A Message From Our Pastor

Dear Friends,

This Tuesday we enter October, the Respect Life Month. We are a pro-life Church. This past Thursday (9/26/24) was the March for Life in Trenton, by thousands of young and old, giving peaceful, prayerful witness to the sanctity of human life. We know the Biblical teaching that life is a gift from God,



and, hence, we respect it from womb to tomb. But, where in the Bible do we see explicit support for this?

The term "with child" (in reference to pregnant women) occurs 26 times in the Bible. The term "with fetus" never occurs. The Bible never uses anything less than human terms to describe the unborn (Exodus 21:22Ğ23). In Luke (1:36 and 41), we are told that Elizabeth conceived a "son" and that the "babe" leaped in her womb. God does not say that a "fetus" leaped in her womb! Elizabeth greets Mary (in her early pregnancy) as "my Lord's mother." If God allows a child to be conceived, then God obviously has a plan for unborn children (Jer. 1:5; Lk. 1:13Ğ17; Gen. 4:25; Jud. 13:3Ğ5), and so to abort an unborn child is to stop a plan of God: "Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, before you were born I dedicated you, a prophet to the nations I appointed you... Psalm 139: 13: You formed my inmost being; you knit me in my mother's womb. I praise you, so wonderfully you made me; wonderful are your works! Thus, based on the word of God, the Church teaches that an unborn child, from the moment of its conception in his or her mother's womb, is precious because he or she carries an immortal soul.

We, here at St. Matthias, have been always supporting Sr. Mary Vertucci and her ministry to the poor girls in Tanzania. We have listened to her touching stories of many girls who have been helped to reach successful careers because of their experience at the Emusoi Center. We have supported Emusoi Center for long with our prayers and financial support. As we enter the Respect Life month, we have a special second collection next Sunday (October 6). We wish to be participating in promoting the fullness of life that Sr. Mary Vertucci and other missionaries are doing.

Such Biblical insights and action plans are important. What about biblical understanding to be grounded in God's message for taking care of other aspects of our life? The best way is the small groups that we are starting soon. Pope St. John Paul II said, "Small Christian Communities are a tremendous source of bringing more life into our life and into a Parish." We have rightly titled this season of Bible sharing as "Fall Into Faith." Time and again we have heard the testimonies of those who were and still are in small groups. Why not be enriched the same way? For sign up information, please see page 4 of our bulletin, or call Debbie Schurko, our Director of Religious Education in the parish office.

October begins with the feast of Little Therese of Child Jesus – the very popular saint of simplicity, teaching us that we can be holy by doing the smallest acts with love. One of her many inspiring quotes that touched me is: "I learned from experience that joy does not reside in the things around us, but in the very depths of the soul, that one can have it in the gloom of a dungeon as well as in the palace of a king." May we all experience that joy, no matter what!

Facilitators will be contacting group members who have been part of their group. Each group likely will be meeting either on Zoom or in person, usually on the same date/time. Groups will begin the week of

October 14. New members, please sign-up by October 7. Most groups will be using the same resource. In Small Faith Groups, there's always new insights we receive from the Scriptures. Insights that benefit us the rest of our lives. By studying the weekend Liturgy's readings with others who have similar needs, we discover that God is speaking to us directly. Then, the Mass itself becomes more meaningful, more alive!

Why Join Small Groups?

Small groups, in fact, are where much of the preaching points from our pulpits begins to be fleshed out in conversation and action. The implications of the Biblical passages come alive when we hear how each member of the group shares his/her story of struggling to make sense of God's will in their own lives. The sharing of struggles and challenges, joys and triumphs provide a great mutual spiritual support.

Small faith-sharing groups also meet a very practical and human need: the need to belong. We are communal creatures: a community of love called the Trinity made us and because community is our origin, we will always find life and direction within a community better than we will on our own. That means small groups deliver deeper friendships that double as accountability. When people know you, really know you, your life becomes far more transparent, including your shortcomings and imperfections. Others learn to read you and call you out for those areas you wish to improve, creating opportunities to deal with real life difficulties as they surface. This is part of what we should expect from good friends.

So, why not sign up if you have never tried this small group experience?

It's Downhill from First Grade, Kid...

"If your hand causes you to sin, cut it off." Mark 9: 38-43, 45, 47-48

In an episode of the daily comic strip 'For Better or For Worse' by Lynn Johnston [October 14, 2017], six-year-old Lizzy has had a bad day at school and she confides to her father: | Daddy - why don't some kids get along with other kids? Sometimes, when you think someone's your friend, they're really not. Some kids do mean things for no reason. Kids fight over dumb stuff. They pick on each other. They don't share - an' they say things about other kids that aren't true. "I can't wait till I'm grown up . . . grown-ups don't do things like that to each other."

Lizzy turns to walk away, leaving her dad with a stunned, sad expression on his face that says, *Oh*, *Lizzy*, *if* you only knew...

Jesus challenges all of us adults to consider the values and faith we are modeling for our "little ones": what our public policies, our social and cultural institutions, our political and religious rhetoric reveal about the world we are building that we are handing on to them. The great responsibility of our baptisms is to show our children the purpose that our faith gives to our lives, to help those alienated from God re-connect with their sacred, to reveal the love and mercy of God to those who do not know God. To teach with conviction without judgment, to guide by example rather than by dogma, to inspire by generosity instead of sermons is to transform our world one generation at a time, to establish the reign of God one stone upon another.

Modern-Day Scandal Givers

The truly dangerous people to whom Jesus is referring are those evil ones who wear the mantle of religious leadership, and at the same time, by their counter-witness, turn the weak and the innocent away from God, and cause them to sin. Today, we know the irreparable harm done to the Church and the faithful by the scandals of clerical sex abuse. Likewise, unorthodox theologians and false preachers, who propagate their anti-Christian ideas under the guise of Biblical and psychological research, often give scandal. Professors, even at some Christian universities, sometime advocate moral relativism and nihilism, converting students to their false beliefs. Even teachers at Catholic universities sometimes criticize papal pronouncements as "an infringement on academic freedom." Do they not give scandal? Our major social institutions — the news media, the Internet, law, public education, and the entertainment industry -- under the guise of "freedom of speech and expression," often seem hostile towards religion, erecting stumbling blocks to believers. We have an obligation to make known, with Christian courage, our views on these matters to protect the innocent.

Did Jesus mean that we Self-Mutilate??!!

Our hands become instruments of sin according to what we touch and how we touch, in lust or greed or violence. Our feet are used for sin according to the places we have them take us. Our eyes become doorways for sins according to what we choose to look at or refuse to look at. However, it is important to understand that, in these passages about "plucking out an eye or cutting off a hand," Jesus is not speaking literally. We have more sins than we have bodily parts. Besides, even if all offending parts were removed, our hearts and minds -- the source of all sins-would still be intact. Hence, these sayings are actually about our attitudes, dispositions, and inclinations. Jesus is inviting us to integrate our bodies into our following of Christ, so that our hands become instruments of compassion, healing, and comfort, our feet help us to bring the Gospel to the world, and our eyes learn to see the truth, goodness and beauty all around us.

By these startling words about self-mutilation, Jesus also means that we must cut out of our lives all practices that keep us away from God, and retain only those habits that draw us closer to God. Jesus is setting before all his disciples the one supreme goal in life that is worth any sacrifice. That goal is God Himself and His will for our lives, which alone leads us to everlasting peace and happiness. Just as a doctor might remove a limb or some part of the body in order to preserve the life of the whole body, so we must be ready to part with anything which causes us to sin and which leads us or others to spiritual death. Billy Graham has a fantastic way of summing up this Gospel message by concluding his Crusades with a final challenge: "Decide! Cut away anything that prevents you from a radical decision for Jesus Christ! Decide for Christ!"

An Intolerant Person

The following anonymous piece offers a profile of such a person:

When the other person acts that way, he's obnoxious; When you do it, it's nerves.

When she is set in her ways, she is obstinate;

When you are, it's just being firm.

When he doesn't like your friends, he's prejudiced; When you don't like his, you are simply showing good judgment of human nature.

When she tries to be accommodating, she's polishing the apple;

When you do it, you're using tact,

When he takes time to do things, he's plodding and slow; When you take forever, you're being deliberate and careful. When she finds fault, she's cranky;

When you do, you're discriminating."

Reflect

Cut it off

According to an Irish legend, in olden days a group of adventurers set out from the European mainland in a few boats to conquer a new territory, what is believed to be the present Ireland. Their leader was a daring man of fortune who announced that whoever touched land first would possess the entire territory and become its king. One of his team members was named O'Neil who was determined to have the new land. He rowed mightily, but a rival boat pressed him hard, caught up with him and then outstripped him. What could he do as his rival was fast approaching the land? This strong nerved, iron minded O'Neil dropped his oars, seized battle axe, cut his left arm, and threw it upon the shore over his rival's head so that he could be the first to touch the land to make it his own. Moreover, he won the land by his heroic sacrifice. In today's gospel, Jesus uses a similar metaphor asking us to cut off our hands if it causes us to sin and prevent us from inheriting heaven.

However, let us be clear: Jesus is not asking us to selfmutilate (see explanation above). Instead,

His teachings mean: We need to avoid conduct that can lead to scandal.

We give scandal and become stumbling blocks to others:

a) when we are unkind or unjust in our treatment of them,b) when we reject them because of their weakness, faults or sins,

c) when we humiliate them by hurting their pride and damaging their self-image,

d) when we discourage, ignore, or refuse to accept them,

e) when we ridicule them or deflate their dreams,

f) when we follow a double standard: ¦ Do as I say; don-t do as I do,"

g) when we set standards which are so high that we are unable to meet them ourselves, and

h) when we become judgmental of those who are still struggling to reach a level of commitment that we feel is too low to be useful.

Instead, we need to become good role models: a) when we support and guide others in moments of doubt, weakness, and suffering, b) when we increase other people's self-confidence by accepting them as they are and enabling them to discover their hidden talents, c) when we help them to grow by inspiring and correcting them, d) when we forgive them and listen to them with patience, and e) when we make ourselves examples of Christian witnessing.

With our fallen human nature, we fall victim to the evil tendency of trying to control the Spirit of God by our intolerance. Our own arrogance insists that another is not qualified to speak on justice or morality because of his/her lower educational qualifications, low-grade lifestyle, humble social background or race. As a society, we also tend to question people's legitimacy – especially when they challenge us.

Mohandas Gandhi, a Hindu leader in India, challenged the colonial rule of the British Empire over India with his principles of peace and non-violence. However, the intolerant British Empire, initially dismissing him as a "silly, half-naked fakir," tried to silence him by imprisonment. But later they found, to their horror that the entire nation was behind him in its fight for freedom from colonial rule.

<u>Nelson Mandela</u> was ignored by the minority ruling class and was jailed for many for years as a radical because of his option for the poor and the oppressed in South Africa.

Dorothy Day was imprisoned in the U.S. for her beliefs and was accused of being a Communist.

Martin Luther King Jr. challenged a nation and its policy of discrimination. He was continually under surveillance by the FBI and was accused of inciting sedition and of being unpatriotic.

There are Christians who still look on believers belonging to non-Christian religions and on members of Christian denominations different from their own as heretics and semipagans. In today's Gospel, Jesus gives his disciples a lesson in Christian tolerance along with a warning against jealousy and scandal.

Envy Destroys Self

In Greek history we read of a young man who so distinguished himself in public games that his fellow citizens raised a statue in his honor, to keep fresh the memory of his victories. This statue so excited the envy of another rival who had been defeated in the races that one night he stole out under cover of darkness with the intention to destroy the statue. But he only nicked it slightly. He gave it a final heave and it fell - on top of him and killed him. -Envy always harms the one who is guilty of it. That is why in today's Gospel Jesus warns us against jealousy and envy. That's also the scenario in the first reading from the Book of Numbers: Joshua was upset that God's gift was given to those who did not follow the community's guidelines, that God's spirit was upon those who did not follow the protocol, and so he asked Moses to stop them. But Moses replied: "Are you jealous for my sake? Would that all the people of the Lord were prophets! Would that the Lord might bestow his spirit on them all!"

As only one example, his virtues outlined in his Peace Prayer – love, faith, hope, giving – are so desperately needed to transform the inclination to hate prevalent in our polarized world.

Franciscan Month has something for everyone.
