changed



MARY BRENNER'S BURNING BUSH

In the 1980's Mary Brenner was a divorced mother of seven children who owned a carbon paper manufacturing company in Beverly Hills. She was a friend of all the movie stars, went to their parties, and hobnobbed with celebrities. What turned her around, and made her see life differently? She came across a very touching photograph of the Holocaust. Among the people in the photograph there was a young boy facing a Nazi soldier who was pointing a rifle at him. The child's eyes showed deep fear and bewilderment. Mary Benner looked at that photograph and suddenly realized that life could never be the same for her. She felt an enormous compassion for all those who were victims of brutality, for those who were the most marginalized. She went to the Bishop of San Diego and said, "I'd like to belong to some kind of a religious order and dedicate myself to those people nobody else seems to care for." She wound up being called Sister Antonio, and working with the women in the Tijuana Prison, a women's prison in Mexico. These inmates of the prison were among the most abject, forlorn, and neglected segment of humanity. Sister Antonio became their friend, companion, sister, and mother all in one. That holocaust picture was Mary Brenner's burning bush. Today's first reading speaks of a similar conversion happened to Moses.

SECOND CHANCERS!

History is full of individuals who had their first, second and many other chances before they succeeded. Enrico Caruso was told by one music teacher, "You can't sing. You have no voice at all." Yet he became of the best-loved singers of his time. Beethoven's music teacher said about him, "As a composer he is hopeless." An editor told Louisa May Alcott that she was incapable of writing anything that would have popular appeal. That, of course, was before Little Women. Walt Disney was once fired by a newspaper editor because he was thought to have no "good ideas." Tell that to the millions of people thrilled by Walt's movies. When F. W. Woolworth was 21, he got a job in a store, but was not allowed to wait on customers because he "didn't have enough sense." Each of these famous people proved to have a certain genius," but was it innate or did it grow out of their dedication to developing what they had been given? Somerset Maugham said it best in his autobiography Summing Up, [®] knew that I had no lyrical guality, a small vocabulary, little gift of metaphor. The original and striking simile never occurred to me. Poetic flights...were beyond my powers. On the other hand, I had an acute power of observation, and it seemed to me that I could see a great many things that other people missed. I could put down in clear terms what I saw...I knew that I should never write as well as I could wish, but I thought, with pains, that I could arrive at writing as well as my natural defects allowed." Somerset Maugham discovered the secret of genius. The point is that life does not ask us to become what we are not. The fig tree was only required to produce figs. No more. You and I are asked only to accomplish what our natural gifts allow. BUT WE ARE ASKED TO ACCOMPLISH THAT.

A SACRED PRIVILEGE (40 HOUR ADORATION)



During this final year of the Eucharistic Revival we at St. Matthias have a sacred opportunity to worship and adore the Blessed Sacrament during a 40 Hour Devotion this Lent. The 40 Hour devotion has been observed in the Catholic Church for many years, 40 is a number that is significantly connected with our Lord: the days He fasted, the hours he suffered, the hours He prayed, the days he wandered in the desert!

FROM THE PARISH PASTORAL COUNCIL (PPC)

We held our regular PPC meeting on February 18. The opening prayer was Lectio Divina reflection on a gospel passage. Deacon John Radvanski joined us and gave this update about the Accompaniment Project of our Youth Ministry:

- We are one of 43 parishes accepted to the Accompaniment Project through the National Federation of Catholic Youth Ministry.
- The goal is to have more parish adults accompanying youth and sharing their interests and passions, such as robotics, sports, chess, music, etc., to meet at regular intervals at safe places such as Starbucks, church, home, etc. The hope is that these gatherings and fellowships will help them to express and own their faith better and they will come to Mass, or a youth Mass. This can be achieved through sacred listening in Small Groups with adult mentors present.
- A healthy young person needs to have 5-8 mentors in their lives, including parents. Obviously, adult parishioners are essential partners in this project. Hence the Accompaniment Project plans to train adults in Sacred Listening and Life Skills for helping in the formation of our teens in small groups. More of this update will be communicated to the parish community later.

After Deacon John's update, we proceeded with the rest of the agenda and here are some salient points of that:

- Ash Wednesday services in the church and the logistics of the Drive-Thru Ash distribution
- Promoting the small groups or the Lenten groups of faith sharing. Resources are ready.
- Parish Lenten Retreat is on Saturday, March 15, led by Sr. Terry Rickard, 9 a.m. 12:00 p.m. in SMS cafeteria. PPC members will help/volunteer with the breakfast arrangement and other needs on this retreat day.
- New PPC members are needed. Invitation is in the bulletin.
- Some parishioners had requested the Pastor about adding an Adoration Chapel. Exploration is on and if feasible, a plan will be presented to the diocese.

We concluded the meeting with a short prayer.
