A Message From Our Pastor

Dear Friends,

In a few days, we enter some very important events in the church's calendar.

All Saints Day is this Friday (November 1), a Holy Day of Obligation. We have three Masses that day: 8 am, 12:10 pm and 7:30 pm, so that we can attend any Mass at our

convenience. The Bible reminds us that the number of those saved are "a great multitude, which no one could count, from every nation,

race, people, and tongue." (Revelation 7:9). This includes the canonized saints whose number keeps on increasing. Pope Francis canonized 14 new saints just last Sunday (October 20). They are:

- Manuel Ruiz López and Seven Companions of the Order of Friars Minor, and Francis Mooti and Raphael Massabki, lay faithful, martyrs.
- Joseph Allamano, priest, Founder of the Institutes of Men Missionaries of the Consolata and Women Missionaries of the Consolata.
- Marie-Léonie Paradis (born Virginia Alodie), Foundress of the Congregation of the Little Sisters of the Holy Family.
- Elena Guerra, Foundress of the Congregation of the Oblates of the Holy Spirit, known as the "Sisters of Saint Zita."
- Carlo Acutis, the modern teen web designer who had special devotion to the Eucharist.

Among the newly canonized saints is St. Giuseppe Allamano (1851–1926), an Italian diocesan priest who founded the Consolata Missionary Priests and Sisters. Allamano, though he spent his entire life in Italy, left a global legacy by training missionaries who carried the Gospel to remote corners of Africa, Asia, and South America. We, here at St. Matthias, have a special connection to the Consolata Missionaries as the Consolata priests have been a great help to us for many years and still continue to be whenever they are available to minister to us. In the name of us all, I congratulate them for this great honor of their founder's canonization.

All Souls Day is on Saturday (November 2). Though not a Holy Day of Obligation, we will have a Holy Mass at 8 am. A separate Mass to commemorate all those who passed away this year will be held on Sunday evening (November 3) at 5:30 pm.

We know that November is dedicated to the departed souls. At all the Masses this weekend, we are remembering in prayer all our dearly departed ones. Explaining the true concept of Purgatory as an "existential state" and not a place, Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI wrote that it is "the fringe of heaven, a state where heaven's eternal light has a refining effect on the "holy souls" (not 'poor souls'), who are held in the arms of Divine Mercy."

The doctrine of "Communion of saints" that we profess every Sunday is a happy reminder to us of all those who are gone to God. Pope Francis calls it a "spiritual connection that exists between those who continue their pilgrimage on earth and those who have passed the threshold of death into eternity." So let us happily depend on their intercessions for us even as we remember them with gratitude in our prayers especially during the Holy Eucharist. This is one reason why we give a 'Mass Card' to those who are grieving the loss of a family member or arrange for Masses to be offered on the anniversary of our dear departed ones.

Even when Jesus knew what Bartimaeus wanted, he wanted to listen to him expressing his needs (Mark 10:46 -52). How do you listen to your spouse? When you speak to your partner, do you consciously focus on his/her feelings and personal struggles? Before any serious personal talk with your spouse, decide not to become defensive or interrupt each other. Remember that your partner might not want solutions - he or she needs you to just sit back and listen.

A Pearl of Wisdom For This Week

"Happiness keeps you sweet; but being sweet brings happiness."

Do you suffer from Spiritual Blindness?

Each one of us suffers from spiritual blindness. Hence, we need the light of the Holy Spirit to enlighten us. Anger, hatred, prejudice, jealousy, evil habits, etc., make us spiritually blind and prevent us from seeing the goodness in our neighbors and God's presence in them. We are blind to a sense of justice when we refuse to pay our debts, or when we collect our wages though we have not done an honest day's work for that day's pay or have cheated our employer by taking time or items that belong to the company. We are blinded by greed when we are never satisfied with what we have and incur debts to buy luxury items. Hence, let us pray to have a clear vision of Christian values and priorities in our lives and to acknowledge the presence of God dwelling in ourselves and in our neighbors. A clear spiritual vision enables us to see the goodness in others, to express our appreciation for all that they have been doing for us, and to refrain from criticizing their performance.

Just Coincidence...?

In 1949, a young soldier returned home from the war to find his mother desperately ill with kidney problems. She needed an immediate blood transfusion to save her life. Unfortunately, no one in the family shared the mother's very and recovered fully. She lived another 47 years after that rare blood type of AB negative, and blood banks didn't exist in those days. The young soldier decided to gather his family together to say goodbye to his mother. As he was driving home from the hospital, he stopped to pick up another young soldier who was hitchhiking. The hitchhiker noticed the young man's tears and asked him what was wrong. The young man blurted out the story of his dying mother. In

silence, the hitchhiker took off his dog tags and held them out to the young man. On the tags was listed his blood type: AB negative. The mother received her transfusion that night fateful night. Coincidence? We don't know. This soldier and his family think the hitchhiker was an angel sent by God. All we know is that these coincidences happen quite often for people of Faith. Jesus heals. He healed Bartimaeus and he has healed millions of others--emotionally, spiritually, and, sometimes, physically.

Right Now Matters!

Bartimaeus, a blind man, the son of Timaeus, sat by the roadside begging. "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me . . . !"Master, I want to see." Mark 10: 46-52

Samantha had just finished college and was about to embark on the "real world." Her mother warned her: "You are about to enter a really weird time in your life, and I can't prepare you for it. Just be aware." Eager to move on from college in Tennessee, she moved back to her hometown of St. Louis and landed a job as a nanny with a wealthy and extremely likable family. It was a great job for a nanny - but this was not what she envisioned her life to be. While her friends were going off to law school or beginning promising new careers in great cities or getting married, she was mastering toasting the perfect Eggo waffle.

Samantha second-guessed her decision to flee Tennessee and tortured herself with feelings of insignificance and failure. It was turning into that "weird time" her mother warned her about. Then came one of those "aha!" moments when things become unmistakably clear. She was playing outside with her little charges when one of them came up and said, "You're so great. You don't even have to play with us but you do it anyway. Our other nannies never did that. We love you!" Samantha was floored. Not only did she underestimate the kids' ability to be so gracious, but they made her realize that it's truly not about what life hands you but what you do with it. Samantha writes:

"I could easily just patrol these girls, make sure they don't run out in the street or draw all over the walls, but I don't. I play with them. I make my life part of theirs and vice versa. And together, we have perfected the fine art of Eggo toasting. How many people can say that?" Samantha discovered that "self-worth is where you find it and that the most beautiful form of self-worth occurs when you maximize the amount of love you share with the world, no matter how mundane or humble the circumstances may be . . . Just because you have a college degree doesn't mean you need a job with a Blackberry."

In today's Gospel, a blind man asks to see. Jesus responds not by mixing mud or touching the man's eyes or looking to heaven in prayer; Jesus says, basically, Look with the eyes of the faith you already possess. Not only does he restore Bartimaeus@physical sight but Jesus also "restores" Bartimaeus' realization of God's love in his life, enabling him to embrace, with hope, the life God has called him to live: a life that finds its meaning in selfless giving and reconciling peace. In the same way, Samantha comes to realize the possibilities she has to be the means of love and joy for the children entrusted to her and, in that role, she discovers meaning and joy in her own life. Jesus opens the eyes of our hearts as well, enabling us to realize the opportunities we have to bring life and light, healing and peace, justice and mercy to others along our way to the dwelling place of God. Faith calls us to "see" with the human heart, to perceive in the spirit.

All Saints Day - Diversity of Saints

One thing that strikes you first about the Saints is their diversity. It would be very difficult to find one pattern of holiness, one way of following Christ. There is Thomas Aguinas, the towering intellectual, and John Vianney (the Curé d'Ars), who barely made it through the seminary. There is Vincent de Paul, a saint in the city, and there is Antony who found sanctity in the harshness and loneliness of the desert. There is Bernard kneeling on the hard stones of Clairvaux in penance for his sins, and there is Hildegard of Bingen singing and throwing flowers, madly in love with God. There is Albertus Magnus, the quirky scientist, halfphilosopher and half-wizard, and there is Gerard Manley Hopkins, the gentle poet. There is Peter, the hard-nosed and no-nonsense fisherman, and there is Edith Stein, secretary to Edmund Husserl and colleague to Martin Heidegger, the most famous philosopher of the twentieth century. There is Joan of Arc, leading armies into war, and there is Francis of Assisi, the peacenik who would never hurt an animal. There is the grave and serious Jerome, and there is Philip Neri, whose spirituality was based on laughter. How do we explain this diversity? God is an artist, and artists love to change their styles. The saints are God's masterpieces, and He never tires of painting them in different colors, different styles, and different compositions. What does this mean for us? It means we should not try to imitate any one Saint exactly. Look to them all, study their unique holiness, but then find that specific color God wants to bear through you. St. Catherine of Siena was right: "Be who God meant you to be and you will set the world on fire." (Fr. Robert Barron).



A Pumpkin story:

"What is it like to be a Christian saint?" "It is like being a Halloween pumpkin. God picks you from the field, brings you in, and washes all the dirt off you. Then he cuts off the top and

scoops out the yucky stuff. He removes the pulp of impurity and injustice and seeds of doubt, hate, and greed. Then He carves you a new smiling face and puts His light of holiness inside you to shine for the entire world to see." This is the Christian idea behind the carved pumpkins during the Halloween season.

Reflect

"What I like to See!"

Helen Keller, so brave and inspiring to us in her deafness and blindness, once wrote a magazine article entitled: "Three Days to See." In that article she outlined what things she would like to see if she

were granted just three days of sight. It was a powerful, thought-provoking article. On the first day, she said, she wanted to see friends. Day two she would spend seeing nature. The third day she would spend in her home city of New York, watching the busy city and the workday of the present. She concluded it with these words: "I who am blind can give one hint to those who see: Use your eyes as if tomorrow you were to be stricken blind."

The gospel this Sunday is the healing of blind Bartimaeus who tried to get the attention of Jesus. In the midst of the crowd, Jesus called him and wanted him to articulate what his need was. Bartimaeus who had lots of things in his mind (unhappiness and all other feelings due to his inability to see and manage his life as he was a blind beggar), got a chance to share his needs with Jesus. Like Bartimaeus, we must seek Jesus with trust in his goodness and mercy. Sometimes our fears, anger and habitual unhealthy habits prevent us from approaching God in prayer. At times, we even become angry with God when He seems slow in answering our prayers. In these desperate moments, let us approach Jesus in prayer with trusting Faith as Bartimaeus did and listen carefully to the voice of Jesus asking us: "What do you want me to do for you?" Let us tell Him all our heart's intentions and needs. Let us imitate Bartimaeus, the man of faith and vision, a man unafraid to recognize his need for healing and to cry out, "I want to see!"

"Do you see what I see?"

A Pastor shared this:

In our parish office there hangs a modernistic picture composed of a maze of colors and shapes. I know these sophisticated, modern, and abstract pictures are supposed to contain some profound artistic or philosophical message, but I have never been able to figure it out. It just looks like a jumbled mass of confusion. If there is a message there, I am blind to it. One day while I was standing in the office, waiting for the copier to warm up, one of the parents came to the office with her kindergarten-age boy, Adam. After greeting me he looked at the picture for a minute and said to me, "Do you see what I see?" "Do you see something in that picture? I sure don't." Adam looked at me with glee in his eye, "Father, can't you see him? It's Jesus hanging on the cross." I stared as hard as I could, until my eyes actually hurt from staring. I wanted to believe Adam, that there actually was the image of Jesus hanging on the cross hidden somewhere in that mass of color and shapes, but I couldn't see Jesus anywhere. "Adam, I'm sorry but I must be blind. You will have to help me see." Directing his finger to a mass of color in the center of the picture, Adam said, "There, Father. Do you see what I see? There is Jesus, his face, his arms outstretched on the cross." And then, like an epiphany, the image began to appear. Yes, there hidden somehow "behind" the colors and the shapes was the barely visible image of Jesus, hanging with arms outstretched on the cross. "It's amazing, Adam. You have helped one blind pastor to see Jesus. Yes, I can see what you see, Adam." A similar epiphany happens in today's Gospel.
