

# **From Our Pastor**

Dear Friends,

Today is World Mission Sunday. It is our chance to show love and solidarity to our brothers and sisters overseas who share our faith. In offering our prayers and donations, we join with missionaries everywhere in communion and compassion to support them in spreading the Good News. Pope Francis has a beautiful message for this occasion. Let me quote just two paragraphs:

For this year's World Mission Sunday, I have chosen a theme inspired by the story of the disciples on the way to Emmaus, in the Gospel of Luke (cf. 24:13-35): "Hearts on fire, feet on the move". Those two disciples were confused and dismayed, but their encounter with Christ in the word and in the breaking of the bread sparked in them the enthusiastic desire to set out again towards Jerusalem and proclaim that the Lord had truly risen. In the Gospel account, we perceive this change in the disciples through a few revealing images: their hearts burned within them as they heard the Scriptures explained by Jesus, their eyes were opened as they recognized him and, ultimately, their feet set out on the way. By meditating on these three images, which reflect the journey of all

missionary disciples, we can renew our zeal for evangelization in today's world.

The image of "feet setting out" reminds us once more of the perennial validity of the missio ad gentes, the mission entrusted to the Church by the risen Lord to evangelize all individuals and peoples, even to the ends of the earth. Today more than ever, our human family, wounded by so many situations of injustice, so many divisions and wars, is in need of the Good News of peace and salvation in Christ. I take this opportunity to reiterate that "everyone has the right to receive the Gospel. Christians have the duty to announce it without excluding anyone, not as one who imposes a new obligation, but as one who shares a joy, signals a beautiful horizon, offers a desirable banquet" (Evangelii Gaudium, 14). Missionary conversion remains the principal goal that we must set for ourselves as individuals and as a community, because "missionary outreach is paradigmatic for all the Church's activity" (ibid., 15). (It is very easy to google and read the full message of the Pope).

I myself had many beautiful experiences as a missionary priest in the Diocese of Kohima in the north-eastern Indian state of Nagaland, prior to my coming to the USA. Being one with the simple folks in their own struggles gave me so much contentment. Living with minimum conveniences in the mission lands (no regular power, no heating during winter, no running water, etc.), I was happy to join other missionary priests, nuns, catechists, and parish leaders to bring the good news of Jesus Christ to those who were eager to know the truth of the Catholic Church. I'm sure our Fr. Lancelot also will have many beautiful missionary experiences to share with us.

How wonderful that we have missionaries coming from different countries to St. Matthias to make the Mission Appeal (as part of the Missionary Cooperation Plan of our Diocese) each year. We have been very generous in our financial support of the Missions. Let us do the same on this World Mission Sunday. In a world where so much divides us, let us rejoice in our unity as missionaries through our Baptism, as it offers each one of us an opportunity to support the life-giving presence of the Church among the poor and marginalized in more than 1,111 mission dioceses.

# True Christian Life is the Best Witness

The most powerful means of fulfilling the mission of Jesus (Evangelization) is by living a truly Christian life --



a life filled with love, mercy, kindness, compassion and a forgiving spirit. Mr. Gandhi used to say:

"My life is my message." He often challenged the Christian missionaries to observe the "apostolate of the rose." A rose doesn't preach. It simply radiates its fragrance and attracts everyone to it by its irresistible beauty. Hence, the most important thing is not the Gospel we preach, but the life we live. This is how the early Christians evangelized. Their Gentile neighbors used to say: "See how these Christians love one another." The Christ they recognized and accepted was the Christ who lived in each Christian.

# The Grace of "ohana"

# "Give to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God." Matthew 22: 15-21

In Hawaii, it is called *ohana* — "family." *Ohana* is a sensibility, a way of thinking, that embraces everyone as family, as community. *Ohana* is a unifying principle in a fragmented world. In the wake of the devastating fires that destroyed much of Lahaina on the island of Maui, the concept of *ohana* has taken on profound importance. *Ohana* is solace in a time of calamity, compassionate sacrifice for those in pain or despair. *Ohana* envisions everyone as brother and sister, father and mother.

The spirit of *ohana* has been the driving force as Lahaina begins the overwhelming prospect of rebuilding the thousands of homes destroyed by the deadliest wildfire in the United States in more than a century. More than 2,000 structures burned to the ground; the cost to rebuild Lahaina has been estimated to cost more than \$5 billion. In the spirit of *ohana*, Hawaiians all over the state have mobilized to provide food, clothes and everyday necessities to the thousands of families who lost everything — including hundreds of loved ones.

The stories of *ohana* are endless — and inspiring: Every form of seacraft has been pressed into service — from large tourist boats to jet skis to canoes — to ferry food, clothing, generators, tools and building supplies. Hotels have mobilized to provide temporary housing. Colleges and community groups have opened kitchens and dining facilities.

To the Hawaiian people, *ohana* never breaks but only gets stronger in times of crisis. One Lahaina resident says that despite the devastation, "*ohana* was never lost. It never left. We will always come to each other's aid." [Associated Press, The Christian Science Monitor.]

The spirit of ohana is at the heart of today's Gospel. Rejecting the Pharisees' attempts to trap Jesus in a Godversus-Caesar controversy, Jesus calls for a ohana-like perspective: to look beyond simplistic politics and blackand-white legalisms to realize the dignity possessed by every man, woman and child as God's sons and daughters, brothers and sisters to one another. Authentic faith is a matter of fully embracing our baptismal call to give thanks to the God of all blessings by sharing those blessings with all, to take on God's entrusting to us the work of being prophets of God's justice and peace and agents of that justice in our own corner of the vineyard. We are called by Jesus to understand our shared responsibility to provide for the common good and to protect the most vulnerable among us in a spirit of ohana: that we are all family to one another in God.

# We are one Nation under God!

Not long ago in Blackwood, New Jersey, the Third U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled that the senior class could not have a non-sectarian prayer at commencement. The senior class had voted to offer this prayer: "Please bless us in the future and thank you for the blessings of the past. God keep a watchful eye on us in the future. Amen." The court backed the ACLU's contention that the prayer was unconstitutional. But surely our constitution's authors did not mean to prohibit 17- and 18-year-olds from saying such a prayer if they elected to do so. The principal of that high school did have the last word. At the end of his commencement speech he declared, "God bless you and God bless the United States of America!" Immediately the students jumped to their feet and applauded. We are not "one nation without a God." We are not "one nation afraid to name its God." We are "one nation under God."

"Give to God what is God's." How? Since everything is God's, we must give ourselves to Him 100%, not just 10% on Sundays. We should be generous in fulfilling our Sunday obligations and find time every day for prayer and worship in the family, for the reading of the Bible and the proper training of our children in Faith and morals. St. Augustine teaches that when we truly succeed in "giving to God what is God's," we are "doing justice to God." This requires that we return to God, with dividends, that which God has entrusted to us, remembering that we are mere managers or stewards of God's gifts. We will soon be invited to make the stewardship pledge of our financial offering to the local Church for the coming year. Our contribution to the parish Church should be an expression of our gratitude to God, giving back to God all that he has given us. This will help us to combat the powerful influence of materialism in our lives and enable the Church to do God's work. Our cash offerings signify our commitment to the ministries of the Gospel, the activities of the Risen Lord. Every pledge enables and empowers ministry. Every pledge, every dollar, touches a human life and brings it closer to God. Every pledge, every dollar given, is transformed into love for someone else and for ourselves. Active participation in the various ministries of the parish is the offering to God of our time and talents, yet another way of giving to God his due, our whole self.

# Render to God, Render to Caesar!

American heritage is full of Christian influence. When the Pilgrims landed at Plymouth in 1620, they paused to write the Mayflower Compact, the first law of American shores. It reads in part: "In the name of God, Amen. We whose names are underwritten ... having undertaken for the glory of God and advancement of the Christian Faith ... a voyage to plant the first colony in the northern parts of

Virginia." George Washington, in his first presidential inauguration, added to his oath, "So help me God" and then kissed the Bible. (It is disputed if George Washington added the words "So help me God" to the oath or somebody else). Ben Franklin, in 1778 at the Constitutional Convention, made motion that proceedings each day be opened with prayer. He said, "I have lived for a long time, and the longer I live, the more convincing proof I see of this truth, that God governs the affairs of men. If a sparrow cannot fall to the ground without His notice, is it probable that an Empire can rise without His aid? We have been assured by the Holy Scriptures that 'Except the Lord build the house, they labor in vain to build it.' I firmly believe this, and I also believe that without His concurring aid, we shall proceed in this political building no better than the founders of Babel." Every Presidential inaugural speech, save one, has mentioned God. Our coins have In God We Trust on them. The Ten Commandments are mostly still in our law books, forbidding theft, lying, murder, and such. Congress is still opened with prayer. George Washington, in his farewell address, said: "The truth is, politics and morality are inseparable. As morality's foundation is religion, religion and politics are necessarily related." So you see, politics and religion can and have mixed in our nation's past. Fact is, as Jesus did say, we have something as Christians to render to God as well as something to render to Caesar!



# "American Prometheus"

In Greek mythology, the Titan god
Prometheus is condemned by Zeus for
stealing fire from the gods and giving it to
humans, thus giving the human race the

means for their own destruction.

Kai Bird and Mertin Sherwin titled their 2006 Pulitzer Prizewinning biography of J. Robert Oppenheimer American Prometheus — and now Christopher Nolan has based his extraordinary film Oppenheimer on Bird and Sherwin's work. The book and film tell a story of genius, hubris and error, chronicling the life of the brilliant theoretical physicist, celebrated in some quarters as the father of the atomic bomb.

In 1942, despite his liberal political and social leanings and his "complicated" personal life, Oppenheimer is recruited by the U.S. government to head up the Manhattan Project. In the isolated Los Alamos, New Mexico desert, he heads a team of brilliant scientists and engineers to harness nuclear reactions to create a weapon that, they hoped, would end the war in Europe and the Pacific.

At the beginning, the goal of the project is clear: beat Hitler to the punch and save American lives. But what starts as a desperate military strategy to catch the Nazis becomes a moral quandary for Oppenheimer. He becomes haunted by the weapon he is creating.

It is the famed physicist Nils Bohr, Oppenheimer's onetime teacher and mentor, who articulates so clearly what is at stake. Visiting the top-secret Los Alamos site, Bohr says to his student:

"The power you are about to reveal will forever outlive the Nazis, and the world is not prepared. We have to make the politicians understand, this isn't a new weapon, it is a new world... You are an American Prometheus, the man who gave them the power to destroy themselves. And they'll respect that. And your work really begins soon."

Later, as he watches the first test bomb, Oppenheimer says aloud the infamous words that he said crossed his mind as the mushroom cloud rose over the New Mexico desert: "Now I am become death, the destroyer of worlds."

The story of J. Robert Oppenheimer and the Manhattan Project begins as a battle between warring political and national entities, but Oppenheimer soon realizes his work transcends any battle lines — what he has midwifed is the birth of a new world. Oppenheimer and Bohr come to understand that the lines we have drawn and the boundaries we have erected in order to make sense of our lives collapse before God. God calls us to realize his hand in all things, his spirit making all things whole and good, his vision creating a human family united in his peace, justice and mercy. The confrontation over Caesar's coin is neither the final answer to any church-versus-state controversy nor an all-purpose formula for dealing with life's big questions. Jesus appeals to us to look beyond the simplistic politics and black-and-white legalisms represented by Caesar's coin and realize that we are called to embrace the values centered in a faith that sees the hand of God in all things and every human being as being part of one human family under the providence of God.

# Check your heart's investments!

When he says, "Give to Caesar what is Caesar's and to God what is God's," Jesus is asking us whether we have invested our heart in the right place, in something worthy of our life's blood, something that will yield a return that's worthy of a whole human life. There is only one way to find out where our hearts are. Let us check our daily choices, the little ones as well the big ones, and look for the patterns: What do we usually do when decision time comes for where we will spend our prime time and our best energies? These are the infallible indicators of what we truly value, and what we don't. Whose image do others see when they look at our life? When people see us, do they see Jesus engraved upon us? To the extent that they do, that's the extent to which we belong to the Kingdom of God.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

On October 22, as we observe World Mission Sunday, we stand in solidarity with the Missions of the Church in this annual worldwide Eucharistic celebration.

Pope Francis reflected on this year's theme: "Hearts on fire, feet on the move." The Holy Father invites us to kindle the fire of Christ's love in our hearts and to actively share this warmth with the world around us. Inspired by the Holy Spirit, we go forth and bring the Good News to all corners of the world.

Founded by French laywoman Blessed Pauline Jaricot in 1822, the Society for the Propagation of the Faith is an essential source of aid for the Church's missionary work. In the United States, we benefited from these donations: up until 1908, we received close to 7 million dollars, the equivalent of over 250 million today. Those dioceses in our country, considered mission territories, continued to receive subsidies. Fairbanks, Alaska, was the last of those dioceses and received its final subsidy payment this year!

The World Mission Sunday collection assists the Holy Father meet his Petrine obligation to build up the Church in over 1,100 dioceses and territories that are too young and/or too poor to sustain themselves. Offerings support the formation of seminarians and religious men and women, assist in the construction of schools and orphanages and enables missionaries to build churches in remote and resource-limited areas, and to meet essential works to proclaim the Gospel and celebrate the Sacraments.

Embodying this year's theme, I urge you to keep your hearts aflame and your feet moving this World Mission Sunday. Your prayers are invaluable, and your financial support provides life- giving aid to our brothers and sisters in the world's most vulnerable communities.

# WHO WAS ST. LUKE?

## CONTINUED FROM LAST WEEK

Luke's meticulous writings make up the largest part of the New Testament. He is credited with writing about 27%. It was his goal to write an orderly account of the life

of Jesus and the early history of the Church after His Ascension. He addressed his Gospel and Acts to Theophilus, a wealthy and prestigious Roman learning about Christianity and probably preparing to convert. Luke wanted to present Christianity as a legitimate religion to be embraced by the gentile world.

Luke's gospel is alive with vivid parables of Jesus, more than in any other gospel. In his writings, Luke continuously writes about the compassion and love for humanity expressed by Jesus in his teachings, particularly for the poor and the marginalized. It is in Luke we learn of the Prodigal Son, the Good Samaritan and other parables of Jesus that do not

appear in any other gospel.

There is some disagreement about the death of Luke. Some scholars state that he was martyred. Others claim he lived a long life and died at about the age of 84, in Thebes Greece. In 357 AD his remains, for protective reasons, were transferred to Constantinople. Eventually his casket and the majority of his remains came to Padua Italy, to the basilica of St. Justina.

In conclusion, Luke has brought Jesus alive through his writings. He has presented Jesus as the savior for the whole universe, as a God who came not just for a few, but for all. He is honored as the patron saint of physicians, surgeons and artists, not only by Catholics but also by other major denominations.

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


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
