From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Friends,

Before even recovering from the Thanksgiving busy-ness, Advent season is upon us! Advent invites us to pay attention to the special music, prayers, reflections and church environment calling us to slow down and ponder this epochmaking event in history – the birth of Christ. Though a very



special time for spiritual preparation for Christmas, Advent can pass us by as we get lost in the bright lights and hectic holiday rush. So, what should we do, not to lose the fruits of this important season?

One way to be living the spirit of Advent is to have some Advent devotion. A daily short reflection on an advent theme or Scripture will help us tremendously. Many resources are available online. A few years ago, I was pleasantly surprised to read that the LifeWay Christian Resources of the Southern Baptist Convention published Advent devotional books. According to Stan Norman, a Church historian and provost of Oklahoma Baptist University, Baptists have begun to see the usefulness of traditions once viewed as too liturgical or high church as these practices "seem to provide a bit of structure in a tradition that has maybe gone too far without structure." This shift is also seen with other Christian Churches that have begun to offer tips about having Advent wreaths, candles and calendars for observing this holy season.

The popular and traditional practice of Advent wreath reminds us certain aspects of this sacred season. There are various explanations for each candle on the evergreen. Here's how one tradition thinks of the four candles: The first purple candle is called 'Prophecy Candle' in remembrance of the prophets, primarily <u>Isaiah</u>, who foretold the birth of Christ (Isaiah 7:14). This first candle represents hope or expectation in anticipation of the coming Messiah. The second purple candle is the 'Bethlehem Candle' symbolizing the manger of Baby Jesus (Luke 2:12) representing love. The pink or rose-colored candle on the third Sunday is the 'Shepherd's Candle,' symbolizing joy (Luke 2:8-11). The fourth candle, purple in color, is the 'Angel's Candle,' representing peace (Luke 2:13-14). Here at St. Matthias, a family or an individual from our community will light these candles at each of our weekend Masses. Let us take to heart its meaning and symbolism and live them.

But there is another excellent practice that is often overlooked or taken lightly: the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Advent and Lent are traditional liturgical seasons when Catholics make an extra effort to cleanse their souls. A good confession can be one of the best ways to welcome the Lord Jesus into our hearts and thus enter into the joy of Christmas. Both of us priests plan to be available for confessions during the whole season of Advent: weekdays after the 8 am Mass, and Saturdays from 3:00 – 4:30 pm. If these times are not convenient, you can call any of us and make an appointment. I would encourage you to plan early to take advantage of this Sacrament that brings so much peace of heart.

Finance Council Update to the Parish

November 2021

Good News

Our year ending June 30, 2021 shows a significant turnaround as you can see on the Financial Report on the reverse page. The prior year ended with a deficit of \$191,831, to a surplus this past year of \$144,846, a positive swing of \$336,677. Many factors helped. While revenue was down \$352,531 the major expense category of Salaries and Benefits was reduced by \$521,884. Our Pastor, Parish and School staffs have worked hard to maintain operations and ministries with reduced personnel.

Open Issues

After many requests to the Diocese for information regarding the resolution of Father Doug's investigation and prosecution we still don't know where we stand. We have asked for information on the insurance policy and claim, and for forgiveness of old Diocesan assessments not paid during Father Doug's tenure, and for the Diocesan audit and records. We refer you to the letter from Chancellor Kearns from the Diocese that was published last week. This provided more information and some clarification but is still not what we have been asking for. Current assessments are not being paid, but are expensed and booked as an account payable. Current Property and Liability Insurance is now being paid to the Diocese but three old years are also expensed and booked as an account payable.

Covid is also still an issue affecting our finances. Our School is running at a deficit (\$119,622 for 2020-21) but our leadership has done a good job with controlling expenses. Our Pastor is committed to our Church and School being considered one entity and helping the School as needed as it moves forward. Your support and promotion of our school is encouraged.

FYI

Our Parish has not done significant capital improvements in some time, but using some restricted donations we should be able to move forward on some improvements. (The parking lot, refinishing the pews and other areas are being considered). Solar panels and new roofs are being addressed at no capital outlay and with projected future savings in utility cost. Our federal Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) loan has been reviewed by the SBA, and has been approved to be converted to a grant (loan forgiveness).

Moving Forward Together

The strong core of parishioner support in our parish will insure a sound financial position. Putting these past years behind and looking forward we should be able to resume higher levels of ministries, faith formation, social concerns, and most importantly spending more time together at Mass and parish functions. Thanks to everyone for the continued stewardship of their Time, Talent, and Treasure. With prayer and hope and continued action by all we can see the light at the end of the tunnel.





Advent Grows in Popularity!

Advent is no more a practice restricted to the every detail of preparation take on an urgency. mainline Churches (Catholic, Orthodox, Anglican/Episcopalian, Lutheran, Methodist and

Presbyterian). Today, however, more and more Protestant and Evangelical Christians are recognizing the spiritual significance of Advent, and have begun to revive the spirit of the season through serious reflection, joyful expectation, and even through the observance of some of the traditional Advent customs.

First Sunday of Advent: The Martian

"But when these signs begin to happen, stand erect and raise your heads because your redemption is at hand." Luke 21: 25-28, 34-36

'The Martian' was one of the compelling movies of the year of its release. Mark Watney is part of a six-person mission to Mars. During a raging windstorm, the astronauts have to evacuate the planet. In the chaos to get to the launcher, Watney is struck by a piece of debris and blown away. The crew can't find him and are forced to leave him behind. But Watney survives. And so begins an intense scramble on both Mars and Earth to bring Mark Watney home. As the story unfolds, we become caught up, first, with the preciousness and limits - of time. Every single item Mark has on Mars is carefully measured: every drop of water, every potato he is able to grow, every bit of power - and every minute. Mark meticulously rations every necessity in terms of days and weeks and months in order to survive on the Martian surface.

On Earth, meanwhile, NASA engineers and scientists go to work to bring Mark home, constantly aware of time. Every moment of the 400 days needed to get a rescue mission together is critical - and there are only certain windows of time when such a rescue can be launched. Every day and

And we also become aware of the power of hope. Mark is utterly alone on this cold, lifeless, red rock. But Mark never loses hope. He approaches every new crisis as an exercise in problem-solving. His challenge is to get his fear and despair under control long enough to think through each situation. Back on Mother Earth, NASA scientists and engineers work long hours and concoct crazily innovative solutions, taking huge risks in the process. And Mark's crew mates selflessly commit to another 533 days in space in order to "slingshot" their spacecraft around Earth to return to Mars and rescue Mark.

Everyone in the film is convinced that humankind survives because we possess the ability to work together to solve problems. As the director of NASA flight operations reminds the team cobbling the rescue mission together, one human life is priceless, well worth moving heaven and earth for.

The preciousness of time and of hope that never wavers is the call of this Advent season. These first four weeks of the liturgical year point to the reality that our lives, measured in a finite period of days, find their meaning and purpose in seeking the things of God: compassion, peace, reconciliation and justice. And Advent also calls us to embrace a spirit of hope: that, in imitating the selflessness of the Christ who comes at Christmas, we can realize the Kingdom of God in our own time and on our own "planet"; that the light of God's Messiah illuminates our vision enabling us to see our world and ourselves as God sees us: as a people formed and bound by the unimaginable and unconditional - but very real - love of God.

Two Versions of the End Time Events

Today we move from the year of Mark (B) to the year of Luke (C). In fact, today's Gospel is Luke's version of the Gospel which we read two weeks ago from Mark. Luke seems to be the first evangelist who believed that everyone in his community would die a natural death before Jesus triumphantly returned in the Parousia. Still, many years after Mark's Gospel, Luke wrote about the Parousia. Comparing Mark 13: 24-32 which we read two Sundays ago with Luke 21: 25ff, which we read today, we note that Luke has reduced the scope of the spectacular celestial events of the Last Days and has omitted Mark's description of the Son of Man. The reason for these changes may lie in the events filling the years between Mark's Gospel (AD 69), and Luke's work (AD 80). Mark wrote his Gospel sometime before the

fall of Jerusalem in AD 70 when the Jewish Christians believed that the fall of Jerusalem and the destruction of the Temple would coincide with the end of the world and the second coming of Jesus. But when Jerusalem and the Temple were destroyed, the world did not end. Perhaps taking this into account, Luke, completing his gospel in A.D. 80, dissociated the destruction of the Temple from Jesus' prediction of the end of the world. In today's gospel passage Jesus warns us to keep watch for his return in glory. He draws on Old Testament images of chaos and instability – turmoil in the heavens (see <u>Isaiah 13:11,13;Ezekiel 32:7-8</u>; <u>Joel 2:10</u>); roaring seas (see <u>Isaiah 5:30</u>; <u>17:12</u>); distress among the nations (see <u>Isaiah 8:22</u>/14:25) and terrified people (see <u>Isaiah 13:6-11</u>).

Several years ago a bus driver in Oklahoma reached an

unusual record. In 23 years he had driven a bus over 900,000 miles without a single accident. When asked how he had done it, he gave this simple answer: "Watch the road." In today's Gospel Jesus gives the same advice in several ways: "Be vigilant at all times," "Stand erect," "Raise your heads," "Beware that

your hearts do not become drowsy."
This is not only a good spiritual advice for the Advent season but also a safe rule for daily life. A good football player or basketball player should always concentrate his attention on the ball and the players. A good student must be alert, awake and attentive, watching the teacher and listening to his or her words. A good Catholic in the Church

must be physically and mentally alert, watching the altar and actively participating in the prayers and songs. Like the Roman god Janus, who had two faces, one looking at the past year and the other looking into future, Christians during the Advent season are to look at the past event of the first coming of Jesus into the world and expectantly look forward to his second coming in glory.


