

A Message From The Pastor

Dear Friends,

Is it right that the austerity of Lent is reduced or lessened halfway through Lent? That is what we are doing on this fourth Sunday of Lent, popularly known as "Laetare" Sunday or "Rejoice" Sunday. It may seem strange that the church has chosen to have a joyful celebration today, half way through this penitential season. But why? The Church



wants us to remember that a Christian's joy of living, as promised by Jesus, is not to be lost even in the midst of penance and austerity. In fact, the entrance antiphon of today's liturgy, "Rejoice, Jerusalem, and all who love her..." is meant to affirm that there is much to rejoice about, no matter what our situation is.

A similar doubt can arise when we listen to the gospel of today about the way Jesus treated the woman caught in adultery in John 8:1-11. Was Jesus too "soft" on sin? Bible scholars have some interesting take as to why this passage is omitted by many ancient manuscripts of the gospel. This powerful narrative of Jesus and the accused woman is not found in the earliest and best manuscripts of John and appears in other important manuscripts after Lk. 21:38. Still, early Church authors, such as Papias (ca. A.D. 120) and the author of the Syriac "Teaching of the Twelve Apostles" (3rd cent.), knew of such an incident, and Jerome included it in his translation. For these reasons the story is judged canonical by Catholics.

It might have been omitted in some early rigorist traditions because the early Church, in its struggle to maintain strict penitential discipline, perhaps could not deal with the ease with which Jesus forgave the woman. In this episode Jesus seemed too "soft" on sin. Perhaps for this reason, the story was temporarily set aside by the early Church and was only later granted canonical approval. This precisely is the reason why we need to emphasize this forgiving nature of God all the more. During these Lenten Sundays, we have been reflecting on this merciful love and unconditional acceptance of the sinner as the very nature of God. Pope Francis says:

"Jesus' attitude is striking: we do not hear the words of scorn, we do not hear words of condemnation, but only words of love, of mercy, which are an invitation to conversion. "Neither do I condemn you; go, and do not sin again." Ah! Brothers and Sisters, God's face is the face of a merciful father who is always patient. Have you thought about God's patience, the patience He has with each one of us? That is His mercy. He always has patience, patience with us, He understands us, He waits for us, He does not tire of forgiving us if we are able to return to Him with a contrite heart. "Great is God's mercy," says the Psalm."

We experience this in a very special way in the Sacrament of Reconciliation, or 'Confession' – the name that we are more used to. As already announced, Fr. Lance and I have begun to be available for Confession on Saturdays. This will continue for the remainder of Lent and our parish Penance/
Reconciliation Service will be on Monday, April 7, at 6:30 PM. Both of us have been noticing our parishioners utilizing these opportunities for "housekeeping for the soul" and to feel a sense of inner freedom to experience better relationship with God, self and one another. It is this inner freedom from the Lord that enables us to celebrate Laetare/Rejoice Sunday today, halfway through Lent.

THE FIRST STEP

The parable of the prodigal son: "... we must celebrate and rejoice, because your brother was dead and has come to life again Luke 15: 1-3, 11-32

Why would you apologize to the man who murdered your sister? Jeanne Bishop found herself in that position. Twenty-five years ago, David Biro, then a high school student, murdered Jeanne's sister, Nancy, her husband, Richard, and their unborn child, in their home; the teenager later bragged to a friend about the killings, which led to his arrest and conviction. David received a mandatory life sentence - but changes to sentencing procedures mandated by the Supreme Court meant David could be eligible for a resentencing hearing. After a long struggle, Jeanne had forgiven David, said his name, even prayed for him. But Jeanne, a lawyer, had no idea if she could support David's release. "He's still remorseless," Jeanne told a friend. "How do you know that?" he responded. "You don't know that. You've never even spoken to him." Jeanne was stunned. He was right. Jeanne writes in her book Change of Heart: Justice, Mercy and Making Peace with My Sister's Killer:

"I had spoken about the murders and forgiveness all over the world... I had written articles about forgiving David Biro, given speeches at churches and schools and conferences. But one person I had not told: him. Never once had I communicated my forgiveness to David Biro. I had waited all these years for him to apologize to me. I saw it now with startling clarity: I had to apologize to him, for never telling him that I had forgiven him. I had to go first." And so Jeanne did. In a letter to David Biro, she wrote about how she spoke and wrote publicly about "how I have forgiven you for killing my family members. I never conveyed that forgiveness to you directly; I am sorry for that... It was wrong to tell other people and not the most important person of all: you..."

David wrote back. Jeanne was so nervous that she asked a friend to read the letter first." It's good," he said, and read the 15-page letter to Jeanne. "I know that for a long time you and your family have been looking for me to confess to the murders I committed years ago," David began. "Of course, as you know in the past, I have always maintained my 'innocence.' Well, for a lot of reasons which I'll get into in a little bit, I think the time has come for me to drop the charade and finally be honest. You're right, I am guilty of killing your sister Nancy, and her husband Richard. I also want to take this opportunity to express my deepest condolences and apologize to you." They were words that Jeanne never thought she would hear. "It was beyond anything, I could have asked for and I knew, even as I heard his apology, that it would not have come if I had not gone first. The time I spent waiting for that apology! That was the price I paid for my coldness toward Biro, for holding myself aloof.

I understood for the first time what Jesus was saying to us about apologies: You go first. Don't wait.

Forgiveness and reconciliation are the cutting edge of the Gospel. In the parable of the prodigal son, Jesus holds up the boy's father as a model of such forgiveness. The father runs - runs! - to greet his son and embraces him before the boy can get out one word of his carefully-rehearsed speech; the father welcomes his son home with no recriminations, no conditions, no rancor. The father has never lost hope in his son's return; his love has survived the hurt and anguish of his son's walking out. Despite the hurt his irresponsible son has caused, the father takes the first step in the long road to reconciliation that they - including the older brother - will walk together. Only in breaking down the walls of estrangement we erect, only in healing what divides us, only in crossing the chasms that separate us from one another can we dare to call ourselves disciples of Christ.

STORY FOR TODAY: LOVE TO THE LIMIT

When Heidi Solomon saw Daniel's picture in an adoption magazine, she knew, "This is the one." Five months later, she and husband Rick flew to Romania to adopt a seven-year-old son. The initial love-fest lasted about six months, when Daniel developed a powerful hatred for his adoptive parents, blaming them for leaving him in the horribly utilitarian orphanage for so long. He flew into fits of rage, pounding over a thousand holes in his bedroom walls. When he put a knife to Heidi's throat she decided to stop his education and quit working in order to engage in therapy that demanded spending months by Daniel's side, no farther than three feet apart, recreating the bond that never occurred between mother and child.

Daniel needed to learn Heidi would provide everything for him just as she would for a baby. Diagnosed with attachment disorder, Daniel felt no connection to others. Without empathy, his potential to harm without guilt was great. Heidi's response, broadcast on NPR's This American Life, "You have to love him or else there's no way out of it." Daniel hated the therapy, rejecting it at every turn, but punishment for noncooperation was further holding by Heidi for half-an-hour at a time. Around the third week, Daniel changed. "Before she would tell me not to do this, so then...! would hate her because she told me not to do this. Well, there wasn't a time where I could just go somewhere else and hate her."

After five years of holding therapies, they were surprisingly notified that Daniel would receive an award for being valedictorian of his confirmation class. In an emotional acceptance speech, words catching in his throat, he told his parents he loved them very much for never abandoning him. Creating love is not for the soft and sentimental. Love is a tough business. Could this have been the message of the prodigal son parable all along?

"FORGIVE AND BE FORGIVEN"

Some time ago a woman wrote a letter to Ann Landers describing the terrible relationship that once existed between her and her brother. It took the death of their father to get her to forgive him and to treat him as a brother again. Sometime after their reconciliation, her brother had a heart attack and died in her arms. She ends her letter with this moving paragraph. "I am grateful for the years we had together, but I could scream when I think of all the years we missed because we were too bull-headed and short sighted to try to get along. Now he is gone and I am heartsick."

Today's readings are an invitation to review the relationships in our lives and to bring them into line with Jesus' teachings. We need to accept the fact that we are all prodigal children who have squandered our Father's inheritance. There is a spiritual famine even in countries with a booming economy. Because of this spiritual famine, we resemble the younger son who lived with pigs. Examples of this spiritual famine can be seen in drug and alcohol abuse, fraud and theft in the workplace, murders, abortions and violence, premarital sex, marital infidelity and priestly infidelity, as well as in hostility between people. Sometimes this "spiritual famine" exists in our own families. That is why we condemn some of our family members to "survival-level" existence, and even contribute to the death of some of them, by refusing to associate with them. Let us accept the fact that we have been squandering God's abundant blessings not only in our country and in our families, but also in our personal lives.

"How can I be lost if I'm with you?"

Grandpa and his granddaughter were out for a walk one day when Grandpa realized they had walked a whole lot farther than their normal walks. He asked his granddaughter, "Do you know where we are?" The girl said, "No!" "Do you know how to get home?" Again, the girl said, "No!" Then Grandpa asked, "If you don't know where you are or how to get home, does that mean you're lost?" The girl said, "No, Grandpa! How can I be lost if I'm with you?"

"NO SIR! I SPECIALIZE IN MISDEMEANORS!"

While working as a court-appointed attorney, Emory Potter was assigned a client who had been accused of criminal trespass. Mr. Potter probed his client with some general questions of background. He asked if he had any previous arrests or convictions. The man ashamedly said, "Yes, sir. I've got quite a few." The thorough attorney then asked, "Any felonies?" The man indignantly replied, "No sir! I specialize in misdemeanors!" (Readers~Digest, December 1992, p. 18. Cited in In Other Words).

That sounds like many of us. We know in our minds that we are sinners, but we "specialize in misdemeanors not in felonies," in small sins not in large ones. In our minds, ours are excusable sins. We are like the Pharisee who thanked God he wasn't like the tax collector. His sins fell within a range of acceptability.

"WHY NOT FORGIVE HIM, OFFICER?"

The story is told about a soldier during combat. He was drinking heavily and was a constant menace to his comrades. His commanding officer had had him on the carpet several times. But on this occasion he was ready to throw the book at him. Said the colonel to his lieutenant, "I have given him every break." The officer responded, "Sir, you have punished him and it hasn't worked. Why not forgive him?" The colonel accepted the advice. To the soldier he said, "I have punished you many times. Punishment has not worked. This time I am going to forgive you. Your many offences will be removed from your personnel folder." The soldier, who had expected a court martial, broke down and wept. More to the point, he never drank again.

What a comforting result! Today's gospel speaks of the good news of the young prodigal's "coming home" and rediscovery of his father's forgiving and gratuitous love. It is also the story of a loving and forgiving father who celebrates the return of his prodigal son by throwing a big party in his honor, a banquet celebrating the reconciliation of the son with his father, his family, his community and his God. It is really the Parable of the Forgiving Father, the story of Divine love and mercy for us sinners, a love that is almost beyond belief. The common theme of joy resulting from reconciliation with God and other human beings is announced to all of us present in this church – an assembly of sinful people, ready to receive God's forgiveness and His Personal Presence as a forgiving God in the Holy Eucharist.

WHY CHURCH PROMOTES "CONFESSION"

During this Jubilee Year 2025, we will hear a lot about the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Here's what a blogger has written about this Sacrament so beautifully:

Penance, aka confession, is the sacrament of the forgiveness of sin. You can't beat it for convenience. It's available practically whenever. Tell a priest you want to go to confession and you'll get his attention. One bishop I know was cornered on an airplane. Another passenger figured out what was going on and asked if he could confess too. It must have been an interesting game of musical seats. An interesting question for priests might be: Where was the strangest place you ever administered the sacrament of penance? The answers I've gathered include "in a sports bar, at a graduation party" and "on the golf course, walking up the fairway."



Confession has benefits. Here are ten:

- 1. Confidentiality guaranteed. There's nothing like confessing your sins to someone guaranteed not to tell anyone else. Sometimes you need to talk in absolute confidence. Even under subpoena, a priest can't tell anyone what's said to him in confession. He can't even hint at it. Now that's confidentiality.
- 2. Housekeeping for the soul. It feels good to be able to start a clean life all over again. Like going into a sparkling living room in your home, it's nice when clutter is removed – even if it's your own.


We have planned our 40 Hour Adoration beginning TODAY and ending on Tuesday, April 1st in the main Church.




