## From Our Pastor

Dear Friends,

Today is the World Day of the Poor. It was established by Pope Francis in his Apostolic Letter, Misericordia et Misera, issued on 20 November 2016 to celebrate the end of the Extraordinary
 Jubilee Year of Mercy. In preparation for this year's celebration of the World Day of the Poor, Pope Francis had urged everyone to work toward providing free healthcare, medical examinations, vaccinations, and bill payment assistance to those in need.

The theme for the World Day of the Poor 2023 is a passage from the Book of Tobit: "Do not turn your face away from anyone who is poor." The Pope stressed that "a great river of poverty is traversing our cities and swelling to the point of overflowing; it seems to overwhelm us, so great are the needs of our brothers and sisters who plead for our help, support and solidarity." This is literally true in our own area as our St. Vincent De Paul Society is overwhelmed with requests for help in the recent months. Helping those in need is something that we here at St. Matthias, have been passionate about through the ministry of St. Vincent DePaul Society, and we can be happy that we are helping as many deserving individuals and families as we can.

Last Sunday we revived the Children's Liturgy of the Word, which we had suspended during Covid. ## A General's New Mission

The parable of the talents: | For to everyone who has, more will be given, and he will grow rich; but from the one who has not, even what he has will be taken away." Matthew 25: 14-30
"Green Berets don't get post-traumatic stress disorder. Especially generals. You don't seek help. You tough it out." That's what Brigadier General Donald Bolduc thought. But shortly after returning from eight combat tours, General Bolduc began suffering from severe headaches. He was moody, he couldn't sleep - even his balance was off. It took 12 years from his first battlefield trauma for him to seek help. But at his wife's urging, he did the unthinkable in the hyper macho culture of the military: he sought medical help. He learned that he not only suffered from PTSD, but he also had a bullet-size spot on his brain, an injury probably suffered in a helicopter crash in Afghanistan in 2005 that the general walked away from.

After three years of treatment, General Bolduc is doing well. He is now commander of American Special Operations Forces, battling terrorist groups in Africa - and he has become an evangelist for letting soldiers in his command know that it's all right to get help for mental health problems and brain injuries. He makes it clear to his soldiers - who are stationed in some of the world's most dangerous places - that seeking help will not hurt their careers. To their CO, PTSD is the same as a broken arm. "The powerful thing is that I can use myself as an example," the 54-year-old general says. "And thank goodness not everybody can do that. But I'm able to do it, so that has some sort of . . . credibility to it."

General Bolduc's initiative is helping bring an end of the stigma attached to seeking help for PTSD. Other highranking officers are coming forward, as well, talking openly about their struggles with post-combat stress and brain injuries. The Defense Department estimates that a quarter
of all injuries suffered by U.S. military in Afghanistan and Iraq were brain injuries and as many as 20 percent of veterans of those two conflicts experience post-traumatic stress disorder. General Bolduc tells his personal story every time a new soldier comes into his command and urges anyone experiencing the same kind of symptoms to get help.

Recently, General Bolduc was visiting a team under his command who had just returned from battle. He asked how many of them had been close to blasts, bombs and mortar shells. Everyone raised a hand. The he asked how many had sought treatment. No one's hand went up. General Bolduc told them his own story. All of them men decided to get exams. Doctors found a tumor in one soldier's brain, and he was flown to Walter Reed in Washington for treatment.

An Army general uses his experience and position to confront a serious medical and psychological issue affecting thousands of soldiers. He devotes the "talents" entrusted to him - leadership, experience, courage - to realize a harvest of hope and healing, to bring light to those lost in a darkness of illness and fear. The parable of the talents focuses on the critical question of not what we possess in terms of talent and ability but on our willingness to use those skills to make the Kingdom of God a reality here and now. We may have the skills to lead men and women into combat - or we may be able to bring healing to others by our simple but under-appreciated ability to listen to them in their pain. We may have the opportunity to influence the lives of many people - or we may be a good mom or dad to our own children; we may have the skills to manage big organizations that accomplish much good - or we may take a regular turn at the local soup kitchen. The Spirit of God prompts us to use whatever our "talents" for the common good, for bringing healing to the broken and hope to the struggling, for making the peace of Kingdom of God a reality in our time and place.

## Give it your best Shot!

Tom Dempsey was born without a right hand and with only half a right foot. Tom went to school and played football. He even played on a junior college team in California. In time he began to place kick for the team. He got so good that eventually he was signed by the New Orleans Saints. On November 8, 1970, the Saints were trailing Detroit 17-16 with two seconds to go. They had the ball on the Detroit 45 yard line. New Orleans coach J. D. Roberts tapped Tom on the shoulder and said, "Go out there and give it your best shot!" The holder set the ball down eight yards behind the line of
scrimmage, instead of seven, to give Dempsey a split second more time to get the ball off. This put the ball 63 yards from the uprights. The rest of the story is history. Tom's half a right foot made perfect contact. Tom later said in Newsweek Magazine: "I couldn't follow the ball that far. But I saw the official's arms go up, and I can't describe how great I felt." The Saints won the game 19-17, and Dempsey shattered the NFL field goal record by seven yards. What does this story have to do with today's Scripture readings especially Jesus' point in today's Gospel?

## "Do you want a chance to change the World?"

Steven Jobs is the man who founded the enormously successful company called Apple Computer. Jobs decided that Mr. John Sculley was the man he needed to help him fulfill his dream of building a completely different kind of computer company, one which would make computers available to every person in the world. However, Mr. Sculley was comfortably and safely entrenched as president of the Pepsico Corporation, the makers of the soft drink Pepsi. In this position, John Sculley had obtained everything that a man could want: power, prestige, public recognition, an enormous salary and a secure future. The thought of a career change requiring a move to the West Coast frightened him. He was concerned about losing pensions and deferred compensation and the adjustment to living in California, in other words, "the pragmatic stuff that preoccupies the middle-aged." He says, "I was overly concerned with what would happen next week and the week after next." John Sculley knew that he was safe and happy at Pepsico. But he also
knew that he had grown to dislike the competitive nature of the business. He also knew how bored he was. Steven Jobs at Apple Computer sensed this. And so he finally confronted his new friend with this pointed question.
He said to John, | Do you want to spend the rest of your life selling sugared water or do you want a chance to change the world?"
That question penetrated deep into the heart and mind of John Sculley. It changed the course of his life. He therefore went to Apple Computer and helped it to grow into one of the most successful corporations in the world. Mr. Sculley's life was changed because he took the risk and decided to invest in himself and others, and to grow. [John Sculley, Odyssey (New York: Harper \& Row, 1987), p. 90.]

## Nine Lepers or one Leper?

There are basically two types of people in our world: the grateful and the ungrateful. The Gospel for Thanksgiving tells the story of the ten lepers whom Jesus healed (Luke 17: 11-19). Only one of them, a Samaritan-a Jew despised and held unclean for being in schism - returned to give Him thanks. The other nine (who were "real" Jews), apparently considered their healing as something they had a right to, whereas the Samaritan took it as an undeserved gift from God. This Gospel reminds us that even God desires our gratitude. "Where are the other nine?" Jesus asked with pain. (Confer also Is 1:3-5.)
That is why St. Paul admonishes us, | Always be thankful" (Col 3:17). It is a Christian's duty as well as a privilege to be grateful for the blessings of God (Deuteronomy 8:10; Psalm 107:19, 21; Colossians 1:12-14; Philippians 1:3). "Give thanks to the Lord, for He is good. His love endures forever ${ }^{\circledR}(1$ Chronicles 16:34). (Refer to Psalm 107:1, John 11:41, Eph. 5:20, and Col. 3:17 for Biblical prayers and expressions of thanksgiving.)

## Gathered around the altar celebrating the

 Eucharist, we find that our expression of thanks becomes part of the great Thanksgiving Prayer of Christ which joins the mighty chorus of all God's people. We should give thanks for this parish community in which we gather together. It is in this community that we meet Christ in the Breaking of the Bread and receive the Sacraments that nourish and strengthen us along the way. Hence, "let us give thanks to the Lord our God. For it is right to give God thanks and praise!"

## "The saints of God speak the same language." Somali proverb

The saints of Africa number in the thousands (including 3 Popes) and today, Africans are the fastest growing population in the entire global Catholic Church. Currently, there are six African Americans on the road to sainthood. Throughout the month of November, we will feature the six African Americans on this journey - Servants of God, Sr. Thea Bowman, Julia Greeley, and Mary Lange, and the Venerables Pierre Toussaint, Henriette Delille and Augustus Tolton, born of slaves in the US and ordained as the first African American priest. Today, we feature Venerable Mother Mary Lange.


Venerable Mother Mary Lange - Born as Elizabeth around 1794 in Santiago de Cuba, she lived in a primarily French-speaking community. Early the 1800 s she left Cuba and settled in the United States in Baltimore. She was a courageous, loving, and deeply spiritual woman. There was no free public education for African American children in Maryland until 1868, so she responded to that need by opening a school for the children in her home in the Fells Point area of the city. Providence intervened through the person of Reverend James Hector Joubert, SS, who was encouraged by James Whitfield, Archbishop of Baltimore to present Elizabeth Lange with the idea to found a religious congregation for the education of African American girls. Father Joubert provided direction, solicited financial assistance, and encouraged other "women of color" to join this first congregation of African American women religious in the history of the Catholic Church. Elizabeth, joyfully accepting the idea. She and three other women professed their vows and became the Oblate Sisters of Providence July $2^{\text {nd }}, 1829$. As foundress and first superior general, she took the religious name Mary. William Cardinal Keeler, Archbishop of Baltimore, opened a formal investigation into her life and works of charity in 1991. The Vatican's Congregation for the Doctrine for the Causes of Saints approved the cause of her sainthood in 2004, and Archbishop William Lori of Baltimore celebrated a canonical celebration at the transfer and blessing of her remains. The faithful venerated the relics before they were sealed in a reliquary and sarcophagus in the chapel's oratory. Pope Francis named her as Venerable on June 22, 2023.
