A Message From Our Pastor

Dear Friends,

Today we join the rest of the Christian world to celebrate the great feast of Pentecost. Most Christians - Catholic, Orthodox, Anglican, Pentecostal and Charismatic churches as well as most Protestant churches – view this as the



watershed event in Christianity, the birthday of the Church in many ways. The Acts of the Apostles recounts the story of the original Pentecost when the Apostles and the Blessed Virgin Mary, who were gathered in the Upper Room, were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak in different tongues (Acts 2). Peter's speech that day brought about three thousand people to the way of Jesus. (Acts 2:41). And the Church began to grow.

Pentecost is the New Testament celebration of unity that reverses the Old Testament divisions and animosity of the Tower of Babel in Genesis 11:1-9. If the people who wanted to build the Tower of Babel were divided by language and race because of pride and arrogance, people on the Pentecost Day were united despite the diversity of language and race. Thus Pentecost is a feast that invites us to live and promote unity in diversity. Our parish of St. Matthias is a living proof of this diversity while keeping our unity in faith and fellowship.

When 44 youth of our parish received the Sacrament of Confirmation two weeks ago, Bishop Checchio reminded everyone present that the Holy Spirit can transform us into bold witnesses of the gospel. For that to happen, he encouraged all, especially the Confirmandi, to attend the church on a regular basis. During his homily, he asked me a question: "Fr. Abraham, if I give you \$168 and ask you to return to me just \$1, will you accept my offer?" I said yes. And then he told the congregation that God has given us all 168 hours every week for our use and God is asking us to return to God just one hour out of those 168 hours. Spending that one hour in Church every Sunday will have great benefits for us both spiritually and mentally. (Btw, the Bishop still owes me that \$168)

Today's feast of Pentecost often falls in the month of May, which is the month of Our Lady. Pope Francis encourages us to be praying her special prayer – the Rosary – every day. Considering that May is also the Mental Health Awareness month, we should be expressing with particular zeal our petitions for help and our confidence in the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary so that we can experience more peace of mind. Our own young people are inviting all to join the SmyleWithBraces Next Level team and SMYLE Youth Ministry to pray the rosary following the 10:00 Mass this Sunday.

May we all be open to the Holy Spirit who Jesus sends to be our Helper, Comforter and Guide (John 14:16) Let us call upon this Spirit: "Come Holy Spirit, come into my heart and fill me with your grace and power." Repeat it like a mantra and see what happens to you!

Parenting Tune-Up

Today is Pentecost, which refers to 50 days after Easter. It reminds us of fear, community, and bravery. The apostles were afraid after Jesus left them. They gathered together. The Spirit filled them with courage to speak out. Ask your family what helps them be brave? Can anyone identify a recent courageous act?

Marriage Tune-Up

Pentecost is a feast of courage and community. Have you ever feared for the safety of your beloved? When? What helps you keep your marriage vows? Have you ever needed to defend your spouse to others? Stand up for each other's goodness. Gently and privately correct if necessary?



"Are not all these people who are speaking Galileans? Then how does each of us hear them in his native language ...? We hear them speaking in our own tongues of the mighty acts of God." Acts 2: 1-11

Will and Maggie have a secret language. It's a language that has evolved over time. It's a language that transcends the couple's everyday squabbles, distractions and differences in personality and perspective. It's a language grown out of desperation and love. Maggie explains how this "language" works:

"We were on a bus recently with our three children. It was late, it was snowing, everyone was tired and the bus was crowded. I was squeezed on one seat with my two youngest children. Will and our eldest were strap-hanging in the aisle. From behind us came a noise: a crackling, rustling, splitting, then a specific crunch-crunch-crunch. My head spun around my neck, as did Will's. We took in our fellow passenger and his snack for a split second before I shot from my seat, hustling my daughters ahead of me, locking eyes with Will. "And so began our wordless conversation.

"He tilted his head, meaning, Is that person eating nuts in the same airspace as our daughter? "I narrowed my eyes, which meant, Yes, I-m afraid so. "He frowned, to say, Don-t let her breathe in until we get off the bus. "I shrugged, implying, Don't worry, I won't. @We ushered our baffled, uncomprehending children off the bus and into the snow, miles from home.

"I realize this sounds like a deranged thing to do, so let me explain. When our middle daughter was quite young, we learned that she had an immune disorder . . . Just the inhalation of a single particle of nut dust could kill her within 10 minutes. Life, for her, is a series of dangers, strung together, one after another, like beads on a thread . . .

"Will and I must constantly be thinking about how best to protect her - as well as trying to minimize the impact of her condition on her siblings . . . There is a sense of solidarity between us on this one issue. We never argue about how best to take care of our daughter, not because we always agree - far from it - but because we know we need to channel every atom of energy into protecting her and her siblings. When it counts - when it's a situation of life or death - all that stuff and strife is forgotten. The secret code kicks in, and I know one thing: He and I will stand, teeth bared, between death and our daughter, unquestionably united, saying, *Get back, get away. You-re not having her. Not today. Not tomorrow. Not any time soon.*"

Maggie and Will "speak" the language of the Spirit of God, the "language" that collapses disagreements and dissolves self-interests for the sake of a loved one. In their fierce protection of the daughter, God's Spirit enables them to "speak" to one another in the "language" of compassion and care for the good of their children. As the Spirit overcomes the barriers of language and perception to open up the hearts and minds of Peter's listeners on that first Pentecost, that same Spirit "blows" through our own homes and families enabling us to speak and hear God's language of mercy and forgiveness in our love and care for one another. The gift of Pentecost faith enables us to hear the voice of God speaking in the midst of the clamor and busyness, the pain and despair of our everyday lives, inviting us to embrace the life and love of God in our homes and hearts.

We Need to Observe Pentecost Every day!

"It will always be Pentecost in the Church," affirmed Blessed Oscar Romero, Archbishop of El Salvador, on Pentecost Sunday 1978, "provided the Church lets the beauty of the Holy Spirit shine forth from her countenance. When the Church ceases to let her strength rest on the Power from above which Christ promised her and which he gave her on that day; and when the Church leans rather on the weak forces of the power or wealth of this earth, then the Church ceases to be newsworthy. The Church will be fair to see, perennially young, attractive in every age, as long as she is faithful to the Spirit that floods her and she reflects that Spirit through her communities, through her pastors, through her very life" [The Violence of Love, (Farmington, PA: The Plough Pub. Co., 1998).][Pope Francis beatified Archbishop Oscar Romero May 23, 2015.] Archbishop Romero's declaration reminds us -- as does today's Gospel -that Pentecost is not just one day, but every day. Without breath, there is no life. Without the Spirit, the Church is a field of dry, dead bones. The Venerable Fulton J. Sheen once said about the Church, "Even though we are God's chosen people, we often behave more like God@ frozen people-frozen in our prayer life, frozen in the way we relate with one another, frozen in the way we celebrate our Faith." [Pope Benedict XVI declared Bishop Fulton J. Sheen Venerable in June 2012.] Today is a great day to ask the Holy Spirit to rekindle in us the spirit of new life and enthusiasm, the fire of God's love.

Let us repeat Blessed John Henry Cardinal Newman's favorite little prayer:

"Come Holy Spirit, Make our ears to hear your love; Make our eyes to see your love; Make our mouths to speak your love; Make our hearts to seek your love; Make our hands to reach out and touch the world with your love. AMEN."

The Christian Pentecost

Pentecost marks the end and the goal of the Easter season. For Christians, it is a memorial of the day the Holy Spirit descended on the apostles and the Virgin Mary in the form of fiery tongues; an event that took place fifty days after the Resurrection of Jesus. The Paschal mystery -the Passion, the Death, the Resurrection, and the Ascension of Jesus -- culminates in the sending of the Holy Spirit by the Father (at the request of His Son), on Jesus' disciples. The feast also commemorates the official inauguration of the Christian Church by the apostolic preaching of St. Peter, which resulted in the conversion of 3000 Jews to the Christian Faith. Pentecost is, thus, the official birthday of the Church. However, years ago, This Rock Magazine reported that there were 78,444 Protestant denominations, which means that, on the average, more than sixty-nine new denominations had sprung up every year since the Reformation began in 1517. So whose birthday is it anyway? You could say, Pentecost is the birthday of the Church Jesus established nearly 2,000 years ago. Today's Scripture readings remind us that Pentecost is an event of both the past and the present. The main theme of today's readings is that the gift of the Holy Spirit is something to be shared with others. In other words, the readings remind us that the gift of the Holy Spirit moves its recipients to action and inspires them to share this gift with others.

The Jewish Pentecost

Both the Jews and the Christians now celebrate Pentecost. Along with the Feast of the Passover and the Feast of Tabernacles, Pentecost was one of the major feasts of the Jews. During these three great Jewish festivals, every male Jew living within twenty miles of Jerusalem was legally bound to go to Jerusalem to participate in the feast. The word Pentecost is Greek for pentecostes, which means "fiftieth." The feast received this name because it is celebrated fifty days after the Feast of the Passover. Another name for the Jewish Pentecost is Shebuot or @The Feast of Weeks" (the "week" of seven Sabbaths between Passover and Pentecost). It was originally a day of thanksgiving for the completion of the harvest. During Passover, the first omer (a Hebrew measure of about a bushel), of barley was offered to God. At Pentecost, two loaves of bread were offered in gratitude for the harvest. Later, the Jews added to the Feast of Pentecost the element of Yahweh's Covenant with Noah, which took place fifty days after the great deluge. Still later, they made this feast an occasion to thank God for His Sinaitic Covenant with Moses, which occurred fifty days after the beginning of the Exodus from Egypt.

Marian Devotions - 3

The Litany of the Blessed Virgin - also called the Litany of Loreto - is one of the many Marian litanies, or praises of Mary, composed during the Middle Ages. The place of honor it now holds in the life of the Church is due to its faithful use at the shrine of the Holy House at Loreto. Pope Sixtus V definitively approved it in 1587, and all other Marian litanies were suppressed, at least for public use. Through the centuries, at least 7 new invocations to Mary were added. Saint Pope John Paul II added "Mother of the Church" in 1980, and "Queen of families" in 1995. Pope Francis has added three more: "Mater misericordiae", the Latin for "Mother of mercy"; "Mater spei", or "Mother of hope"; and "Solacium migrantium", or "Solace of migrants" are the new invocations to the Blessed Virgin Mary in the Litany of Loreto, which is often recited at the end of the Rosary.

There are forty-nine titles. A few more have been added in some versions: with "Mother of the Church" and "Mother of Mercy" and being the 'official' 'newcomers' in recent times. All these are included on the Vatican website version:

https://www.vatican.va/special/rosary/documents/litanielauretane_en.html. These invocations set before us Mary's exalted privileges, her holiness of life, her amiability and power, her motherly spirit and queenly majesty. Reflection on the titles of the litany, therefore, will unfold before us a magnificent picture of our heavenly Mother, even though we know little about her life. This Litany with all these beautiful invocations is beloved by people throughout the world.

Some Pentecostal Traditions

Some parishes have begun the tradition of encouraging people to wear red clothing on Pentecost, since red is the liturgical color of the day. This reflects the old custom of decorating homes and churches with colorful flowers on this day. In Poland, for example, and among the Ukrainians, Pentecost is sometimes called the "Green Holiday," and in Germany the "Flower Feast." In some Latin countries there is the term "Pascha Rosatum," Latin words that mean "Feast of Roses." In addition, in Italy there is "Pascua Rossa," meaning "Red Pasch," inspired by the red vestments worn on Pentecost. Medieval Christians liked to dramatize the Pentecost symbols of the dove and flames of fire.

Historical accounts tell us, for example, that in France, when the priest intoned the words "Come, Holy Ghost," trumpets would blow, signifying the violent wind of which the scriptures speak. In other countries choirboys would hiss, hum, make odd noises with wind instruments, and rattle their benches. Then from a hole in the wall above, called "The Holy Ghost Hole," a great swinging disk with a beautiful image of a dove would descend, and remain suspended above the middle of the church. From the same opening in the wall would follow a shower of flowers, representing the gifts of the Holy Spirit, and water symbolizing baptism. In the thirteenth century, French cathedrals would release white pigeons inside the buildings, and drop roses from the Holy Ghost Hole. Some towns in central Europe even dropped pieces of burning straw, representing the flaming tongues of Pentecost. This custom eventually found

disfavor, as more and more churches and worshipers caught fire, spiritually and literally.

The Holy Spirit is a Spirit of Communication

There have been numerous books written on the difficulty that men and women have in communicating. It has been estimated that women say something like 6,000 – 8,000 words a day and that men utter 2,000 – 4,000 words a day. At the end of the day the man has spoken his 4,000 words and doesn't want to communicate any more. He simply wants to sit quietly, watch TV and go to bed. A woman most likely won't have spoken her 8,000 words for the day yet. She may have 2-3,000 words to go and uses them to share every event of the day. This conversation may sound familiar. Wife: Hi darling ... it's good to see you home. How was your day? Husband: Good. Wife: I heard that you were going to finalize that big deal today. How did it go? Husband: Fine. Wife: That's good. Do you think the boss will give you a raise? Husband: Maybe. Wife: Hey! Today I found out that I'm pregnant. Husband: That's good. *and so on…* and then she goes on to tell everything in detail that happened in her day. The Holy Spirit communicates with men and women equally through the Holy Bible and inspires them and guides them in their communication with God. May God's Spirit guide and help us as we go out from here today and give us the courage and power to speak his Word to others.

THE HOLY SPIRIT'S POWER IN US

Brothers and Sisters in Christ, My name is Denik Abraham and I am a Eucharistic Minister and a facilitator of a Small Faith Sharing group. When I shared my experience of a miraculous healing with our small group, I was encouraged to share it with the parish.

Last year, I went through a life-threatening illness when my kidneys failed, and I was on dialysis. The medical opinion was scary. It was a long and trying time for me and my family. However, through praying in tongues to the Holy Spirit and the intercession of Mother Mary, I was miraculously and completely healed. When I tell this testimony to people, they acknowledge Mother Mary but ignore what I said about the Holy Spirit.

I wondered if it was because the Power and Gifts of the Holy Spirit (1 Cor 12) are assumed to be a Protestant belief? The Catholic church was and is guided by the Holy Spirit. However we, as people of God, talk about the Holy Spirit only on special occasions like Baptism, Confirmation and Pentecost. This doctrine of the Holy Spirit is taught by the early Catholic church and is reconfirmed every Sunday in the Nicene Creed. The gifts and fruits of the Holy Spirit are power and authority given to us always to do the things Jesus did when he was on earth.

As Catholics, we are very good in following various devotions but most of the time, we fail to pray to the Holy Spirit. I believe, if we pray to the Holy Spirit our church will become more alive and powerful just as in the time of the first Pentecost. (Acts 2). Three thousand people joined the church in one day. That is the power of the Holy Spirit. If we ever believe that we are a powerless Church, we will also struggle to keep our people in Church. Why do we see such a poor percentage of Catholics believing in the presence of our Lord in the Eucharist?

On this feast of Pentecost, we, as a Church, need to awaken the Holy Spirit who dwells in each one of us and then our Church will be on fire. Let's build a personal relationship with the Holy Spirit. In (John 16:13-15) Jesus refers to the Holy Spirit as a helper. He gave his Spirit to us, to guide us (the Church) and live a powerful Christian life.
